Report Blight Conditions Become More Serious

The weather has been extremely conducive to the development and spread of potato late blight, and a very marked advance by the epidemic has occurred during the past week, states the Weekly Potato Bulletin issued by the Science Service Laboratory. To make matters worse, the frequent rains have removed a great deal of the spray deposited from the leaves, and have prevented many growers from applying further treatments to maintain protection.

It is strongly recommended in the Bulletin that, because of the present inadequate protection, and because of the very heavy growth of vines, fields should be double-sprayed at once; that is, the

Gives Figures On Tourist Spending

OTTAWA, (CP) — Travellers from the United States and other countries set a record of \$302,000,000 in Canada last year, but the amount was still below the \$364,000,000 spent by Canadian travellers abroad.

The debit of \$63,000,000 on travel spending was \$3,000,000 lower than in 1952 when foreign travel expenditures in Canada amounted to \$274,000,000 compared with Canadian spending abroad of \$341,000,000.

Apart from a debit of \$6,000,000 in 1951, all other previous years showed credits on travel spending with a high of \$145,000,000 in Canada's favor in 1948.

The number of U. S. travellers in Canada climbed to a record high of 28,025,000 last year from 26,277,000 in 1952. Their spending rose to \$282,200,000 from \$257,000,000.

The bureau of statistics, releasing the travel figures Tuesday, said the increase in Americans travelling in Canada was the most significant development in the travel business last year.

Travel expenditures of the record 23,300,000 Canadians who visited the U. S. last year stood at an all-time high of \$307,000,000 compared with \$294,000,000 spent by 21,500,000 Canadians last year. Visitors from overseas countries spent \$20,000,000 in Canada, \$2,000,000 more than in 1952. Canadians travelling overseas boosted their expenditures there to \$58,000,000 from \$47,000,000. More than half the overseas spending by Canadians was in the United Kingdom.
