

Medals Found At Louisbourg Are Identified

OTTAWA (CP)—French commemorative medals found in a chest in the ruins of the Louisbourg fortress on Cape Breton Island, date back to 1720 the resources department said.

The archeological crews of the national parks branch found two bronze medals and one silver medal bearing the effigy of King Louis XV and are looking for others.

The diggings were launched preparatory to the restoration of the massive fortifications which were begun by the French 243 years ago to defend sea lanes to the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Dr. James Howard, archeologist in charge of the excavations, said the medals were found by pure chance in the foundations of the king's bastion one of the main features of the fortress.

He said records were found later confirming that 18 medals were struck in 1720 and placed in the foundations of the fortress to mark the beginning of construction.

The medals, showing the harbor and fortifications on the reverse side, are being treated in the Louisbourg artifacts laboratory and eventually will be placed in the fortress museum.

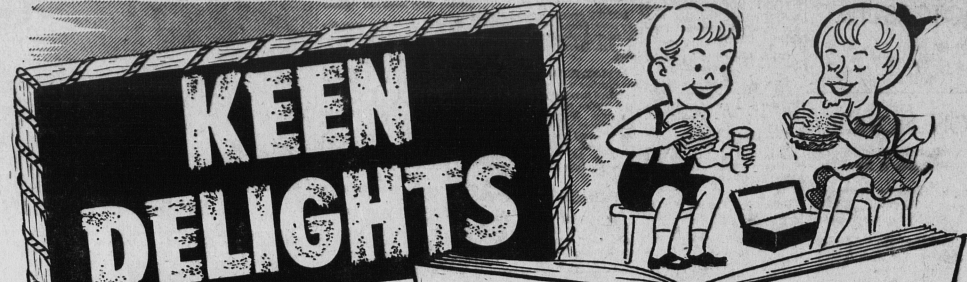
