

Interesting Reports At Approved Flock Meeting

The Prince Edward Island Approved Flock Association held their annual dinner meeting last evening in St. Mark's Church Hall, Kensington. Major W. J. Andrew, president, conducted the meeting.

Over sixty poultry breeders from various parts of the Province participated in the general discussion. Mr. S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture extended greetings to the group from the Provincial Department of Agriculture. He stated that the reported outlook in the industry is favorable especially in the first half of the year. Mr. Wright went on to point out how the consumption of poultry meats had increased. In 1943 the per capita poultry meat consumption was 22.85 lbs. compared with 29.70 lbs. in 1955.

The supervising fieldman of the Canadian Department of Agriculture, Mr. B.W. MacPherson, gave the hatchery report for Prince Edward Island. It is interesting to note that during the year ending March 31, 1956 approximately one hundred and thirty thousand chicks were hatched.

Other speakers were Mr. Edward MacGougan, Department of Agriculture who reported that approximately twenty eight thousand and birds were blood tested this year. Dr. George Fisher, director of Veterinary Services gave a brief report on the disease picture in the Province. He also stressed the importance of good poultry management.

Mr. S.C. Scranton stressed the production of quality eggs while Mr. F.M. Nash referred to the co-operation within the industry.

Mr. Eric Armstrong of F. W. Bray Hatcheries, Hamilton, Ont., expressed his appreciation for the excellent results their supply for flocks on the island had been producing. In discussing the broiler industry he stated that they require a white feathered bird.

After considerable discussion on hatchery operations, R.O.P. breed flock policy the following slate of officers were elected: President, Irving Tweedy, Vernon; Secretary, F.M. Nash, Department of Agriculture; vice president, Don MacLeod, Montague, R. R. 3.

Directors, Prince County, Alton Ramsay, Alvin MacLean, Lloyd Cameron, Queens County, Irving Tweedy, Gregory Mulligan, Kings County, Don MacLeod.

Introduced by the retiring president, Brenton Clark, Mayor Wm A. Currie briefly addressed the meeting and extended civic greetings to those in attendance.

Ice Delays Lake Shipping

SAULT STE. Marie, Mich. (AP) Lakes freighters moved slowly through slushy ice in the Soo locks Wednesday as an east wind threatened to blow the ice pack back into the narrows of the St. Marys river.

More than 85 boats were locked through in a 24-hour period. Vessels had some trouble making the passage during the night when sub-freezing temperatures tightened up ice in the channel.

The east wind eased pressure at the locks but the coast guard kept a close watch on the ice pack in case it should be pushed back in the upper St. Marys. More than 150 freighters were locked in by ice last week.

In his report as manager of the co-operative B. MacNeve said that during the past five years this co-operative has had sales of 2 million dollars with net saving of \$67,800. He said that more than \$1,000,000 of these sales had been in groceries, and almost \$300,000 was egg sales. He announced that the Summerside Co-Op was operating entirely on the share capital of its members, and was in a very healthy financial position. Mr. MacNeve suggested that a committee be set up to study plans for expansion of the Summerside Co-Op in the near future.

day of February, 1956, at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum on the balance from time to time remaining unpaid; the first payment of interest and interest to be made on the 31st day of January, 1957, and thereafter on the 31st day of January in each year.

SPRING PARK

The eight-room school now within the boundaries of the recommended district shall be transferred and vested in duly elected trustees of the district, subject of their assuming \$2,895.25, being the unpaid balance of the old Spring Park Debentures, repayable according to their tenor.

The amounts allocated to each newly created school district takes care of the total Capital indebtedness of the Division after the \$50,000.00 grant has been applied thereon; and is considered by the Commission to be a fair and just division of that Capital Debt.

Our conclusions were arrived at after taking into consideration the capital and other benefits accruing to the various districts and the allocation of the Fifty Thousand Dollar Grant, recommended by us for excess capital costs of new school facilities provided under Division administration.

Each of the newly created districts should be relieved of any obligations relative to the existing capital debt over and above the amount assigned to them.

LIQUIDATING OF CAPITAL INDEBTEDNESS.

The outstanding debentures of St. Avar's, Parkdale, and Spring Park are held by the Teachers' Superannuation Fund, and these shall be paid by the districts to whom they are assigned according to their tenor.

The \$140,000 outstanding of the Bonded Indebtedness of the Division consists of 3 1/2 per cent Serial Bonds maturing annually as follows: Feb. 1, 1957 - \$7,500; Feb. 1, 1958 - 7,500; Feb. 1, 1959 - 8,000; Feb. 1, 1960 - 8,500; Feb. 1, 1961 - 8,500; Feb. 1, 1962 - 8,500; Feb. 1, 1963 - 9,000; Feb. 1, 1964 - 9,500; Feb. 1, 1965 - 9,500; Feb. 1, 1966 - 10,000; Feb. 1, 1967 - 10,000; Feb. 1, 1968 - 10,500; Feb. 1, 1969 - 10,500; Feb. 1, 1970 - 11,000; Feb. 1, 1971 - 11,500; total \$140,000.

The Commission considered the possibility of liquidating the whole issue and asking the districts concerned to arrange their own financing for the amounts allocated to them.

This solution was abandoned because it was found that the Bond Issue was non-callable and in any event would have entailed much higher interest charges.

ADMINISTRATION

In view of the non-callable nature of the Bond Issue, it will be necessary that some form of Division administration be maintained during the life of the issue. After the present year's operations are wound up and the new school districts functioning, it does not seem reasonable that the present system of administration be continued. We, therefore, recommend that under the authority given the Minister of Education by the School Act, respecting the continuance and constitution of the Division Trustee Board, he appoint an official of the Department of Education as the sole trustee for School Division No. 1 with authority to receive and collect all amounts payable by the newly created districts in respect to the outstanding capital liabilities allocated to them.

It is also recommended that the Government pay to such trustee the Fifty Thousand Dollar Grant.

We recommend that this amount be placed in Temporary Loan Certificates of the Province of Prince Edward Island which yields a rate similar to that borne by the outstanding bonds. The trustee should withdraw annually from this Fund the difference between the amounts due by the several districts for Principal and Interest, and the amount required to service the issue.

FIRST PAYMENT

The first payment of interest, \$2,275, becomes due and payable on August 1st, 1956. The new districts will not have had sufficient time to organize and collect taxes by that date. Unless some other means can be found to take care of this year's interest be borrowed by the trustee from the Fifty Thousand Dollar Grant, and restored when the annual payments are made by the districts.

It would appear that this procedure would have to be followed each year during the term of the bonds. In order to equalize the interest position, the fifty thousand dollar grant will have to bear interest as and from the first day of February, 1956, at 3 1/4% until actually deposited, and this additional amount should be paid to the trustee.

The organization of the several newly created districts should be proceeded with as soon as possible in accordance with the School Act. An Interim Statement for the year ending June 30th, 1956, as submitted by the Division Secretary, shows an anticipated deficit of \$7,000.00 which should be materially reduced, if not entirely liquidated, by the collection of tax arrears totalling approximately \$11,000.00.

The allocation of the surplus or deficit arising from the year's current receipts and expenditures can only be arrived at when the actual result of the year's operation is known and this will be the subject of a supplemental recommendation, if required.

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—Industrial issues held losses ranging over two points at the close of moderately active trading Wednesday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges. A few firm spots were evident.

BA Oil traded briskly as the price fluctuated through a two-point range. The issue showed a loss of 3/4 on the day. Trans Mountain slipped a point in the pipelines.

In a mixed base metal group, Noranda dropped 2 1/2 points and Aluminum 1 1/2 while Hudson Bay showed a 1 1/4 point advance. Atlas climbed 1 point in the steels but Stelco and Algoma were major fractional losers.

Papers moved to lower levels as Abitibi lost a point and Price Brothers 1/2. Canadian Breweries dropped 1 point to lead the decline in the beverages. Utilities and farm implements were easier. Prices were mixed in active trading in the mines. New Jacquet, Mogador, Bouscadiac and New Formaque were five to 25 cents higher. Western oils were shaded in quiet trading.

Industrial volume was 95,400 shares and mines 1,982,300.

The stock exchange's closing averages show banks up 0.04 at 56.57, utilities off 0.2 at 136.1, industrials off 1.4 at 317.1, combined off 1.0 at 256.8, papers off 14.31 at 1558.02 and golds up 0.31 at 87.69.

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Moderate demand for railroads and motors helped to brace the stock market Wednesday, but at the close it was thoroughly mixed and leaning lower.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 10 cents at \$187.90. That was a result of a loss of 50 cents in the industrial component, a gain of 50 cents in rails, while utilities backed down 30 cents.

Business amounted to 2,270,000 shares as compared with 2,500,000 shares traded in Tuesday's lower market.

Pennsylvania Railroad was the day's most active issue up 3-4 at 27 on 58,700 shares.

Canadian issues on the New York exchange were mixed. Hudson Bay Mining added 1 1/4 and Hiram Walker gained 3/4. Canadian Pacific and Distillers Seagram both lost 1/4. International Nickel fell 1/4. McIntyre dropped 1/2 and Aluminum lost 1.

Canadian stocks were also mixed on the American exchange. Loblaw B advanced 2, Canadian Marconi, Shawinigan and Preston East Dome all moved up 1/4 and Eureka was up 1-16. Far Oil and Great Sweet Grass Oil both fell 1-16 and Sapphire Petroleum dropped 1/4.
