EGG PRODUCTION STEADY—Egg production on Prince Edward Island is holding steady, reports Mr. P. M. Nash, district inspector of poultry products. Markets are easier with a slower demand. General quality of the product is only fair. Surplus stocks are moving to other Maritime centres. Newfoundland and Montreal Dealers are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered AL 50, AM 40, AS 28, B 27, C 12 and for the graded pack delivered AL 57, AM 47, AS 35, B 34, C 19 and are quoting retailers loose AL 60, AM 50, AS 38, B 37, C 22 (4c above in cartons). Eggs are retailing to consumers at AL 65-74, AM 63-67, AS 45-49, B 44-48. Poultry receipts are increasing. Quite a high percentage of chicken lack finish for top grades. Prices remain unchanged.
