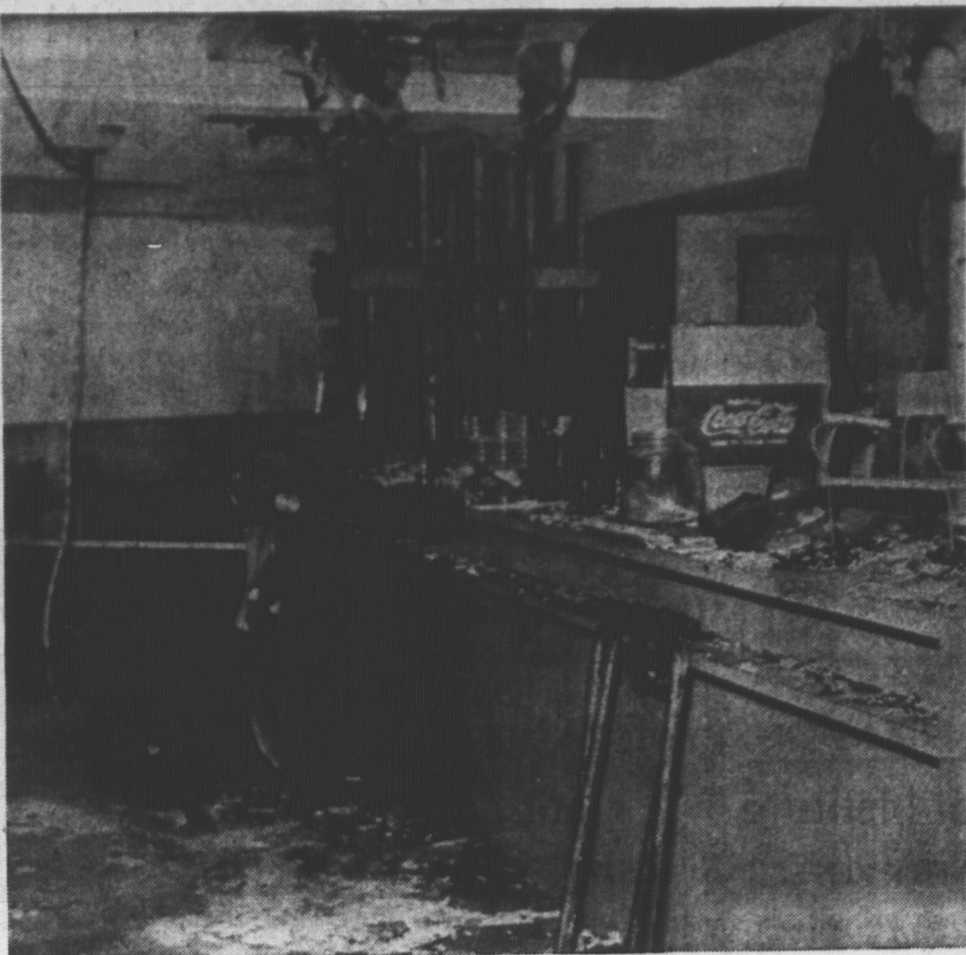


Leaders, Boys Hold Conference

MONTAGUE — Thirty-five boys and leaders attended the older boys' conference at St. James United Church, Souris, Nov. 19. RENDEZVOUS' INTERIOR DAMAGE

Fire Guts Restaurant; No Damage Estimate

No estimate of damage, caused by a fast moving fire which destroyed the dining area of the Rendezvous Restaurant on Kent Street early yesterday morning is expected before the end of the week, it was learned last night from co-owner Doug Hill.

"The blaze originated from a short circuit in the heavy cable outside the east wall of the restaurant, followed into the building and flashed back to the opposite side of the street," Fire Chief Herbert Jewell said yesterday.

Chief Jewell said the blaze was mostly confined to the dining area of the building resulting in extensive damage. He said there was water damage to the kitchen, to stock in the basement and also water damage to the apartment above the restaurant.

The Charlottetown Fire Department was on the scene shortly after three o'clock with two pumps and the aerial ladder truck. Firemen worked feverishly in driving rain and near freezing temperatures as a small crowd of people gathered to witness the blaze.

Members of the Maritime Electric Company Ltd. were called to disconnect live wires leading into the restaurant from the street, some of which were burnt bare.

The fire was first discovered by two city police constables, who happened on the scene, turned in the alarm and assisted a tenant out of the burning building.

Constables William Ford and Donald Trainor reported they saw wires burning between the Rendezvous Restaurant and the adjoining apartment building as they patrolled on Kent Street about three o'clock.

The officers said they alerted the fire department and proceeded to the rear of the building where they climbed a roof and entered the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. MacInnis and aroused Mr. MacInnis who was sleeping.

An early observer on the scene said she was awakened by bright flashes of light at her window and saw wires on Kent Street burning in front of the Rendezvous Restaurant.

Chief Jewell said the blaze was prevented from spreading to the adjoining building on the east side of the restaurant by brick walls of the apartment building. The fire was kept from spreading to Johnston and Johnston Drug store on the west side by water from fire hoses which were constantly sprayed on the west side of the structure, he said and added that a portion of the west wall of the restaurant is a fire wall.

McGill Professor To Address Club

Cecil P. Martin, MA, MB, BSCD, Professor of Anatomy and Head of Department McGill University, Montreal, Que., will be the guest speaker at the second meeting of the Canadian Club of P.E.I. to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel, Friday, Nov. 26 at 6.30 p.m.

Dr. Martin's topic will be "The Middle Course." He was born in Dublin, Ireland, and educated at Dublin University where he took his degree of Master of Arts, Bachelor of Medicine and Doctor of Science.

He entered the Royal Irish Constabulary in 1914, was seconded to the Royal Irish Regiment in 1916 and attached to the Royal Welch Fusiliers in 1917 becoming a Captain in the same year. He served in Mesopotamia 1917-18, and was wounded in April of 1918, and was returned to Royal Irish Constabulary until that force was disbanded in 1922 when he entered Dublin University.

Dr. Martin came to McGill in 1936 and is now Emeritus Professor. He is the author of "Prehistoric Man in Ireland", "The Decline of Religion" and "Psychology, Evolution and Sex," and numerous other papers published in the Journal of Anatomy etc.

He is married to the former Kathleen Humphreys, daughter of Rev. John Humphreys, DD, Belfast, Ireland. They have two sons and two daughters one daughter, Mrs. Frank MacKinnon is a member of the executive committee of the P.E.I. club.

Dr. Martin resides in Montreal and his hobbies are painting and gardening.

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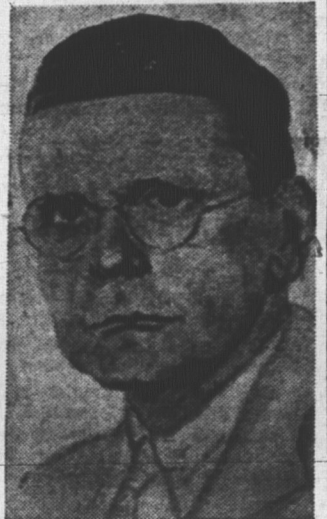
