2 Women Injured At Alberry Plains

MONTAGUE — An accident which occurred at Alberry Plains sent to hospital Mrs. Cathers Frought of Elliotvale with a broken leg and undisclosed internal injuries, also her daughter, Mrs. Brenda Hickens with possible back injuries. Child's Parents Are Dumb But Their Child Is Rescued

CLEVELAND (AP) — John Biven and his wife didn't have the words to tell—both have been mute since birth. There was no way they could explain that their three-year-old child was trapped in their flaming house.

James Pfaff, 31-year-old Chicago insurance executive, and his wife, Susan, happened to be driving past the burning home in suburban Olmsted Falls early Sunday. They stopped and saw Biven gesticulating wildly.

"What's wrong?" Pfaff asked. The parents led him by the arm around to a bedroom window. Pfaff kicked in the screen and climbed into the room. He groped around but became dizzy in the heavy smoke and came out.

By this time Mrs. Pfaff had got one word from Mrs. Biven: "Crib."

"MUST BE A BABY"

"There must be a baby in a crib," Mrs. Pfaff shouted, and her husband, his eyes still watering from the smoke, went back into the bedroom.

"I stumbled around," he said later. "I didn't think of the fire, but I kept saying, 'There's someone in here. There's someone in here.'"

"I knew there must have been a child in a crib," Pfaff finally touched a rung of the crib. Then he felt a leg.

The child was tumbled in a corner of the crib, unconscious. Haunting Scott Biven on his hip, Pfaff felt along the wall to find his way out.

"I couldn't see," he said. "Thank God I found the window." Half falling, half leaping, he emerged through the window with the child.

TREATED FOR SMOKE — Scott and his father were in hospital Sunday night. The child was being treated for smoke inhalation.

The father suffered second and third-degree burns as he stumbled around the house, into the fire once before he got out.

He and his wife each had thought the other was getting their son out of the house.

At the hospital, where Mrs. Biven was treated and released, the mother could only point at

Cubans Release Many From Jails

HAVANA (AP)—Cuban authorities continued Sunday to release hundreds of persons jailed during a drive against what the government called a Dominican-backed conspiracy. Officials apparently are satisfied the reported plot against Premier Fidel Castro's regime has been smashed.

About 4,000 civilians and army men were taken into custody by a big military dragnet.

There has been no estimate, official or unofficial, as to how many persons will remain in custody to face formal charges. A recently decreed law establishes the maximum penalty of death for counter-revolutionary activity.

Considered certain to be among those held are Arturo Hernandez Tellechea, a former senator who, Castro claims was to be president if the conspiracy succeeded; Armando Caines Millanes, former president of the National Cattlemen's Association who is accused of contributing financially to the plot, and Luis Pozo,

the son of a former Havana mayor. The government says Pozo came to Cuba aboard a C-46 seized by Castro forces when it landed in south central Cuba Thursday.

When the PC's voted against his resolution condemning the federal government for its handling of Term 29 of confederation agreements, PC members James Higgins and A. M. Duffy split the PC Opposition and formed a new party over the issue.

Mr. Higgins, now leader of the United Newfoundland party, questioned in a radio address Saturday night "the sincerity of Prime Minister Diefenbaker" who promised Newfoundland's financial case under Term 29 in legislation that was passed in the House of Commons in July.

Mr. Daley said he was pleased to see that Mr. Smallwood is being forced to discard his phony campaign issue of Term 29, and is now beginning to talk with some real issues confronting the people of Newfoundland.

The Democrats were born a few weeks ago. If elected they have promised to repeal labor laws that last March decertified two locals of the International Woodworkers of America (I.W.O.A.).

One of the loggers' locals was on strike against the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company of Grand Falls at the time.

WILL NEVER REPEAL
Mr. Smallwood said in his TV address that the Liberals would never repeal the labor legislation. And he scored the PC's for promising to repeal the laws that they voted for unanimously.

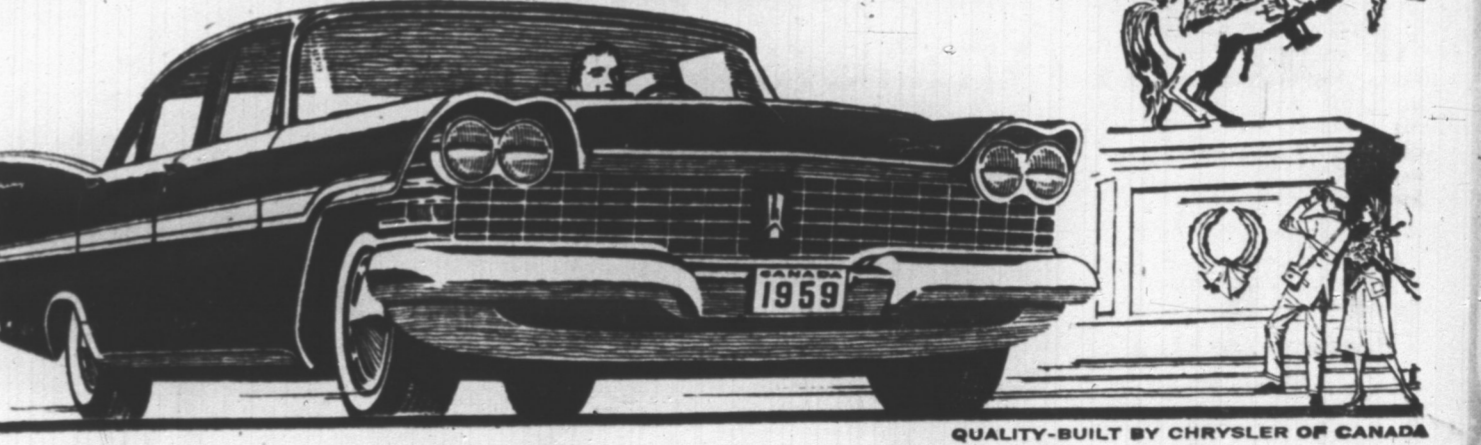


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
