C.C.F. Now Wants Chance For Private Business Expansion

WINNIPEG (CP)—The national council of the CCF gave the signal Wednesday for a turn to the right by Canada's socialist party. A new declaration of principles was presented to the 200 delegates attending here which party leaders described as a restatement of the 1933 Regina Manifesto in terms of 1956 prosperity. Where the depression-born Regina document called for the "eradication of capitalism," the new declaration sets its sights on "equality and freedom" for every Canadian. Where the manifesto set out a program of nationalization, the new declaration calls for the co-existence of free enterprise and socialistic public ownership. The five-page statement, to be considered clause by clause at the convention, says public ownership is the best means of "breaking the stranglehold of private monopolies" and making economic planning possible. NEED PRIVATE ENTERPRISE It also "recognizes that in many fields there will be need for private enterprise which can make a useful contribution to the development of our economy." "The CCF will, therefore, provide increased opportunities and security for private business as well as publicly-owned industry." In its preamble, the declaration states that the aim of the CCF is a system in which "private profit and corporate power" subordinate to the social planning which would make possible equality of opportunity and high living standards. It declares that the Regina manifesto had a profound influence in Canada and many of the improvements it recommended have been wrought from unwilling governments making Canada a better place to live than a generation ago. "RETHINK" POLICY In a key address to the convention, National Chairman David Lewis of Toronto, said all socialist parties had been "rethinking" their platforms for the last few years. The parties had learned from experience in governments in many countries. Prosperity resulting from the Second World War and the cold war which saved the capitalist system from depression—had forced a re-application of socialist principles. Delegates applauded loudly when Mr. Lewis attacked the three other major forces in Canadian politics.
