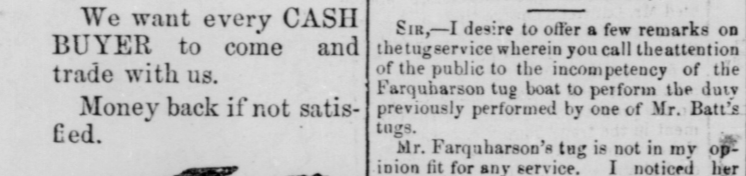

THE TUP SERVICE. Sir,—I desire to offer a few remarks on the tug service wherein you call attention of the public to the incompetency of the Esquimaux tug boat to perform the duty previously performed by one of Mr. Bart's tugs.

Mr. Farquharson's tug is not in my opinion fit for any service. I noticed her when building and learned that the draftsman designed her to meet the owner's idea of a model steamboat ought to be. The boat has two good ends in both the forward and after sections, but she has no midship bearings without which no vessel can be a good sea boat or can be forced through the water at an ordinary rate, let alone drawing a vessel after her.

The designer has yet to learn the lesson novices can only gain by experience. No one finds fault with the honorable gentleman for testing his design in the construction of ship building, but I do think he has not acted judiciously in foisting this tug on his friends in the government.

Before closing take the liberty of pointing out to the owners of the boat how she may be made useful, viz, by adding one-fourth of her length to her midship section.
