Mayor Walter Cox and members of the city council will present parchment scrolls signifying the title "Freeman of the City of Charlottetown," on the celebrated Canadian comedians, Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster in a unique ceremony today on the Grafton Street Plaza of Confederation Centre.

It is understood members of the cast of their production "Wayne and Shuster in Charlottetown" will be introduced to the public from the podium during the ceremonies, believed the first ever undertaken in Charlottetown during its 200-year history.

In their international television shows Johnny and Frank have referred with affection time and again to their interest in Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island and its symbol of unity as a heritage of the Confederation meetings in 1864.

Their show "Wayne and Shuster in Charlottetown" opens a national tour in Montreal, Sept. 1 under the title "An Evening with Wayne and Shuster."

SITUATION BRIGHTER TODAY

Action By Cattlemen Wipes Out Steer Sale

There is some encouraging news this morning for steer owners who pulled their animals out of an auction sale in the Coliseum at the Exhibition Grounds Tuesday when they became disgusted with prices offered by the three buyers present.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae told The Guardian his Department is offering a bonus of 10 cents per pound to the grand champion steer of the show, five cents per pound to the reserve champion and two cents per pound each to the next eight steers in the show. There are 13 animals in all, so this will cover most of the animals.

Commenting on his minister's announcement, Deputy Minister S. C. Wright said "We hope this will serve to encourage the beef men to continue producing the kind of stuff you saw in the ring." He termed the steers a fine lot of animals, well finished for market. So did Glen Cotton, provincial beef fieldman.

The Co-op Supermarket had paid 48 cents per pound—and that is dressed or carcass weight—for the grand champion steer

of the show. Canada Packers had bid 45 cents for the reserve grand champion and three other steers had been sold when Leo McIsaac, Mermaid, refused to sell his steer. The group of men quickly moved their steers out of the sale area and gathered in the middle of the Coliseum to plan action.

IF MORE THOUGHT...

The result was that the steer owners voted to sell their animals on rail grade prices to Canada Packers, but two of the breeders told The Guardian several hours later "If we had thought in time, we would have taken the lot of steers out of the arena and shipped them to the Abattoir at Halifax, N.S."

It's been a long time since a group of cattlemen were so bitter about prices offered their top quality animals at an auction sale.

They were comparing the offering price of 48 cents per pound dressed weight, for a grand champion, with the \$1.10 received live weight for Jim Cudmore's grand champion at the Easter Beef Show and Sale earlier this year, and with the \$2.00 per pound paid at Halifax last November, for example, for

the champion of the Atlantic Winter Fair.

The action of the cattlemen wiped out the auction completely and the steers were later sold to Canada Packers here for \$48.25 per hundredweight for Red brand carcasses, \$42.00 for Blues and \$42.00 for Standards.

Swifts had offered \$44.00 for Reds, \$43.00 for Blues and \$42.00 for Standards, but the cattlemen voted to sell their steers to the local plant.

A spokesman for the Co-op here said later the store is purchasing the steers from the local packing plant.

SHORTHORN TOPS

J. C. (Bill) Bennett, Fredericton placed the animals alive yesterday and a white Shorthorn steer owned by Mr. Justice R. E. Bell was on top of the class.

A Cyrus Eaton Shorthorn steer was second, Mack Dixon, Clyde River, got in for third with an Angus Judge Bell had another steer in fourth—Otto Newson, Winsloe was fifth and Leo McIsaac was sixth.

But 82 points out of the 100 are awarded for judging on the carcass. The champions and other placements will probably be known late Thursday or early Friday.

A Holstein cow that had placed fourth in the aged class for Dickie Brothers, Truro, N.S., won the inter-breed best uddered cow class yesterday afternoon at the Provincial Exhibition.

A Guernsey cow, Patrice Roberts, owned by J. Eric Hurry, West Royalty, was second and Jersey cow, Warren Grove Maid's Lynn, was third for J.S. Vickerson and Sons, North River.

A Holstein cow owned by Oswald J. Newson and Son, Kingston, was fourth and an Ayrshire cow, owned by A. MacRae and Son, Sherwood, was fifth.

The class was judged by J.C. N.B. and Stewart Eagles, Canada Department of Agriculture, Moncton, N.B.

The inter-breed class for the best uddered cow is an innovation here in Charlottetown. It is a part of the schedule under the Harry Hays formula.

There was varied comment on the Hays formula yesterday, but most of the comments were favorable.

Farm Loss Estimated Near \$8,000

KENSINGTON — The Kensington Fire Department responded to a call to French River about 11 o'clock Monday night when neighbors reported that the main barn on the farm of the late Allison MacLeod was on fire.

The call came too late to save the building which was completely destroyed along with two smaller buildings.

The farm house and the smaller buildings were saved and the danger of fire spreading into the nearby woods was averted by the firemen.

Destroyed with the buildings was a hammer mill, a large quantity of hay, and all the stable equipment used in a modern barn. The loss is unofficially estimated at \$7,000 to \$8,000.

The house is unoccupied and the barn was used by Alvin MacLeod, son of the late owner.

Storm Damage In Kings

The electrical storm, which struck Prince Edward Island Monday evening was more severe in the southeastern area of the island than elsewhere.

The storm blew out three transformers on the Commercial Road at Peters Road and power was not restored in that area for about 12 hours.

A house belonging to Daniel MacLeod at Murray Harbor was struck. A small fire started in one of the gables but it was quickly extinguished by the heavy rains that accompanied the thunder and lightning.
