Members of the specialist navigation course from R.C.A.F. Cape Bretoner Returns To Prince Co. Jail

"Be it ever so humble there's no place like Prince County Jail" — or so it would appear in view of the fact that at least one of frequent residents seems to prefer its comforts to that of the "outside."

A resident of Cape Breton Island, who has been in and out of Prince County Jail for the last several months, finished serving a six months sentence this week for entering a number of Summerside homes and causing considerable excitement in the Hanover and King Street areas.

Upon his release from jail on Tuesday of this week two officials took him by car to Amherst, N.S., where they pointedly suggested he continue on his way to his home in Cape Breton. On Thursday afternoon Summerside police, in response to a complaint about a drunk vagrant on the business section of Water Street, arrived at the scene and were not unduly surprised to find the "deported" Cape Bretoner ready and willing to accompany the police back to his "old home" in the jail.

Yesterday morning Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., assured him the hospitality of the Province for the winter by committing him to the Prince County Jail for six months.

At the same court sitting, a Summerside man who was with the above mentioned prisoner at the time of his arrest was given three months for vagrancy.—S

Discuss Possible Use Of Mayor's Rink Fund

In the Town Hall Summerside last evening a meeting was held of the contributors to the Mayor's Rink Fund.

The object of the meeting was to consider suggestions as to what should be done with the accumulated balance of \$6,518.36 now standing to the credit of the fund. This fund was started about two years ago by Mayor Henry Wedge with the idea of collecting by voluntary contributions and by other projects, a sum sufficient to at least begin the erection of a rink at Summerside.

Authority was granted at that time by the Town Council to create the Mayor's Rink Fund, and for some time contributions from individuals and from the proceeds of projects sponsored by various organizations were added to the fund.

One of the conditions of the fund at the time of its origin was that "in the event of any individual or group undertaking the erection of a rink independently while a proposed community drive was in progress, it would be understood that any funds on hand at such time would be used in the promotion of some other community youth project."

In view of the fact that the officials of the Summerside Raceway Association are now constructing an up-to-date rink in Summerside, the question of how the fund would be used should, in the opinion of the mayor, be given consideration. Last night's meeting was productive of many suggestions but it was felt that no decision could be arrived at until every possible suggestion available was brought in.

The meeting was adjourned on procedure be appointed by the chair in time to report at the next meeting which will be held after the holiday season ends.

- (1) To form the basis of a fund to erect a swimming pool in Summerside.

Decline Noted In Living Costs

OTTAWA, (CP) — Ending a steady, five-month rise, living costs declined during October, with the consumer price index dropping by one-half point to 116.2 from 116.7.

The decline was due almost entirely to food price drops, the bureau of statistics reported today. The consumer price index is based on 1949 prices equaling 100.

Egg prices dropped sharply, along with most meats and grapes, fruit, being 2.1 points from the food column which dropped to 113.4 from 115.5.

The shelter column rose to a new high of 125 from 124.5 reflecting higher rents and home ownership costs.

The miscellaneous column, called "other commodities and services" also edged ahead by one-tenth of a point to 116.3 from 116, with the price of theatre admission tickets increasing.

Let's Talk It Over

There is a rather arresting article in the latest edition of "The Magpie", (published twice a year by the Summerside High School Commercial Class), dealing with the teaching of Shakespeare. The writer suggests that we stop treating these plays as if they were cadavers to be dissected in a laboratory. In doing this, the writer says, "we blot out the spirit of the real flesh and blood characters the play, and never get to know the real flesh and blood characters Shakespeare created." And further on: "George Bernard Shaw forbade and of his plays to be studied in schools because he didn't want them killed as Shakespeare's were."

The writer concludes by inviting readers of the little magazine to listen to Shakespeare's plays over OBC during the winter months—"not to get higher marks in examinations," she is careful to point out, but "to attune your ears to the greatest language we know, and make you all more aware of the heights and depths of the human spirit." A thousand "amens", say we.

We sincerely believe that the time is over-ripe for a new approach in the schools to the study of literature. It is no secret that, with rare exceptions, high school students regard literature, like a lot of other subjects of the school curriculum, as a necessary evil. Whatever be the truth about algebra, geography, etc., there is no question but that one must study literature with the heart. The fragile beauties created by the masters of our English tongue rub off like the sheen on the wings of butterflies with careless handling.

NEW YORK, (AP)—New York's newspaper strike continued Friday with no change in negotiations. The strike began a week ago.

Publishers of six major Manhattan dailies and striking photo-engravers conferred fruitlessly with federal mediators for a solution to the wage dispute.

Not Criticising Radio Advertising In General Says Bureau Director

OTTAWA, (CP)—D. Leo Dolan, director of the Canadian Government Travel Bureau, said Wednesday he was not criticizing radio advertising in general when he told the federal-provincial tourist conference Monday that "you can't sell travel by radio."

Mr. Dolan was referring Monday to a 13-week program on the CBC last spring and winter urging Canadians to visit their national parks. He said the program, produced at a cost of \$44,000, resulted in only 383 inquiries.

Mr. Dolan told the final session of the conference Wednesday that radio has done a "wonderful job" in Canada in the advertising field but "up to date has not been beneficial in promoting travel." It was not correct, he said, to interpret his statement as a general criticism of radio as an advertising medium.

Ch'town Air Cadets To Visit S'side

—120 cadets from No. 83 Summerside Squadron and No. 60 Charlottetown Squadron Royal Canadian Air Cadets, accompanied by 10 officers and instructors will visit R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside today as part of their squadron training, and providing weather conditions are favorable familiarization flights in two Dakota aircraft will be carried out, in flights scheduled for 60-minute periods.

During this part of the itinerary 20 minutes will be utilized for briefing and fitting harness; 30 minutes for flight; and 10 minutes for de-briefing and handing in the safety equipment.
