Faring Badly.

P. E. ISLAND seems to fare badly in the Dominion estimates for 1889-90, says the Patriot of Saturday last.

The truth is, the interests of this Province are suffering for want of proper representation at Ottawa. The error committed by the electors at the last Dominion election was a grievous one, and they must only put up with the consequences until they have an opportunity to rectify the mistake.

In proof of their error, we need only refer to the estimates when this Province was represented at Ottawa by six Conservatives, and not by six Grits, as is unfortunately the case at present.
