Predicts Grey Cup Game Will Be Hard, Rugged

MONTREAL (CP)—Lew Hayman, never associated with a loser in five previous Grey Cup games, predicted Thursday the big battle Saturday in Toronto will be hard and rugged.

The general manager of Montreal Alouettes shied off any forecast of the outcome but he did venture a bit further. He indicated plainly that the weather and field conditions may have a bearing when his big red and white team meets Edmonton Eskimos—certainly so far as Alouettes are concerned.

"Under reasonably good conditions we are a double-threat team in the air and on the ground," said Hayman. "From what I understand, Edmonton is essentially a ground team."

"So if conditions are good, Edmonton will have to figure us either way. If the field and weather are bad, we will be restricted to that extent."

FIVE COACHING WINS
Hayman's Grey Cup record shows three victories with Toronto Argonauts, one with the RCAF Hurricanes and one with Alouettes. The last in 1949 when the Als defeated Calgary Stampeders. He was coach on all five occasions. He gave up the coaching end and confined himself entirely to front-office work as general manager when Douglas (Peabody) Walker came up from the south three seasons ago to take over the team handling.

Hayman talked while cleaning up last details in his office preparatory to taking the train for Toronto. He will be there 24 hours ahead of the club.

One more practice is scheduled for the team. It will be held around noon or a little later today, a few hours before the squad leaves for Toronto.

STILL DAZED was still a trifle dazed from the mad ticket scramble and squeaks from Montreal football fans.

"I haven't any idea how many more tickets we could have disposed of," said Hayman wearily.

Islanders And Hawks Clash In Important Game Tonight

The powerful Moncton Hawks, who stand just one point back of the league-leading Islanders, visit Charlottetown this evening to do battle with coach Steve Brklacich and his Garnet and Gold men. These teams have been fighting tooth and nail all season and with the Hawks getting a chance to take over first place in the ACSHL, tonight's game should be one of the best of the year, if it is possible to play any better than they did in the bang-up match of last Friday night.

Besides being a battle for the leadership in the league, both goalies, Nick Plisodny of the Hawks and Jim Shirley of the Islanders are sharing a close, private war over goal-tending honours. In 20 games the temperamental Nick has allowed only 61 pucks to get by him to give him a goals-against average of 3.05. Jim has fanned 69 shots in 21 games for an average of 3.29. A couple of goals, one way or the other, could mean quite a lot to either of the rubber-smoothing sensations.

In their last two meetings each team has gained a 4-0 white-washing over their opponents. Islanders got the first in Moncton last Saturday night after they had splashed the Hawks 8:1 at the Forum the night before. Wednesday night the Hawks who had been resting for several days blanked the locals in Moncton in what was the third encounter in as many nights for the Islanders combined with a tiring road-trip to the New Brunswick capital on Tuesday. However, both teams will have an equal amount of rest in preparation for tonight's contest at the Forum.

The Islanders, who presently ice a team which far superior to that of last year, have won five of their last six encounters and have only lost five games this month. Five of their members lead the ACSHL scoring parade and the team has scored 22 more goals than any other team in the newly formed Maritime conference. The Islanders pack three very well balanced lines, three strong defencemen and an outstanding goal-tender. Their three centermen, Buck Whitlock, Ray Leduc and Copper Leyte enter tonight scoring sheet in one, two, three order with Copper and Bob Gray tied for third. Every winger on the team has been having a feast for himself at the expense of opposing goalies.

Bettors Favor Alouettes 5 To 1

TORONTO (CP)—The Grey Cup final shapes up as a football mud bath on the basis of the present rain-sodden condition of Toronto's Varsity Stadium and a rainy outlook for Saturday.

Montreal Alouettes, Big Four champions, are top-heavy favorites to whip the lighter, injury-riddled Edmonton Eskimos, western titlists.

But bettors, giving odds of 5 to 1 or a 13-point spread on the Larks, can't count on banking any money yet. One in every five of the 41 Gray Cup finals since inception of the classic in 1906 has been an upset.

Chief forecaster Fred Turnbull of the public weather office, cautiously predicting Saturday's weather, said it might rain instead of snow, as he forecast Wednesday. The storm centre is heading from the west.

Davis-Bassett Bout Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—Teddy (Red Top) Davis, probably the losingest boxing contender of all time, and punching Percy Bassett, the leading challenger, collide in a 12-round televised bout tonight for the right to meet featherweight champion Sandy Saddler in a title fight.

Despite the fact he has 47 defeats on his record, Davis is rated even money in the betting to whip the hard-hitting Philadelphia in Madison Square Garden.

This is their fourth meeting. Bassett holds a 2-1 edge in the rivalry.

With all of his losses, as against 57 victories and two defeats, Red Top is ranked as the No. 2 contender. The 31-year-old Hartford, Conn., veteran has 30 kayos to his credit. Bassett, 24, has a far superior record, 62 - 10 - 1 with 40 knockouts. Davis victories include a decision this year over light weight Armand Savioe of Montreal.
