**YOUNG SALMON**.—Mr. Henry Clark, Manager of the Dunk River Salmon Hatchery, has been engaged the past few days in transferring the young salmon hatched at that establishment, to the various rivers. The fishery officers in charge state that the Hatchery has been a great success. Half a million of fine healthy fry have been already let loose in the Dunk River, and 100,000 in Trout River, Lot 10. Mr. Clark successfully placed 40,000 in the Morell, yesterday, and was in town to-day, accompanied by the Inspector of Fisheries, on their way with a further consignment to another part of the Morell River. We have been informed that there is a demand for salmon fry in the United States and elsewhere at \$10 per 1000, lowest quotations, which would indicate that the successful hatching of nearly three-quarters of a million of fish has already paid, during this first season, the total expense of the Hatchery. Next year the officers hope to lay down from one million to a million and a-half of eggs.

**Savage Island.**

The Toronto *Globe's* Ottawa correspondent is entirely wrong. Savage Island was not sold to the Dominion Government by Mr. Percy Pope, who is to-day its owner. The land at Cascumpec, which was sold to the Dominion Government, was never owned by either the Hon. J. C. Pope or his son. The *Globe's* correspondent has evidently been led astray by the *Patriot*.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

CHICAGO, May 30.

The trains this morning brought large accessions to the delegates and politicians here.

Prominent among those were Senator Conkling, Fred Douglass, Postmaster of New York, and Lieutenant Governor of California.

The Rotundas of the Palmer House and Grand Pacific have been crowded all the evening, and the discussions have been exciting to point of blows in more than one instance.

LATER.

CHICAGO, May 31.

All day yesterday (Sunday) passed busily at the Hotel Sand, the headquarters of all the candidates.

Preparations of considerable magnitude are being made for the open air meetings on the lake front to-night.

The grand meeting has secured some of the best speakers in the city. The anti-Grant meeting will probably be addressed by the business men rather than by the famous orators.

J. Milton Turner, of St. Louis, chairman of the National Committee for negro men is here and opened rooms for head quarters to-day for the advancement of the chances of Senator Bruce for Vice-President.

BOSTON, May 27.

Alexander A. Grant, a native of Piston, N. S., suicided this morning by shooting. No cause is assigned. Grant leaves a wife and two children.

WASHINGTON, May 30.

The \$2,000 subscribed by the citizens of Washington for the benefit of the winner of the great Hanlan-Riley race, were paid to Hanlan yesterday. He will leave for Brighton beach to-morrow evening, where he will remain a week before proceeding to Providence to participate in the race there on June 17th.

NEW YORK, May 30.

The *Herald's* St. Petersburg correspondent telegraphs that by order of the Czar the sentence of the condemned Nihilists have been commuted. The commutation was settled at an interview between the Emperor and General Louis Melikoff, on the recommendation of the latter.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.

At the Sand lots to-day, Kearney announced that he would leave for Chicago on Wednesday to attend the Greenback Convention. If the platform suited him, he would stump the State for it, and if the workmen did not like, would organize a party in its support. If the platform proves unsatisfactory to the California working men, they could confine themselves to local issues.

LONDON, May 29.

In the Commons, last night, the committee to enquire into the case of Bradlaugh was appointed, according to Gladstone's proposals, after Wolf's motion for adjournment in order to make some alterations in the constitution of the committee had been rejected—256 to 100.

Martin Shield & Co., merchants and rice dealers, of Mark Lane, have failed for £100,000.

LONDON, May 30.

A despatch from Thyeimio says the Burmese Government recently addressed a communication to the British Government through the Burmese embassy here, explaining that the insurrection was only a robber's outbreak. The despatch received no notice because all friendly intercourse between Great Britain and Burmah has ceased.

BERLIN, May 30.

The Commission appointed by the Russian Ministry to investigate the condition of the iron industry in Russia recommend that agricultural and other machines from abroad, hitherto imported free, shall henceforth pay duty and that the duties on those already liable shall be largely increased.

LONDON, May 29.

A Dublin telegram says that the harvest prospects throughout Ireland are good. Correspondents state that no better seed time has been experienced in Ireland for many years than now. The crop is healthy and well advanced. An unusual area is sown in potatoes, which come up well as new seed has been extensively used, and it is hoped the crop will be sound and plentiful.
