NELSON WINS

THE STALLION RACE.

Alcyon Takes Second Money

BEACON PARK, Sept. 22. The stallion race at Beacon Park this afternoon was witnessed by 15,000 people. The track was in good condition and the weather was clear. Nelson was a strong favorite. All the horses were in excellent condition, but from the start of the race it was conceded to be between Nelson and Alcyon. In the last heat, Nelson was nearly passed by Alcyon, but was not headed during the race, and may be said to have won easily. Nelson takes first money, \$5,000, Alcyon second, \$2,500, Pilot Knox, third, \$1,500, Junemont, fourth, \$1,000. Time 2:18 1/2, 2:17 1/2, 2:18 1/2.

Baseball.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 23. The second game in the championship series this afternoon between the St. John's and Shamrocks was won by the former—8 to 1. Small pitched for the St. John's and Abbey for the Shamrocks. Although seemingly somewhat one-sided it was a beautifully played game, the Shamrocks playing with only three fielding errors, against eight for the St. John's. The Shamrocks, however, were unable to bat Small, only securing four singles off him, while the St. John's batted Abbey for ten, with a total of fourteen. There were over three thousand people present and all the plays on both sides were liberally applauded. Small struck out ten men and Abbey four.

Probably only a Rumor.

MONTREAL, Sept. 23. A rumor is current that the Dominion Government and the C. P. R. are at logger heads, over arrangements with the I. C. R. It is charged that the Government has broken an agreement as to running powers over the I. C. R., and if the difficulty is not removed the C. P. R. will make a terminus at St. John. Another rumor is that the C. P. R. are considering the propriety of making St. Andrews their Atlantic port. That their is some difficulty with the Government is believed in well informed circles, but the rumor about St. Andrews is not credited.

The French Elections.

LONDON, Sept. 23. The Paris correspondent of the Times says the elections resulted in a crushing defeat for the Boulangists, who returned only 21 members, and whose entire representation in the new Chamber will not exceed 36. The Conservatives elected 131, and will get 30 more. The Republicans returned 218 and will get 100 more.

A Big Crash.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. The Mammoth Publishing House of Balford Clarke & Co., a large establishment here, with branches in New York and San Francisco, went to the wall to-day. The receiver says the assets will be about \$400,000, and liabilities about \$350,000.

Has Cholera on Board.

OTTAWA, Sept. 23. The quarantine officer at Groase Isle reports that the steamer Alberta from Phillipine Islands with a cargo of sugar is detained there, it being reported that two cases of cholera had occurred on board during the voyage.

The Quebec Catastrophe.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20. General Middleton and Sir A. Caron have left for Quebec, with two Engineers, who will endeavor to devise means to prevent further rock slides from Cape Diamond.

They Want an Increase.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20. The printers in the Government Bureau here have petitioned for an increase of wages from \$11 to \$13 a week.
