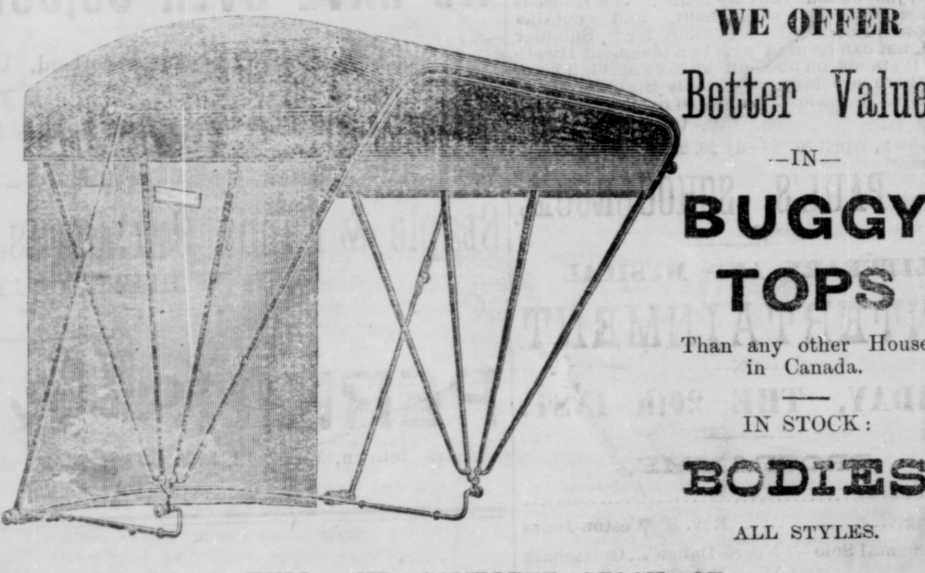

The Provincial Budget.

Hon. W. W. Sullivan's Speech.

(Continued.)

We find that owing to the provisions of the present Schools Act, we have, practically, no control of the expenditure for education; and that instead of the Government being master of the education fund, that fund is master of the Province. It is like a balloon which has started from its moorings, and has risen to the clouds. Where it is going to stop I do not know. It is largely owing to this increased expenditure that we have, to-day, so large a deficit. Were it not for that expenditure we would have had a large surplus and no dread of taxation. During the year 1878, when the late Government were in power, the total expenditure for education was only \$64,000 while during the past two years under the present Government, it was \$112,000. This was, certainly, a most extraordinary increase. At Ottawa they asked the members of a late delegation what sums were expended for various purposes. When they heard the amount expended for education they were amazed beyond measure, and thought it most extraordinary that we should pursue such a course. I do not say that the money for education has been improperly spent, for I believe it has been expended for a good purpose, and I hope it is producing good fruit. But I fail to see that the public is reaping advantages corresponding to the very large expenditure for education which we are now making. It will be noticed that the estimates of expenditure for the present year is below that of last year, and very much below the actual expenditure for that year. It now becomes my duty to inform the House how we intend to expend the Estimates for the present year. On the Administration of Justice, last year, the sum of \$19,680.76 was expended. Now, this is a very large item of our expenditures, as it includes Supreme Court salaries, jurors, fees, County Court salaries, rents and disbursements, Jails and Court Houses, &c. Last year the Government were enabled to save some \$300 of the Estimates for that expenditure. In fact they have annually saved a considerable part of the Estimates under that head. Hon. members will be surprised to learn that when the present Government came into power in 1879, they found that for the previous year the cost of the Administration of Justice was nearly \$32,000, or \$13,000 more than was expended in 1887. In the ten years in which we have been in power we have saved to the country in that Department nearly \$130,000. Our opponents tell us that we are in debt—and that statement is as true as many others they make—to the extent of \$230,000. Well, had they been in power from 1879 to the present time, and had they continued to manage public affairs as they did previous to that date, they would to-day have a debt of upwards of \$700,000, and would have taken from the people in the shape of taxation upwards of \$400,000 besides. It is clear that we have effected an enormous saving in the Department of Justice; in fact, we have reduced the expenditure therein to nearly one-half of what it was in 1878. This year, the expenditure under that head will be larger than it was during the past year, and the estimate has, therefore, been increased by about \$2,000. This year, unfortunately, we have had a murder case, which entailed a very large expenditure upon the Province. I do not say the money was thrown away; its expenditure was necessary. Fortunately for us, murder cases do not often occur in this Province; when they do occur, however, no matter what the cost justice must be properly administered. We estimate the expenditure for the year in this department at \$21,157. Although the cost of the January term of the Supreme Court was so heavy, that of the June term will probably be much less than usual, so that, on the whole, the expenditure for the year will, I trust, be but very slightly increased. One item for which there was an unusual expenditure during the past year was that of Boards of Health. Last year we paid to the City of Charlottetown the sum of \$7,000 on account of expenses in connection with the epidemic of smallpox in the autumn of 1885. Although not a legal claim upon the Government, it was a fair and equitable one, and was therefore paid. There will probably be no expenditure under that head during the present year, and no sum has been placed in the estimates for it. The estimate for education has been increased to the extent of nearly \$9,000, the amount for the year being \$109,530, or nearly twice as much as when the party in opposition were in power. For elections, the sum expended last year was \$2,432.55. Part of this sum was for expenses in connection with the General Election for the Legislative Council in 1886, in Queen's and Prince Counties; and part for expenses of partial elections in Third District of Queen's County and Fourth District of Prince County. This year the estimate has been reduced to \$700. We have had two partial elections this year. One of these was for the District of Belfast, the cause for which I very much regret; the other was for the District of Tignish. These elections were tests of public opinion. Both seats were formerly held by the Opposition. One of the Districts declared in favor of the Government, and the other one for the same Government, and the other one for the same Government as formerly. When I visited the First District of Prince County, and learned of the influences brought to bear upon it by certain parties, and by the hon. gentleman who leads the Opposition, who travelled through it, and used all his means in inducing the people to oppose the Government, I saw no great prospect of carrying it in our favor at that time, although the friends of the Government acted most nobly. But the people of the Belfast District, which supported the Government,

are, I believe—and I say it without disparagement to any other District—equal in intelligence to those of the First District of Prince. Another department for which we have found it necessary to increase the estimate for this year, for management, is that of Public Works. Last year the estimate was \$3,620; this year it is \$3,900. This has been caused by increasing the salary of the official who has been for some time acting as draughtsman, from \$40 to \$50 per month. I do not think any hon. member will have any objection to that increase. For ferries, last year, the estimate was \$6,150; this year it is only \$4,450. The reason for this was that for the season of 1887 we had a contract to run the steamers across the Hillsborough ferry, for which we paid the sum of \$1,700. This year the Government propose to run the steamers themselves, through the Public Works Department, as a test, in order to ascertain whether the ferry is self-sustaining or not. I am satisfied that we shall find a saving to the Province of more than \$1,700 per year in managing the boats in this way. Perhaps we shall clear \$1,000 additional; but this is only an estimate, although probably a correct one. Another item of expenditure is Rights of Way. We have been granting considerable sums for Right of Way for many years and I think we have now a sufficient number of roads in this old Province. I know cases in which new roads have been paid for and opened up, which have never been used. In such cases the public money was thrown away. We are now going to stop that, Mr. Speaker, by reducing the estimates for Rights of Way from \$5,000 to \$2,000. For public buildings the estimate is \$3,950, which is \$6,000 less than that for 1887, owing to the fact that the erection of the new Court House in Georgetown cost \$7,500, while this year the expenditure thereon for furniture and fittings will be only \$1,000. That Courthouse is completed, and is a credit to the Province. I do not think there is in any of the Maritime Provinces any Court House of the kind superior to it, and yet its cost was very reasonable. The expense of erecting that building helped to swell our indebtedness for the past year; but we have something to show for it. The estimate for public buildings this year will be considerably less. We estimate that on the Province Building we shall expend the sum of \$1,600, so that the item for this purpose will be increased to the extent of \$500 over that of last year. It is intended to repair the building in order to prevent it from tumbling to pieces. The rent of Pownall Wharf Slip, the estimate for which, last year was \$324, will be discontinued, as the Government think it better that all their boats on the two ferries should touch at the same place, and land their passengers there, viz., at the Prince Street Ferry Wharf. An expenditure has, however, been incurred in constructing a proper landing at that wharf for boats from Rocky Point. While we have reduced the volume of our general expenditure from \$287,000 to \$253,242.22, we have increased the estimated expenditure upon the public roads and small bridges from \$15,000 to \$17,000. This is a branch of the public service which most affects the public, because the people have to use the highways more than any other public work. The next item is that for packet service. The whole amount expended on that last year was \$3,680. This year, it is proposed to reduce the expenditure on this service to \$2,950, a reduction of \$730. The packet between Grand River and Charlottetown has been thought unnecessary, so far as we have information on the matter. Another packet between Charlottetown, Rustico, New London and Malpeque was also unprovided for in the estimates, for the same reason. Since then, however, I have had communications from parties in those localities, stating that they think the packet between Charlottetown, Rustico and New London should be maintained; but that the one to Malpeque is not necessary. Persons from Malpeque seem to be of the same opinion. I have also had the advantage of receiving information from the hon. member for Springton, and his practical knowledge of this matter. The result will probably be that there will be supplementary estimates to cover the expenditure alluded to, brought down to the House. The next item on the estimates is for the steamers Southport and Elfin, \$2000. These steamers should never have been owned by the Government, and it was an egregious blunder to provide them. Governments should not own steamers. Last year the estimates was \$2,500. This year we have reduced that item by \$500. The estimate for cost of working the Registry Office has also been reduced to the extent of \$500, there being one person less employed. So that while we have increased some items of this kind we have reduced others. Yet the total estimate for the year is less than that of 1887 by \$12,239. Including the proposed supplementary estimate, the total for the year will be something over \$254,000. That is how we stand so far as the estimate for the present year is concerned. With proper management we can get along with the expenditure of that amount. At the end of the year, it may be found, however, to be a little more or a little less than the amount brought down.
