CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. NORTH: K764, A Q J 10, K Q 5, J 5. WEST: 10 9 5 2, K 7 5, 7 3, 9 8 7 6. EAST: A Q, 9 6 4 2, J 9 8 4, Q 10 2. SOUTH: A J 8 3, 8 3, A 10 2, A K 4 2.

The German declarer would have made the contract had he led down at this point had he led the ace of hearts. But misjudging the setup, and under the delusion that West's four cards consisted of 10 9 and K-x, South cashed the jack of spades and threw West in the lead with a spade. Unfortunately, West had a club to lead and East took the last two tricks with a diamond and a club to the tune of down two. The pretty scheme South had concocted didn't come off when West's odd card turned out to be a club and not a heart. What declarer could have done after taking the spade ace was to lead a low club towards the jack. Then, if West actually had been dealt K-x-x-x of hearts, he would be bound to run into a squeeze when the clubs and diamonds were cashed.

Supreme Court Job Goes To Halifax Man

OTTAWA (CP) - A 48-year-old Halifax lawyer, Roland A. Ritchie, Friday became the youngest member of the Supreme Court of Canada. Mr. Ritchie was appointed to Canada's top judicial tribunal to fill a post normally regarded as going to the Maritimes - vacated by the April resignation of Mr. Justice Ivan C. Rand, from Moncton, N.B. He is the first vice-president of the Nova Scotia Bar Association and a member of the N.S. council of the Canadian Bar Association. The new justice has never been publicly engaged in politics but he is a known Progressive Conservative. However, he has never run for political office. Canal Bottlenecks Slow Up Shipping

The Great Lakes inland canal system was under fire last week as shipping slowed in canal bottlenecks and harbor jams. The worst pileup was at the Welland Ship Canal entrance at Port Weller, Ont., where 40 ships were at anchor in Lake Ontario waiting to use the first lock. Ships that have already gone through the 27 1/2-mile canal to Lake Erie are finding dock facilities taxed to the limit at Detroit and many have to lineup again in the river channel there. Overseas and Great Lakes shipping officials are complaining about delays. Their criticism includes the recently opened St. Lawrence Seaway. PROTEST TIEUP Upper Lakes Shipping Limited, one of the largest operators of the snub-nosed Great Lakes carriers, protested Thursday to Transport Minister Hees about the Welland Canal tieup. Several of the company's 24 ships have been caught in the bottleneck causing delays up to 36 hours, the company says. Average daily operating cost of the larger lake vessels runs as high as \$1,700. The company, whose vessels are engaged mainly in transportation of ore, coal and grain, said in a statement: "Our company is being pressed by customers, who have been long users of the Welland Canal, for delivery of essential and urgently required raw materials. Our ships are being unduly delayed at Port Weller through the slowness of foreign vessels which, in our opinion, are not properly equipped for efficient navigation."

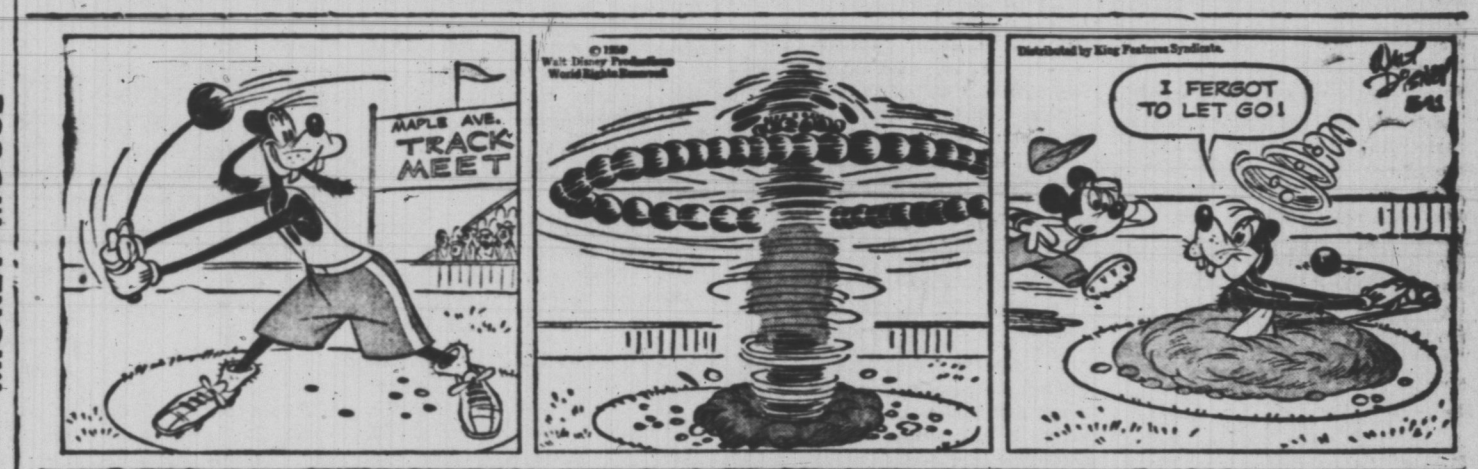
