

# Will Settle Final Details For Big Smelter In N.B.

FREDERICTON (CP) — Final negotiations for electric power to operate a multi-million dollar manganese smelter near Woodstock, N.B., are expected to open here next week between officials of Stratmat Ltd. and the New Brunswick electric power commission.

C. Hedley Forbes, NBEPCC vice-chairman, said Friday officials of the Montreal mining firm will arrive in the New Brunswick capital to disclose their power requirements for the \$20,000,000 smelter, first in the province.

No definite date for the meeting has been set.

Stratmat manganese holdings, estimated at 150,000,000 tons, are located a few miles northeast of Woodstock in Western New Brunswick.

Mr. Forbes said it was not known "how much power they will want." A heavy power line was extended into the company holdings earlier this year and "can

carry all the power they'll need," Mr. Forbes added.

**STEAM PLANTS POSSIBLE**

He said it was possible one or more new steam generating plants might have to be built.

"We are in the final stage of negotiations," he said.

Premier Hugh John Fleming announced in May the company planned construction of a 1,800-ton refinery with a labor force of between 350 and 500 men.

Mr. Forbes reaffirmed the premier's prediction that the smelter will go into operation next year.

The Woodstock Sentinel Press Friday quoted Stratmat chief engineer M. A. Twidale of Montreal as saying the provincial government had assured the firm adequate and low-cost power would be available.

He described large quantities of cheap power as "the key to our operations."

Stratmat, a subsidiary of the Strategic Materials Corporation, would probably process about 75,000 tons of manganese and 60,000 tons of iron annually.

Processing is at present done in a Niagara Falls, Ont., plant.

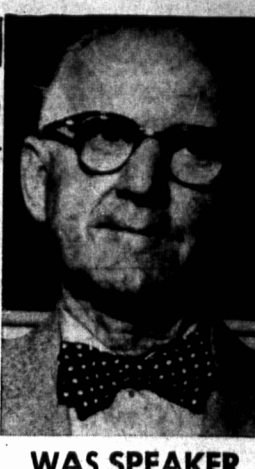
Other speakers at the morning session were Mr. Kenneth Parker, Sister Mary Henry and Mr. Walter Baker.

# Queen Square Home & School Ass'n. Annual Meeting Held

The annual meeting of the Queen Square Home & School Association was held in the auditorium of Rochford Square School on Wednesday evening, 3 October. Due to the regretted illness of the president, Mrs. Alex MacIsaac, the vice-president Mr. Reginald MacDonald conducted the meeting.

After the reading of the minutes a general discussion took place regarding the vitamin capsule distribution which was conducted last year. It was the general opinion that these pills had been of great benefit to the health of the boys and it was deemed important and desirable that this project should again be carried out. The method of financing these pills was left to the incoming executive.

Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonald in addressing the parents spoke of the overcrowded conditions in Queen Square School which now has almost 900 pupils with over 40 in several classes. He explained that last year's staggering classes had now been avoided by acquiring some other accommodation and by splitting the auditorium into 4 classrooms as a temporary measure. Due to several factors the first grade each year has many more boys than the outgoing tenth so that the increase will continue for several years. As a consequence to the change there

is no place of assembly for the place in the school for a Home and School meeting. The problem of future meetings would have to be met by the next executive.

Father Edmund Roche of Saint Dunstan's University gave a most interesting and informative talk on the value of a college education, what the aim of a college education should be and gave particular stress to the way Saint Dunstan's University educates its students. Father Roche spoke with the eloquence of a man enthused with his subject and it is hoped he will return with another talk in the not-too-distant future.

Further action on plans for the urgently needed sewer and water system for this area will be deferred, pending this meeting.
