Fearful of Communist demonstrations, 400 policemen and police dogs ringed the 12-mile perimeter of Lydda airport as the Americans landed.

Canadian Tire Increases Sales

TORONTO, (CP)—Canadian Tire Corporation Limited has reported an increase in net profits for 1952 to \$907,905 or \$8.08 a common share, compared with \$527,192 or \$4.94 a share in 1951. J. W. Billies, president, said the 72 per cent increase in net profits was accomplished on a 20 per cent increase in sales. Working capital increased to \$2,685,882 from \$2,353,528.
