LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Another View.

SIR,—In the case of Beauchamp vs. the City of Montreal, tried in the Superior Court of Montreal on the 28th April, 1891, Judge Lynch, who tried the case, held, 1. "That ornamental trees planted on the roadways of Montreal are the property of the owners of the lot abutting upon the street; and that these trees must be considered as an accessory of the property in said lot."
 2. "That these proprietors have an action for damages against the City of Montreal for having cut down and taken away said trees."
 If this is law in this Province, the tree which Mr. Baker trimmed "must be considered as an accessory of the property" he occupied, and he had a perfect right to trim it, without the consent of the city authorities, in order safely to enter his premises.
 If this decision is good law the by-law is ultra vires. The Dominion Statutes provide penalties for malicious injuries to trees, etc., and it is under that law the Magistrate acted. As Mr. Baker did not commit the act maliciously and without the consent of the owner of the property, the Magistrate should have dismissed the complaint.

Importance of Family Loyalty.

Loyalty in the home circle is not often considered as it ought to be; it should be held as part of the ethics of family honor never to speak slightly of any member of the household to outsiders. The old and somewhat vulgar proverb, "Wash all your soiled linen at home," contains the gist of an obvious truth. Parents should impress this family loyalty upon their children, and teach them that it means dignity and strength and happiness to be the guardians of their own hearth, as it were the defenders of the honor of the family.
 Brothers and sisters should never allow themselves to say anything derogatory of each other to their acquaintances, whatever may be their private differences. Husbands and wives would do well to remember that "nagging at each other, or even what is called 'running each other in public,' is not only distasteful to the family dignity, but is in very bad taste, and is, moreover, exceedingly tiresome to anyone who may be with them. Mothers, even good, loving mothers, have an unwise way sometimes of bringing every trivial fault to the surface before anyone who happens to be present.
 Parents, too, should be loyal to their children if they expect the latter to be loyal to them. Every now and again we see a family where men all become more or less prominent in their various walks in life, and in almost every case there will be found among them a very strong sentiment of what the world calls "clannishness," but what might be better designated as faithfulness. Even from a worldly point of view, young people would do well to remember that whatever keeps the family together in faithful allegiance, adds to the position and influence and consideration of each member individually.

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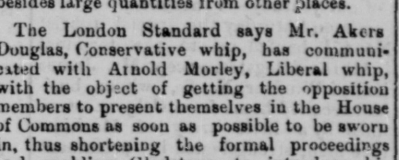
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NEWS NOTES.

It is proposed by the city council of Toronto to purchase a ten million gallon pumping engine of the rotatory or fly-wheel type, and the chairman of the water-works committee is inviting tenders to this end.
 The copyright of "The Vicar of Wakefield" was sold by Goldsmith through the good offices of Johnson for £60. A few days ago a copy of the first edition of that immortal work was sold at Sotheby's for the unprecedented price of £95. About 15 months ago a similar copy realized £35 10s.
 Wild strawberries are sent in large quantities to Boston from about Brunswick. They are shipped in kegs and used for syrups, favoring extracts, etc. Saturday's International steamer carried five tons forward from the neighborhood of Grand Falls alone, besides large quantities from other places.
 The London Standard says Mr. Akers Douglas, Conservative whip, has communicated with Arnold Morley, Liberal whip, with the object of getting the opposition members to present themselves in the House of Commons as soon as possible to be sworn in, thus shortening the formal proceedings and enabling Gladstone to introduce his resolutions on August 3, the debate on which might be concluded at the end of a week. They are the suggestion of the Rev. Dr. Gul as Old Catholic Archbishop of Utrecht, which recently took place in Holland, has attracted considerable attention. The ceremony was performed by the Bishop of Haarlem assisted by the Bishop of Deventer and two other Old Catholic bishops from Germany and Switzerland respectively. The whole service, including a celebration of solemn High Mass, was rendered in Latin, and with the exception only, of any acknowledgment of the Pope, was in every particular identical with that of the Roman Catholic Church. The Dutch Old Catholic Church is the nearest to any church in the world to the Roman Catholic. In Germany and Switzerland, however, their services are in the vernacular, their priests are allowed to marry and are in communion with the Church of England.
