## "Rock of Ages."

AN ASTONISHING DISCOVERY AS TO THE AU-

THORSHIP OF THE HYMN.

The London Figaro says:—It is so well known (in America) that everything which is good emanates from the United States, that we are heartily ashamed once more to have to own up to an unblushing piracy on the part of an Englishman. The work pirated is the universally-beloved hymn "Rock of Ages, cleft for me." We in England have for more than a century been under the impression that the hymn was the work of John Wesley's famous antagonist, the Rev. Augustus Montagu Toplady, that it first appeared in the Gospel Magazine for March, 1776, under the title of "A Living and Dying Prayer for the Holiest Believer in the World," and it was translated into very excellent Latin by Mr. Gladstone a quarter of a century ago. But it appears from the Boston Musical Herald that we have for 110 years laboured under a delusion. The hymn was really written by an American lady only about six years since. The circumstances are so extraordinary that they may be quoted here:

"Rock of Ages, cleft for me," is the opening poem in "Songs of Sunshine and Shadow," by Maud Moore. Mrs. Ella Maude (Smith) Moore is the wife of J. E. Moore, a lawyer, of Thomaston, Me. "Rock of Ages" first appeared anonymously in an Augusta, Me., paper, the Maine Standard, we think. Four years afterwards it was printed in a Western paper, over the signature of a gentleman. Two years later this came to the notice of Mrs. Moore. The editor of the Augusta paper immediately entered into correspondence with the Westerner, who claimed to have written it at a certain time; but as the Augusta editor could date its publication four years earlier, the Western man retired from the field. Mrs. Moore's thoughts flew so naturally and gracefully that the tender loving stanzas find a warm welcome in our hearts.

Let us, therefore, render all due honor to the lawyer's wife, of Thomaston, Me. That lady, it will be noticed, sent the work to the Maine Standard, whose editor probably knew no more of "Rock of Ages" than he did of Sanskrit. A "gentleman" (name unknown) imposed this poem upon a Western paper, the editor of which had apparently never heard of it. On behalf of England an apology must, therefore, be tendered to the lady of Maine, whose poem (written only six years ago) was so unceremoniously printed by Toplady, who, possibly in order to spite the lady in question, most ungalantly died as far back as 1778. Perhaps if Congress had any money to spare it might usefully be spent in the purchase of a few hymn books to be distributed among editors of Western papers and lawyers' wives of Thomaston, Me. Somebody in America might then come forward as the child-author of "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," or even "The Old Hundredth."

Seriously.

The newspapers are very generally advising young women to go West. There are a greater number in the crowded East than can find husbands, even if all the men should make up their minds to marry, which is not likely, while it is stated that in many parts of the West, notably in certain sections in Minnesota, men are so anxious to get out of single blessedness, and the stock of young women for wives is so very far short of the demand, that money rewards in considerable amounts are being offered for them.

It does seem to be a pity that the young women who desire to be wives are not more fortunately located as regards proximity to the young men who want to be husbands; but it would be rather an indelicate thing, nevertheless, for any of our Eastern young women to go West in acknowledged search of husbands. It would be risky, too, though many insist that marriage is a risky business at best, and that the crop of unfortunate largely exceeds that of happy unions.

The debt of the United States was

reduced \$9,049,104 in July. The total

interest bearing debt is \$1,214,092,034;

but the total debt interest and non-interest

bearing, is \$1,755,359,047. Against this

are various reserves, so that the total debt

on 31st July, less cash in the treasury, was

\$1,380,087,279. The interest bearing debt

burden on the people, and that debt is now

equal to about twenty dollars a head of the

population.
