

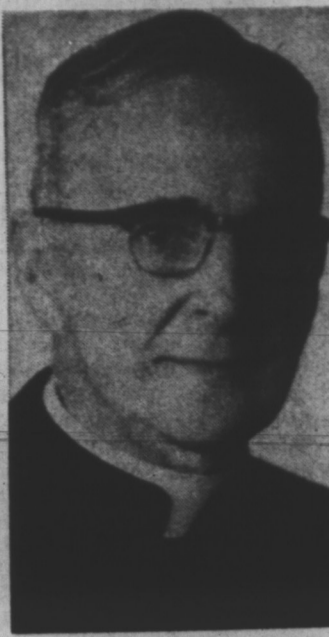
Rev. K.C. MacPherson Dies In City Hospital At Age 89

Rev. Kenneth Chisholm MacPherson, 89, died in the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning following a lengthy illness.

The late Father MacPherson was born at Ugg in 1870, the son of the late Neil MacPherson and Elizabeth McIsaac. He received his early education at Ugg and Charlottetown and taught school for several years before entering SDU where he won acclaim as one of the Island's best athletes.

Graduating from the Grand Seminary in Quebec City he was ordained in the summer of 1903 at St. Joseph's Convent, Charlottetown. The ordination was performed by Most Rev. Charles MacDonald, Bishop of Charlottetown.

Following his ordination Father MacPherson was appointed to St. Dunstan's faculty and after that was on the staff of St. Dunstan's Basilica, until 1905.

In that same year he was appointed as parish priest at St. Margaret's Church, Bear River, a post he held until 1937 when he was transferred to St. Bonaventure's Church in Tracadie.

After retiring from active duties in 1953, Father MacPherson spent his declining years at the Sacred Heart Home in Charlottetown.

Father MacPherson was the last surviving member of a family of nine children. He was predeceased by three sisters and five brothers: Catherine (Mrs. Frank Evans), Great Falls, Montana; Eunice (Mrs. T. M. MacMillan), Charlottetown; Florence (Mrs. P. T. Power), Charlottetown; Daniel, Ugg; Colin, West Roxbury, Mass.; Lauchlin, Portland, Oregon; Dr. John Castor, Alta.; Joseph, Grand Falls, Montana.

His remains will be transferred today from the Charlottetown Funeral Home at 3 p.m. to the Sacred Heart Home where they will lie until 3 p.m. Sunday when they will be taken to St. Bonaventure's Church, Tracadie where they will lie in state.

The funeral will be held Monday morning at Tracadie with Solemn Requiem High Mass being celebrated by Rev. Kenneth McMillan, a nephew of the deceased.

Interment will be in the church cemetery.

DEMANDS ACTION

A demand for immediate action on this project was made by deputy mayor A. Wat'hen Gaudet. He noted that in matters of civic jurisdiction the Council was supreme, and no consideration—not even the royal visit—should be allowed to interfere with the prosecution of this important job.

Unless the raw sewerage now being delivered to the breastwork at the head of Government Pond was picked up and conducted to its final destination before the children of the City started to swim off Victoria Park the Council would be faced with a tremendous outcry on the part of the citizens, the Ward Two representative predicted.

Added protection for the exposed sewer line plus the elimination of a yearly eyesore might be accomplished by building a new breastwork in a slightly curved line from the end of the present reinforced breastwork near Fort Edward to the Sydney Street end of the new naval abutment, Councilor Baker suggested.

Such a venture would not only give the line protection but would also eliminate the normally unsightly and odorous sight between Fort Edward and West Street, he noted.

Council also approved a resolution

tion permitting Aben MacLeod to divide his 142-foot double lot into two lots with frontages four feet short of the minimum recommendations of the Town Planning Committee.

However, a rider attached to the enabling resolution stressed that this permission was not to be considered as establishing a precedent for any future transactions.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 27.

Jet Planes Said 'Noisy'

LONDON (Reuters) — Villagers living on the fringe of London airport plan to rouse a government minister from his bed with protest telephone calls if proposed jet flights by Pan American Airways wake them up.

Transport Minister Harold Wilson, and A. Jackson-Kelly, the airline's European vice-president, are the "victims" chosen by the people of Longford.

"If we are woken up, we'll feel like letting off steam," said William Wood, chairman of the newly-formed Residents' Association.

"We'll telephone them every night if necessary."

A spokesman for the ministry of civil aviation said: "We have no comment except that we have

not given permission for these flights."

But a Pan-American spokesman said: "There is nothing in the book that says we need permission for night flights, although of course if the ministry objects we won't be able to operate them."

Wood said he and 90 per cent of the Longford villagers felt the American airline was taking advantage of British regulations.

"We think it is disgraceful that we should have to put up with the noise when New York airport refuses to allow jets to take off or land there at night."

"The Americans are trying to ride roughshod over us."

The Bishop expressed his pleasure at being present for the first time since his consecration as Bishop. He also spoke of the outstanding life and work and faithful dedicated service the late Archdeacon Harrison had given to the work of the church. Prayers were said for the Archdeacon and his family.

The Bishop expressed thanks on behalf of the Diocese for the hospitality extended to the Diocesan Synod when meeting here last June, and told of some of the arrangements which were being made for the meeting of the Synod in May at Halifax.

A standing vote was adopted expressing appreciation of the leadership given by the late Archdeacon Harrison, and the great loss the church has sustained in his passing. The resolution also expressed sincere sympathy to Mrs. Harrison and her family.

Brotherhood Campaign Said Most Important And Strategic

"The 'Buildings for Brotherhood Campaign' is the greatest, the most important and the most strategic Christian crusade ever attempted in the history of Christendom," declared Cecil Brown of Hamilton, chairman of the Buildings for Brotherhood Campaign in North America, before a joint meeting of the Alpha and Centennial Y's Men's Clubs at the YMCA last night.

The meeting, which was also attended by the YMCA Board of Directors and representatives of the Summerside Y's Men's Club, was under the joint chairmanship of Clarence Walker and Fred Norton.

In outlining the project, the

guest speaker stated that the objective of \$16,000,000, to be raised by countries not under the Communist rule, was the largest single one in history, and that the money would be used to place buildings, "either politically or geographically right along the edge of the Iron Curtain where the conflicting ideologies are battling it out for the hearts and the minds and the soul of youth."

A film "Buildings for Brotherhood" was then shown with Lowell Thomas as commentator. Following the question period, Mr. Norton expressed his appreciation to the guest speaker on behalf of the clubs.

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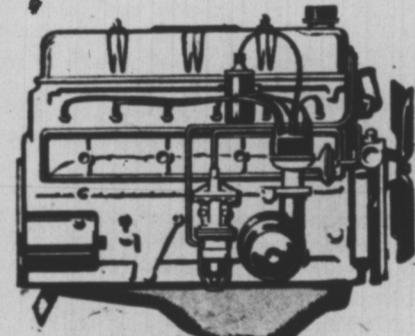
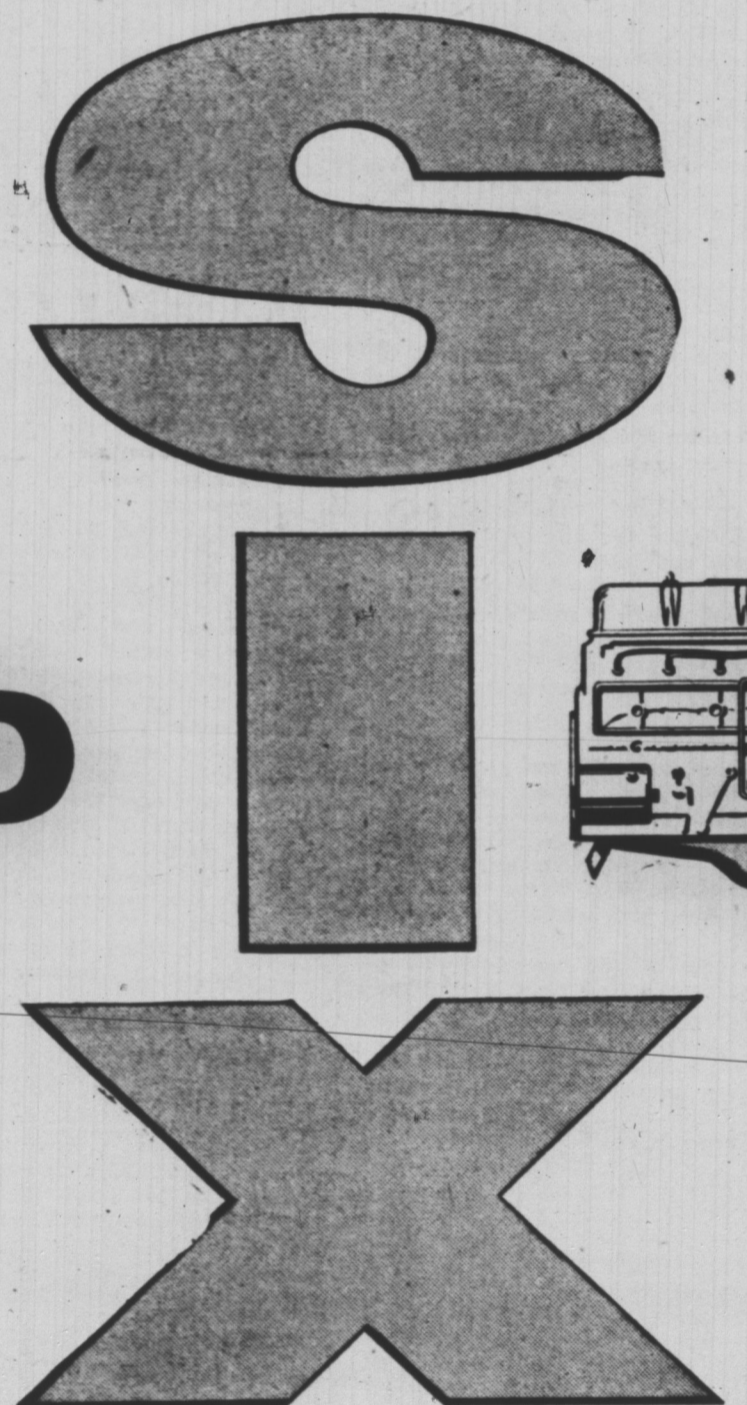

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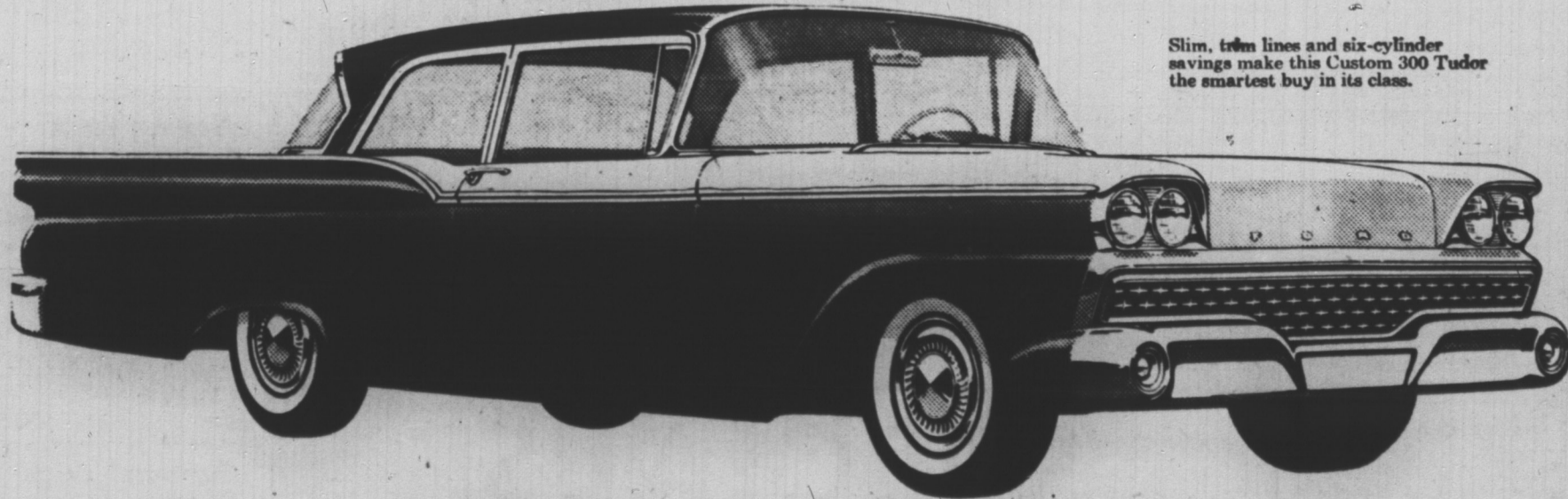
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
