her husband on a gold chair to the left of and below the throne, the Queen read the address in a clear voice.

"I earnestly pray that in Korea an early armistice will be arranged," the speech said. "Until this is accomplished the continued participation of my forces in this conflict will be clear proof of my government's whole-hearted attachment to the ideals of the United Nations."

My government will continue to take its full share in the work of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization as the outgrowth of Western defence and the embodiment of the common aspirations of the Atlantic community," she said.

"Within that community and in every other way, it will seek to maintain the closest and most friendly relations with the government and people of the U. S."

It was the first time a Queen had opened parliament since Victoria performed the ceremony in 1886.

To make Elizabeth's day complete, she will give the High Service on the Queen's Beams this afternoon in Birmingham-Elizabeth's 10th racing triumph of the season.

Tonight, the Labor Party leadership under Clement Attlee decided to propose a motion of no confidence in the government.

This is the usual procedure for the opposition.

Attlee drew a dark picture of British features in the debate. He said "our production is falling off, our exports have fallen off and there is increasing unemployment."

U. N. Delegates Interested In Canadian Plan
UNITED NATIONS, Nov. 4 (CP) - United Nations delegates today showed particular interest in a Canadian suggestion that a group of neutral powers screen Chinese and North Korean prisoners in a special zone as a method of ending the deadlock over a Korean cease-fire.

The Canadian idea was voiced yesterday by Health Minister Paul Martin in the political committee of the General Assembly which was in recess today.

Asian-Arab delegates, searching for formula to solve the key prisoners' problem, were reported especially interested in the Canadian suggestion.

Island Men Going South On Potato Boat

Lorne H. MacFarlane, Allie Palmer of Summerside, and Walter Leard of Bedouque, will be passengers in Florida aboard the big Pan-American freighter, S.S. Adelaide, when she completes loading of 90,000 bags of seed and table potatoes and sails from Summerside. This ship docked at Marine Wharf in Summerside yesterday at 1:15 p.m. after coming direct from New York.

Three firms are combining in the loading operations. They are Simmons and MacFarlane, Driscoll and MacFarlane, and George Brookings.

Two or three more boats are expected to arrive soon at Summerside for potatoes, and Mr. MacFarlane, who is taking his car along on the ship, will remain in the south to supervise unloading operations. He and the two other Island men making the trip expect to be away for a month or so and will return in Mr. MacFarlane's car.

St. Anthony's Credit Union

Bloomfield Corner And Vicinity Prison Riot Ends In Surrender

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4 (AP) - The four-day riot of 1,600 prisoners at Ohio Penitentiary ended today with complete surrender. Warden Ralph Alvis announced this afternoon.

Alvis said after a six-minute meeting with spokesmen for the rioters: "They have agreed to peaceful surrender. The men will be fed shortly."

The rioters, who broke out of control in the prison dining room on Halloween, were not given an opportunity to make any stipulations on their surrender, the warden said. Nor, he added, did they make any requests.

Jap Textile Plans Opposed

MANCHESTER, England, Nov. 4 (Reuters) - Japanese plans for expanding world production of cotton textiles met opposition from Britain at the recent Buxton international conference, it was revealed here today.

A report issued by the Cotton Board said Japan argued that production and exports could be stepped up with the raising of living standards in under-developed countries.

Its delegation estimated world trade in cotton goods would expand by 10,000,000 yards a year over the next 10 years.

But British representatives contended that higher living standards meant the under-developed countries would increase industrialization and start manufacturing their own cotton goods for the home market.

They said the competition between the big exporters and home producers would eventually lead to economic warfare and stressed that over-production would eventually lead to a widespread slump in the cotton industry.

S'side Soldier Wounded In Action

OTTAWA, Nov. 4 (CP) - The army's 51st Korean casualty list, issued today, included five men wounded in action, one for the second time. The last previous list was issued Oct. 31.

Today's list brought to 1,223 the total number of casualties so far suffered by Canadian troops in Korean action including 226 dead, 883 wounded, 29 missing, 84 injured and one captured.

In addition, the navy has reported three dead and three injured in action.
