BOATS ARRIVED FROM TRAVERSE. Boats from here returned on account of storm and water.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Henry Clinton, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$10 or 60 days. John Horne, for the same offence, was fined \$12 or 60 days. Cameron, Welsh and Bell, charged with the Connolly burglary, were remanded for another week.

FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH.—The Festival of St. Joseph is being celebrated in St. Joseph's Convent to-day. There were several Masses this morning. The service this evening will be at seven o'clock, and the address will be given by Dr. Monaghan, of St. Dunstan's College. The altars have been beautifully decorated for the occasion.

LOST TWO HORSES.—Mr. B. C. Cox, Souris, lost a pair of horses this morning. In returning from a trip to the mill he took a road leading to the river. While going down the hill he lost control of his horses and they ran out on the river breaking through into the channel and were drowned.

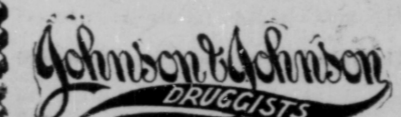
