Worker Buried Alive But Emerges Uninjured

KENSINGTON — William Mindy, aged 46 years of Harland, N. B., has been buried alive three times and lived to tell the tale.

He is an employee of the Smith Construction Company presently engaged in laying the tile for the sewerage disposal at Kensington.

Mr. Mindy was engaged in digging by the wall of Erving Champion's home at about 1.30 yesterday afternoon when a cave in caught him before he could escape and forced him to his knees under four feet of earth.

With much shouting and excitement, unheard by the victim, the men working close by frantically began digging with bare

hands and were able to remove sufficient of the heavy clay before the victim suffocated.

Another employee, Bert Swim, managed to locate the man's head and remove his glasses which were not even damaged.

Dr. Zielinski, who was immediately called, examined the victim and found him uninjured and he was again on the job later in the day.

This is the third time that Mr. Mindy has been buried alive, once with much more serious results when he had three bones broken.

He said after the accident, "it just wasn't funny and I am very lucky to come out of it".

W. Prince Flower Show Proves A Big Success

The seventh West Prince flower show at Alberton was officially opened by Mayor Herbert Matthews yesterday afternoon.

This annual event is sponsored each year by Regalette Rebekah Lodge.

Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie welcomed visitors to the flower show and called upon Mayor Matthews to open the show and to introduce the guest speaker for the afternoon, Herbert Leavitt.

Mayor Matthews extended congratulations to the exhibitors and appreciation to those who planned the show and made it such a success. He expressed the hope that it would continue another year and then declared the show officially open.

Mr. Leavitt, after congratulating the lodge members, spoke of man's natural desire to create the beautiful, and the value of a hobby to satisfy this urge to create, and to take away from one's mind the worry and turmoil of daily life.

He recommended gardening as an ideal hobby and suggested that those who have already adopted it should encourage others to do likewise.

Guest speaker for the evening session of the flower show was Dr. N. R. Bruvels of O'Leary. He was introduced by J. W. Don Campbell.

FIRST ADDRESS
This is the first time Dr. Bruvels has addressed a public gathering in Alberton and his audience listened with respect and attention to a brief and interesting description of his native Latvia which has a climate not unlike that of the Maritime Provinces.

In England, he said, a man's pride is his lawn but in Latvia it is his flower garden. He noted that at this flower show almost all the exhibits were entered by women. In Latvia this would not be so, he said. There, it is the man who cares for the flower garden; his wife's care is the potted plants.

During his travels Dr. Bruvels has noted that in different countries the appearance and the scent of flowers varies. Where flowers are larger and prettier they have less scene while in countries where the bloom is small, the perfume is more beautiful.

FEWER ENTRIES
This year's show had fewer entries than last year's but they were of excellent quality and artistically arranged.

The names of well-known flower growers appear on the list of prize winners along with those of folks who garden on a more modest scale. As in previous years there was a beautiful display of dahlias from the garden of Mrs. John Raynor with the collections grown by Mrs. Neil

Barbour and Mrs. Gordon Hardy as runners-up.

In the collection of gladioli, Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie came first, followed by Mrs. Hardy and Mrs. Raynor.

Mrs. John H. Well won first place for three spikes of gladioli and also a first for roses.

Mrs. Robert Dunn was awarded a special prize for a beautiful bowl of new twinkle phlox.

The collections of wild flowers attracted much interested comment.

Perhaps the most outstanding potted plants were a hydrangea shown by Mrs. Robert Dunn and a gloxinia shown by Mrs. Erskine Hardy. There were also a number of other beautiful specimens.

During the afternoon and evening refreshments were served by members of the lodge, assisted by a number of young ladies of the town.
