### Prerogatives May Appear On Vandalism Charges

Three juveniles, ranging in age from eight to 16 years, are expected to appear in juvenile court Wednesday, in connection with what police describe as one of the worst acts of vandalism in years.

Their appearance is the result of smashing of car windshields, side and rear windows, and in some cases the dashboards, of 27 cars in the parking lot to the rear of Martin's garage, Queen Street.

Estimated damage is reported to be in the vicinity of \$9,000. Of cars owned by the garage and nine others owned by customers, which were in for servicing.

The police believe that at the time of the incident, Saturday, there were about 100 youngsters present, but it is thought that they did not take part in the vandalism.

Maurice Martin, Jr. told the press he left the building just after four o'clock Saturday afternoon, shutting the large doors at the back of the garage. There was no other entrance and is completely hidden from the street.

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### Rotary Dist. Governor Greeted by Home Club

A standing ovation greeted Rotary Governor Read LePage yesterday when accompanied by the board of directors, he was piped to the head table at the luncheon meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Piper John Evans led the group which also included Mrs. Don Milton and Mrs. Jean MacDonald clad in home costumes as members of the IOOE Red Glove Revue.

Rotary International and the individual Rotarians was the theme of Governor LePage's address in which he stressed that Rotary must gear its program to the changing times.

Comparing scientists' explorations of outer space and seeking greater achievements, the speaker said "Rotary was in only many years before man-made satellites. We have more than one-half million potential Rotary sponsors in the world, more than 11,500 potential launching centers in 129 countries. If Rotary will only get it all advantage is taken of its resources, the world can be saved from destruction."

"We hope to enlist all Rotary manpower and engage all Rotary machines this year, in an international program designed to influence understanding and goodwill among peoples of the world, for friendly, just and peaceful relations between nations," the speaker said.

WITH SWEDEN  
Governor LePage said "This will involve matching each club with a human group." The district is matched with a district in Sweden.

"It is our job for us to remember that Rotary International is not an organization dealing with mutual goods but concerned with human relationships in all phases—physical, mental, and spiritual. New creative powers should be directed towards extending contact and humanizing the channels as possible in order that we might be a more close-knit and human group," he said.

"No president or no board of directors can do the work of the individual. If the individual does not have the integrity, vision and understanding, the program of Rotarians will be null," Governor LePage said.

"The fact that Rotarians with different cultures, beliefs and ways of life, are scrupulously following the basic paths of Rotary, showing our goal, in the spirit of 'service above self', there is a dramatic demonstration of 'unity in diversity,'" the speaker said.

Governor LePage was introduced by president, W. R. Conroy, who presided and was thanked by his associate vice-president, Andrew Smith. The presentation was made to the program marking this memorandum.

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### Trio Given \$125 Fines For Impaired Driving
