Sudden Death Yesterday Of Well-Known Local Dentist

Stricken in the early hours of yesterday morning while on a fishing trip to North Lake, in the eastern end of the Province, Dr. H. M. MacKenzie, highly regarded dentist of this city, died while his fishing companion Hugh (Tuddy) MacKinnon of the Charlottetown Police force was hurrying him to a doctor in Souris. Upon arrival at Dr. Kasner's office, it was found that Dr. MacKenzie had passed away probably twenty minutes before the arrival of the car in Souris. Dr. MacKenzie and his companion had left Charlottetown about six o'clock on Tuesday evening and they were preparing breakfast at Tuddy MacKinnon's cabin at North Lake, about 3.20 a. m. when the Doctor's sudden attack occurred.

Mr. MacKinnon realized at once that the attack was a serious one and insisted that the fishing trip be abandoned. Dr. MacKenzie objected, and for a brief period he did recover, walked around, and said he felt much better. However, a second attack occurred, and then a third, and the Doctor was persuaded to leave for Souris.

A man without pretensions, modest, competent in his profession, he was "Gus" to his many friends. His friendships were the sort that mellowed and became stronger with the years. He had the faculty of mingling easily and pleasantly with all types of people. He was respected by his fellow dentists and his simplicity and unassuming way earned commendation and liking.

Dr. MacKenzie had three chief interests, his family, his friends and his ardent love of fishing and hunting. To his family he gave his devotion, to his friends, fellowship and a generous understanding, and to his avowed recreation of fishing and hunting, any spare time that his professional duties would allow. He loved the streams and rivers of the Island and the woodlands of his native Province, Nova Scotia, where he was born at Westville, more than fifty years ago. He would have been fifty-four years old on June 1.

Yearly he returned to Nova Scotia for the shooting season and came back with his quota of deer. His friends always knew that he had returned

when they received a choice deer steak or sizeable roast. He took his early education at Mt. Allison University and later graduated in dentistry from the John Hawkins Dental College, Baltimore, Maryland, in 1932.

He had a long and honourable military record with the Canadian Army in the second world war. He left this Province to join the Canadian Dental Corp in the Spring of 1940. He served in England, Italy, France, Holland and Belgium. He made the long trip from Italy by way of southern France to the battlefields of northwest Europe. He was discharged in August 1946, with the rank of Captain. Dr. Loyola Duffy, a fellow dentist of this city, spoke of his military record and of his later career in high terms, when he learned of his death. He described the late Dr. MacKenzie as a fine character with no enemies, highly regarded in his profession, with a most likeable personality.

In his earlier years and while still going to college, Dr. MacKenzie was a fine ball player, first as a member of the old north end Rovers, in the very successful Charlottetown, City league of that time, and later as

a member of that Abegweit team which won the New Brunswick-P. E. Island title. He was a member of the United Services Officers Club, and the Charlottetown Curling Club. Mourning his loss are his wife, the former Helen MacMillan of this city, two children, Elizabeth age sixteen, and Helen age ten. Also among the immediate relatives are his brother Ian of Copper Cliff, Ontario, who is expected to arrive in Charlottetown on Friday night; his father, Major J. A. MacKenzie, and his step-mother, Mrs. J. A. MacKenzie. Major MacKenzie is presently confined to hospital.

Farewell addresses were read expressing the esteem in which the young couple are held in Picton. The gratitude of those present for the help given the community by Mr. and Mrs. Cutcliffe was shown in the presentation of a lovely lounge chair and a floor lamp. Present for the occasion and speaking briefly was William Fox, associate director of Extension in the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Heavy Docket In Police Court

An accused was sentenced Wednesday to 20 days in Queen's County Jail on an old commitment when he was apprehended by city police yesterday.

The 40-year-old City resident appeared in court on a drunk and incapable charge on Tuesday morning and was given a 20 day sentence with a two-hour hold clause in order that he could get out of the City.

The accused, however, failed to take the opportunity and was taken in by city police again during the afternoon.

A 38-year-old Dorchester Street man, was given a 20-day sentence when he appeared before Magistrate K.M. Martin in City Police Court this morning.

The accused was arrested by City Police on the complaint of his father.

The above two charges of drunk and incapable were part of the docket of five such charges to appear in court yesterday.

A Moncton man, was given one hour to get out of the City or he would be sent to Queens County Jail for a 20-day period. It was noted in court that the accused had just finished a 30-day sentence. Like the previous two cases he appeared on a drunk and incapable charge.

Others appearing on similar charges were a 48-year-old resident of Roseberry, P.E.I., who was ordered to pay \$20 and costs or 10 days and a 40-year-old of no fixed address. The latter's case was dismissed.

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Road-e-o Will Be Held In Charlottetown May 24

The annual Road-e-o sponsored by the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade will be held this year on May 24.

By offering specific rewards to those who can qualify for national and regional honors, the sponsor hope to promote safe driving among teenagers of this Province.

The driving tests will be held on the Market Square at 2.00 p. m. and will be judged by members of the City Police, RCMP and members of the Motor Vehicle Branch. The participants will also be required to write examinations on the morning of the road-e-o.

MUST BE UNDER 20

To qualify, the contestants must not have reached their 20th birthday before July 10th, be in possession of a driver's license and have not had any moving traffic violations during the past six months.

The winner will receive a trophy and an all expense paid trip to the Regional finals in Halifax, June 7th. The National Finals will be held in Medicine Hat, Alberta on July 10 in which the qualifying contestants will compete for \$1,750 worth of Scholarships.

Entry blanks will be published in The Patriot and Guardian on May 10th, and can also be obtained from any member of the Junior Board of Trade or Earl Ross, General Chairman of the Road-e-o.
