Third Try To Rescue Trapped Miners Attempted

HAZLETON, Pa. (AP) — A third try at drilling an escape hole for the three trapped miners was ordered Thursday after the second one failed just as it seemed certain to succeed. Undaunted, rescue crews whined the giant drilling rig as far as a 10-story building into position for another attempt. The rig is 22 feet off toward an underground pocket about 14 feet long and nine feet wide. No one admitted the possibility of failure. "I just know he will come out of this alive," said Mrs. Anna Fellen, whose husband, David, is trapped more than 300 feet underground with Henry Thorne, 28, and Louis Rova, 42. A moment came, however, when morale all but cracked. "I've seen the drill coming on the second hole began bringing up white dust on its return."

To the experts, this meant they had gone past the chamber holding Thorne, but it was a delight to the guerrilla warfare being fought with infiltrating Communist forces. Workers started in disbelief. They had been confident they were going in the right direction and would reach the men about the 330-foot level. One reason for the confidence, as they approached that depth, was that the drill was bringing up black dust—coal dust—and the men were in a pocket of coal. On a nearby hill, overlooking the tense scene, Mrs. Fellen clasped her hands to her mouth when she saw the white dust and turned her back on the operation.

Gordon Smith, deputy secretary of mining, relayed the word to Fellen and Thorne by means of the microphone in the existing six-inch line hole. Rova is about 100 feet away from them, separated by a mass of debris. None of the food and supplies sent to the others through the line hole has reached him, and they last reported contact with him on Tuesday night.

S. Viet Nam as a Horror Quits With Bitter Laughter, Husband Key Crisis Figures



HERE ARE the principals in South Viet Nam's controversy with Buddhist leaders — a delight to the guerrilla warfare being fought with infiltrating Communist forces.

WASHINGTON (AP) — South Viet Nam's ambassador, Tran Van Chuong, resigned Thursday with a bitter denunciation of his homeland's "bad regime" in which his son-in-law and daughter are key figures. "I cannot go on representing a government which ignores my advice and of which I disapprove," said Chuong, 65-year-old member of one of Viet Nam's most distinguished families who has represented his country in Washington for nine years.

Chuong protested against "the surprise raid at night" which the government of President Ngo Dinh Diem ordered against Buddhist opposition. He announced his resignation by telegraphing a cable he sent to Diem. In resigning, Chuong expressed views similar to those the state department "voiced Wednesday with President Kennedy's approval. The department said the resignation action was in direct violation of assurances from the Diem government that it was seeking reconciliation with the Buddhists. Chuong, the resigned ambassador, a Catholic, is the husband of a descendant of Vietnamese royalty, is a Buddhist.
