(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) British Columbia's Government Defeated. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 31. The Government of this Province has been defeated. French Politics. PARIS, Jan. 31. M. Camperon has accepted the office of French Minister of War. M. Fulheres, the new Premier, addressed the Chamber of Deputies on the Proscription Bill. The Bill has been lost. Terrible Destitution. DUBLIN, Jan. 31. Terrible destitution exists in the County of Donegal. A Roman Catholic Priest who has been through the County writes that the food consumed by the people is only fit for beasts, and unless the Government send immediate aid many will die of starvation. Radicals in Norway. LONDON, Jan. 31. A despatch states that the Radicals of Norway have begun an active agitation against the King. Terrible Fire. HAVANA, Jan. 31. A terrible fire occurred in this city to-day; a great deal of property was destroyed, four employees of one establishment perished, and thirty-five men were seriously injured. The Steamer Quebec. LIVERPOOL, Jan. 31. The Steamer Quebec, 2,700 tons, of the Dominion Line, which sailed from Portland for this port on the 1st of January is overdue nineteen days. She was spoken on the 12th January in latitude 45 north, longitude 20 west, in distress. It is feared she has been lost. Latest Telegraphic Notes. The Right Rev. Thos. G. Sutter, D. D., Bishop of Aberdeen and Orkney, Scotland, is dead. A despatch from Col. Pewart shows the falsity of recent alarmist rumors relative to the state of affairs in the Soudan, Upper Egypt. Colonel Hicks and other British officers selected for service in the Soudan will leave Suez for that country on Wednesday next, and until their arrival the Egypt general will not undertake any military operations beyond concentrating troops at Khartoum. The steamer reported on the 28th inst., wrecked near Swansea was the "Agnes Jack," bound from Sardinia with lead. Witnesses of the disaster were unable to render any assistance. The crew, numbering twelve men, were swept one by one from the masts. The steamer was out of reach of rockets and unapproachable by boats. All hands perished including the captain, who it is believed stripped for the purpose of swimming ashore. Mr. Davitt, in a speech at a meeting of the National League at Cork, on the 28th inst., said he could not help feeling that the most God-like act a man could perform would be to complete the crushing of the hideous power of landlordism. If Gladstone could give a legislative blow to landlordism, his name would be beloved by every generation of the liberated victims. In conclusion, he said that co-irish landlordism and castle rule were being beaten inch by inch. The North German Gazette gives the text of a letter from the Emperor William to the Pope, dated December 22nd. After hearty returning of good wishes expressed in the letter from the Pope to the Emperor, the latter declares that the Pope's letter has strengthened his hope that the satisfaction felt by the Pope at the re-establishment of the Prussian legation at the Vatican will afford grounds for his Holiness to reciprocate by similar advances. The Emperor believes the advance made by the Vatican in regard to the duty of giving notice of ecclesiastical appointments to the Government is even more to the interest of the Catholic Church than to the State. If the Emperor were convinced that his desires for an understanding were reciprocated, he would be able to concede that the Diet should reconsider the May laws, which are not permanently required for the maintenance of peaceful relations with the Vatican.
