

# Tignish Fishermen Hear Talk On Lobster Industry

Dr. D. G. Wilder, Atlantic Biological Station, St. Andrews, N. B., speaking at a well attended meeting of lobster fishermen at Tignish last night, stressed the importance of the industry to the Maritime Provinces and suggested that fishermen give some thought to a means of eliminating the difficulties and cost of enforcing the present system of fourteen different seasons in the Maritimes.

By means of colored slides Dr. Wilder described the growth of the lobster from the egg stage to maturity and also showed a number of new metal traps presently being experimented with. He admitted that more research is necessary before metal traps can be manufactured and used economically. He explained how the movement and growth of lobsters is recorded by means of tagging and said that the average distance moved by tagged lobsters is less than two miles and that short lobsters increase about fifty percent in weight each year. During the question period Dr. Wilder stated that the reason for the generally smaller run of lobsters along the North Shore of P. E. I. was yearly over catching. Two films "Trappers Of The Sea" and "Seine Netting" were shown. Chairman of the meeting was Harold Cormier of Tignish.

Lester Johnston, Charlottetown, L. J. Murphy, Summerside, R. D. McKinnon and Elmore MacKay of Alberton, and Russell Perry, Tignish, all of the Department of Fisheries, attended the meeting.

A similar meeting will be held in the Alberton Legion Hall tonight.

# Death of Mrs. Vernon Matthew

The death occurred on Saturday, March 26th, at the Prince County Hospital of Mrs. Vernon Matthew of Summerside. She was 74 years of age. Mr. and Mrs. Matthew were married fifty-two years ago on August 14th last.

The funeral was held from her late residence on Tuesday afternoon with service at 2:30 p.m. conducted by Rev. J. Donald MacKay. Interment was in the Peoples Cemetery. Pall bearers were Messrs. J. F. Arnett, W. E. Forbes, Ben Sharpe, George MacInnis, Frank Platts, and Dr. J. A. MacMurdo.—S.

# Short Course In Sheep Husbandry Concludes Today

A highly successful three-day short course in sheep husbandry, sponsored by the Provincial Department of Agriculture and conducted by Keith Clay, Prince County field man, concludes today at the home of Claude Barrett, Springfield, where the flock of 22 sheep belonging to Mr. Irving Haslam, of Springfield, have been made available for shearing demonstrations and for shearing practice.

The shearing demonstrations were given by Mr. James Mundy of the Canada Department of Agriculture and assisted by Mr. Bob Pierce of the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

This is the first short course of this kind held on the Island, and has been highly successful in teaching some of the junior sheep breeders the latest methods in shearing and packaging of wool.

Yesterday Mr. S. B. Williams, superintendent, from the Experimental Station, Nappan, Nova Scotia, gave talks on all phases of sheep husbandry.

Those attending the course include: Grant Graham, Montague, R.R. 4; Jack T. Doyle, Charlottetown; Ivan Bowness, Norboro; George Arsenault, Mount Carmel; John D. Duggan, Crawford Sinclair, and Irving Haslam of Springfield; Archie Arsenault, Abram's Village, and Henry W. Wedge, Summerside.

Because of the interest shown in these demonstrations, the Provincial Department of Agriculture plans on conducting a similar course next year, but on a much larger scale.
