### ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

The Boston Transcript tells its readers that "from several points of views the Laurier Government just now is in a tight place." It will soon be in the tightest place that has been.

Montreal Star: From what happened in the Yukon country we can form an opinion of the state of demoralization the Dominion would be in if the Laurier-Tarte-Blair Government had had the task of organizing the whole city service of Canada.

Summerside Journal: We entirely agree with the suggestion that the present vacancy on the Summerside School Board should be filled by the appointment of a lady trustee. If this is done, we venture to say that the result will be so satisfactory that the ladies will be represented on the Board for all time to come, which would be a matter of right justice and fair play.

Mail and Empire: Sir Hibbert Tupper may well ask why the government has not taken measures to probe the Yukon scandals. In 1896 Mr. Sifton employed Pinkerton detectives to hunt for ballot box frauds in Manitoba, and charge them against the Conservatives. The detective and the legal expenses, which enriched certain partisan lawyers, including Mr. Sifton's cousin and Mr. Wade, one of the Yukon officials, cost the country \$100,000 odd, and no violation of the law was discovered. When it is charged, not by politicians but by independent observers, that wrong is done in the mining region, why should there be a falling off in the activity of the averaging Minister? It might not be desirable to employ detectives against officers who are not opponents; but surely the allegations should be probed with a desire, not to hide the truth, but, on the contrary, to find it.

Official figures referring to Germany's foreign trade for February show that imports and exports were larger than ever before. To think the United States and Canada are not alone in the boom.

Some striking facts about the British navy are attracting attention. The year 1899 will be unique in British records, for not only will the personnel reach 110,640 men, twice as many as ten years ago, but no fewer than fifty warships of different types will enter the navy, ready to hoist the pennant for action. These include the five great battleships—Albion, Canopus, Glory, Goliath and Ocean, totalling 54,750 tons, and costing £5,000,000; fourteen protected cruisers, and thirty-one unprotected ships. Moreover, six new armoured ships will be begun, making a total of 32 armoured vessels, 17 protected vessels, and 49 unarmoured vessels, completing, advancing, or beginning. That is 1899 will see the stupendous number of 98 British warships under construction, representing an outlay of \$175,000,000.

Referring to April fool's day, the Mail and Empire says that Mr. Sydney Fisher is responsible for the best April fool trick on record, over which the prohibitionists are now shaking their sides with uncontrollable laughter and candidly admitting that it is "a good one on them." The amiable Sydney demurely protested his loyalty to prohibition, and lured his earnest co-workers in the good cause into a sense of satirical security as to the Government's action on the plebiscite by his talk and resignation. To day they are discovering what a sad joker the Minister of Agriculture really is, and what a fine string of "poissons d'Avril" he has made of them, and they chuckle over the undeniably delightful sense of humor they now know he possesses. When he reaches London as Lord High Commissioner for Canada the laugh will, however, be on his side.

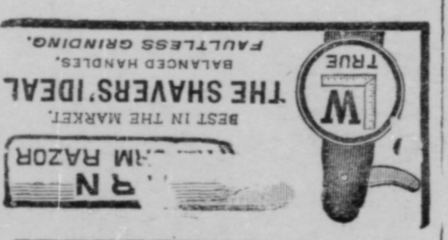

### CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

#### A Drop in Eggs - Prices of Other Produce Unchanged.

Since last report the price of eggs has dropped a cent, the buyers quoting them at 9c yesterday. The price of potatoes ranges from 35 to 40c, with not a great many moving. What oats are being brought to town bring about 34c per bushel. Pork, by the carcass, ranges in price from 4 1/2 to 5c. There are a good many live hogs coming in. Mr. Rattenbury is paying 4c for bacon and heavy fats.

### THE PROVISION MARKET

#### Dressed Hogs Weaker - Other Lines Quiet - Chicago Steady.

The Montreal market was quiet for all lines, but prices rule steady. We quote: Canadian pork, in barrels, \$15 to \$15.50; pure Canadian pork, in pails, 6c to 7c per lb., and compound refined at 5c to 5 1/2c per lb. Hams, 10c to 12c, and bacon, 10 1/2c to 11c per pound.

The market was weaker for frozen stock, owing to increased offerings and milder weather, and prices show a decline of 25c per 100 lbs., with sales at \$5 and \$5.25 in a jobbing way. Fresh killed stock are fetching \$5.75 to \$6 per 100 lbs.

There was little change in the Chicago provision market. Pork closed \$9 April; \$9 1/2 May; \$9 27 1/2 July; lard, \$5 25 April; \$5 27 1/2 May; \$6 42 1/2 July; \$5 55 September; short ribs, \$4 65 April; \$4 75 May; \$4 87 1/2 July; \$5 September.

### Yukon Administration.

The reforms demanded and urged are:

1. Abolition of the royalty on the gross output and reduction of the royalty on the net to two or five per cent.
2. Abolition of Crown reservation of alternate claims.
3. That actions of claims shall not be held by Government officials, but shall be open for re-location or held by the Crown.
4. No official of the Government shall be allowed to stake, buy or hold claims.
5. No miner shall be deprived of his rights because he has located a claim which has proved worthless, but shall be permitted to locate a new claim.
6. No miner shall be required to record a claim while yet acting as a prospector.
7. Each claim shall be located with four corner posts, marked with l. c. and n. c., so that any person may know that it is recorded.
8. A set of regulations not subject to a different interpretation every month.
9. A court of appeal from the Gold Commissioner's decisions without carrying the case to Ottawa.
10. Improvement of the mail service.
11. Removal of every official except E. C. Senkler and appointment of honest and efficient men at appropriate salaries which will make them independent of bribes, dabbling in claims, etc.
12. Expenditure of local revenue in improvement of the sanitary condition of Dawson, of the trails, etc.
