## Tourist Association To Convene Here Next Year

Mid-September has been chosen as the time for the Charlottetown convention of the Canadian Tourist Association to be held here next year.

Dates for what will possibly be the largest convention in Charlottetown in 1956 were set at a recent meeting of the Association's executive in Ottawa which was attended by George V. Fraser, director of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Bureau. The convention will be held from Sept. 17 to 20 inclusive.

When the C. T. A. held its annual conference in the Laurentians last September more than 300 delegates were in attendance.

Another important decision of the C. T. A. at its executive meeting last week was the appointment of John Fisher, widely-known radio commentator, as its executive director. The first general meeting over which Mr. Fisher will preside will be the Charlottetown convention. He assumes his new duties in January of 1956.

## Wound Stripes & Service Chevrons For The Militia

OTTAWA (CP)—Wound stripes and service chevrons are ready for distribution to militia units across Canada, army headquarters announced Friday; the badges will be worn only by militia soldiers and will not be adopted by the regular army.

For each sound from enemy action in the Second World War or Korea, militiamen will wear one gold stripe on their left sleeves. Wounds suffered before the Second World War will be marked by red stripes.

Service chevrons have been authorized on the basis of one chevron for each two years' service up to 10 years. After 10 years, a maple leaf may be worn above the five service chevrons on the right sleeve.

Additional chevrons will not be awarded to personnel with more than 12 years' service because they then are normally qualified for the Canadian forces decoration which, with rosettes, indicates length of service.

Wearing of chevrons and wound stripes was discontinued after the Second World War but now is being revived for the Militia.

## Man Wanted In Saint John Arrested In Arizona

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—RCMP confirmed Sunday that Clifford Edward Ayles, sought since a payroll holdup slaying near Saint John Oct. 20, was arrested Saturday night in Phoenix, Arizona.

The sheriff's office at Phoenix said the 25-year-old native of Atholville, N. B., was picked up in a tavern. He was quoted as having said he suffered tuberculosis and went to Phoenix looking for an easy job and a warm climate.

A warrant issued two days after the holdup charged Ayles with wounding H. W. Cunningham, business manager of the Saint John Tuberculosis Hospital who suffered a bullet wound in the neck. Allison Graves, 47, driver of a hospital ambulance, was stabbed to death. GRABBED LARGE PAYROLL

The bandit held up the two hospital employees outside a Saint John bank and forced Graves to drive to a lonely road outside the city. The assailant escaped with \$11,150 in cash and bonds. He abandoned the ambulance in Saint John.

Ayles was last reported seen in New Brunswick the same night at Campbellton, near his Atholville home.

He studied engineering at two Maritime universities and is a former patient of the Saint John Tuberculosis Hospital.

## Conservative Meeting May Be Last Before Election

OTTAWA (CP)—The annual meeting in January of the Progressive Conservative party's national association may be the last before the next federal general election.

The meeting, slated for Jan. 16-18, is expected to be attended by between 500 and 800 party members from 10 provinces, including representatives of the national women's organization and the Young Progressive Conservatives of Canada.

A party spokesman said if Prime Minister St. Laurent calls an election in the spring of 1957 it is unlikely the association will meet again until late in that year or early in 1958. He said an earlier meeting might interfere with party preparations for the election.

NOT ANNUAL The spokesman said while the January meeting is billed as "the 10th annual meeting" it has not been the association's practice to meet each year. During the last five years there have been three meetings—April 1950; March 1952, and March, 1954.

The January meeting had been scheduled for Nov. 14-16. It was postponed because of the length of the last session of Parliament and this fall's cross-country tour by party leader George Drew.

Party officials say they expect that George Hees, member of Parliament for Toronto—Broadview will run for re-election as association president. They also say that a vote of confidence in Mr. Drew as party leader will be moved on the first day of the meeting.

POLICY STUDY The main business of the meeting will be a review of party organization and policy. Resolutions will express the association's stand on current issues, such as wheat sales, federal-provincial fiscal relations, foreign policy and defence.

The annual meetings of the women's organization and the Young Progressive Conservatives will be held Monday, Jan. 16. ## Man Wanted In Saint John Arrested In Arizona

The sheriff's office at Phoenix said the 25-year-old native of Atholville, N. B., was picked up in a tavern. He was quoted as having said he suffered tuberculosis and went to Phoenix looking for an easy job and a warm climate.

A warrant issued two days after the holdup charged Ayles with wounding H. W. Cunningham, business manager of the Saint John Tuberculosis Hospital who suffered a bullet wound in the neck. Allison Graves, 47, driver of a hospital ambulance, was stabbed to death. GRABBED LARGE PAYROLL

The bandit held up the two hospital employees outside a Saint John bank and forced Graves to drive to a lonely road outside the city. The assailant escaped with \$11,150 in cash and bonds. He abandoned the ambulance in Saint John.

Ayles was last reported seen in New Brunswick the same night at Campbellton, near his Atholville home.

He studied engineering at two Maritime universities and is a former patient of the Saint John Tuberculosis Hospital.

## Inspiring Meeting Of Alcoholics Anonymous

The effort that the non-alcoholic can exert to channel the alcoholic toward AA was emphasized by one of the speakers at a largely attended meeting which Alcoholics Anonymous held yesterday afternoon at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Three mainland speakers gave forceful addresses featuring many of their personal experiences, bringing re-assurance to AA members and hope to those outside the organization who have a problem with their drinking habits.

"The finding of oneself" was one of the most important revelations given by the first speaker who said that it took several years of sobriety for him to realize what sort of a person he had been during his drinking days. He told of how the program of AA had done much for him in the restoration of family happiness.

The second speaker described an alcoholic as one who realizes that he has a problem which he finds impossible to solve. He is always hopeful that some day he will be able to drink as the social drinker does but finds that each new attempt at drinking ends up in a bigger thing than the previous one.

OPEN INVITATION The speaker, who admitted that he was an alcoholic outside of AA for 13 years, said that his years of sobriety since entering the club were the only ones that he really enjoyed in his life. He extended an invitation to anyone struggling with a problem to consult some member of the organization for advice.

The third speaker dealt chiefly with the spiritual side of the program, emphasizing the need of an alcoholic taking the first step which is to admit that his life has become unmanageable through his drinking. After the first step it becomes apparent that the alcoholic must turn his life and will over to God for guidance, he said.

The speaker also placed great importance to the 12th step which is to bring the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to others suffering from the disease. Speaking from a personal angle, he said it would be impossible for him to stay sober if he did not share his experience with others. The sharing closed with "The Lord's Prayer."
