everything was in favor of fast time. In the Three Year Old Pace the bay gelding Dr. J. A. by Simcoe Harvester 2:04 1/2, out of a mare by Calumet Budlong 2:02 1/2, stepped three of the fastest heats ever paced by a Maritime bred colt of that age — 2:12 2/5, 2:14 4/5, 2:15. The first heat lowered the record for Maritime bred pacers held jointly by Raymond Budlong and Jock Martin — 2:13. Dr. J. A. is owned by Dr. J. A. Donahoe of Truro and was trained and driven by Ray O'Brien, who has brought out a number of new performers this season and given them good records.

Gallant Bobby (Carroll) that took a record of 2:21 last season as a two-year-old, put up a good battle and was 2:42, and Mona Clegg, owned and driven by Eddie Cole, Mayfield, surprised everyone by finishing 3-3-3. The remainder showed promise too but of course the clip was very fast.

Down memory's lane we turn back to the afternoon of Sept. 6th, 1941. The track was Northam and the meeting was put on by Clifford MacDonald. In the Named Pace, Raymond Budlong, a three-year-old gelding by Calumet Budlong, owned and driven by Well McNeill, Charlottetown, won the first heat in 2:13, was second to Peter Reamore in the second heat paced in 2:13 and won the final heat in 2:14. Raymond Budlong also won the Three Year Old Trot and Pace at Kensington July 16th, at Northam, July 23rd, Montague, July 30th and at Charlottetown, August 12th. He was a whale of a pacer. Last year the three-year-old Jock Martin by Fleet Hanover, won at Woodstock, July 27th. In 2:13, which equalled Raymond Budlong's record. He was driven by Orin Jardine. At Old Orchard, Me. mile track July 14th, he won in 2:12 3/5, driven by Harry Coleman. His owner is George Carpenter, Debec, N. B.

The Two Year Old Trot had seven starters and they had many admirers for baby trotters. That good trotter, Parliacci 2:09 1/2, now a sire, had his first Maritime performer in the winner, New Forest, that was nicely trained all season by Len O'Meara. He is owned by Mrs. James Poulton of Charlottetown. Airlift by Playdale, owned and driven by Willard Kelly, was

a nice second in the first heat and third in the second heat, with Sandy Squire (McDonald) owned by Peter McMahon of Kensington, 3-2. Ginger Worthy by Ginger, owned and driven by George MacDonald, Mermaid, was 4-4, time, 2:33 2/5.

The record for Maritime bred two-year-old trotters is held by Guy Kalmuck by Kalmuck, dam, Ima Guy Axworthy. It was against time at Charlottetown, Sept. 7th, 1936. He was owned by George B. Lewis, Charlottetown Royalty, and driven by Willard Kelly. Guy was a big, handsome trotter with tremendous promise but injuries put him out of competition later on.

The Four Year Old Trot had seven starters and the first heat caused quite a surprise when Tattan, a brown gelding by Playdale, dam, Mae West, owned by Major T. B. Rogers and driven by Ike Moreside, won the first heat in 2:16 4/5. This horse had a very severe cold all Spring and his rapid improvement in the past few weeks marks him as a future star. His dam was a very fast trotter, a trifle erratic but one that should have taken a fast record. Tyndall Semple, winner of the Three Year Old Futurity last year in 2:20, and a winner at various Maritime tracks this season, was second in the first heat and won the next two in 2:18 1/5 and 2:17 2/5. Real Set (Lowery) 3-2-2, showed a lot of speed and was well liked. Roma Budlong, Mac Budlong, Margo Dale and Squire's Princess were the other starters finishing in the order named. We are glad indeed to see so many good trotters showing up this season all over the Maritimes, but particularly those bred here such as the above.

The record for Maritime bred four-year-old trotters is 2:12 held by Millie Kalmuck and was made at Woodstock Sept. 21, 1937. Here is the summary . . . Millie Kalmuck, owned and driven by Willard Kelly, 2-1-1. Noon Time 1-1-2-2, Star Dillon 3-dis. Time, 2:16, 2:12 1/2, 2:12, 2:17. Noon Time had a record of 2:10 and was owned by T. V. Holdaway, Houlton, Me., and driven by Earle Avery. The previous week at Fredericton Millie Kalmuck was a straight heat winner in the 2:25 Trot, time, 2:12 1/2, 2:12 1/2, 2:13 1/2. The trotter Peter McKinney was very heavily backed and his defeat by both Millie and Star Dillon (H. Killen) caused much grief to some people. Millie also won four other races that season.

The final afternoon of the Col. Futurity Stakes saw more record breaking and close finishes with interest continued right up to the last. The Two-Year-Old Pace with its 13 starters—the largest field that we can remember of—saw a great contest in the first heat between the Moncton owned Royal Bank (Harrison) and the Montague owned and bred Money Royal (Llewellyn). In the second heat it was another Montague owned filly, Venita Pearl (Lowery) that carried the fight to Royal Bank. The first heat in 2:20 2/5 was just a shade off the interest for Maritime bred. In the second heat Royal Bank flashed to the wire in 2:19 1/5—setting up a new mark. It was on Aug. 15, 1940, that Hilda Budlong, owned by Wilbur Lawless of Kensington and driven by Tyndall Semple, won both heats of the Two Year Old Pace at the Charlottetown track in 2:24 1/2, 2:20 1/2. Second both trips was Bonnie Budlong, that a few years afterwards was to be the leading heat winner in the Maritimes. George Calbeck's Jack Clyde was 3-3. Raymond Budlong 4-4, that was set up to set a new mark for three-year-old Maritime bred the following year.

The winner, Royal Bank, was trained and driven by Harley Harrison and was bred by Leonard Barrieau, Acadiaville, who owns both the sire and dam. The former is Federal p. 2:01 3/4, t. 2:07 1/2 by Peter the Brewer 2:02 1/2, and

had had the bark and rind nibbled off clean. However, she was a lonely little tyke. I named her Topsy. That morning I had one of her brothers in the trap and it was almost pathetic to see the greeting he got from his sister. They rubbed noses and finally laid down in the corner of the pen with their necks crossed like a team of horses sometimes do in a pasture field. I named her brother Samkin. He was the larger of the two but it was Topsy who threw herself against the wire every time that Tammy (my German shorthair) came too close.

I had them for several days before their tank and cage was ready for their occupancy at the Forum. Every morning I'd give them a chance for a wash in a large basin. Topsy gave Samkin preference as to who would have the first dip but if he stayed in too long she promptly rooted him out. Topsy got quite friendly after a couple of days and would allow me to scratch her behind the ears without making a pass at me. They took to the new quarters at the Forum like a couple of ducks. They'll eat carrots, clover and Poplar leaves and twigs but apples have preference.

Great credit is due to driver Llewellyn for his training and driving of Money Royal, and to Alfred Lowery for the training and performance of Venita Pearl. We are glad to see our old friend Alfred back in the driver's seat again after his severe accident.

The Three Year Old Trot had eight starters and the victor was Jackie's Pride, owned and driven by Dave Pound of Charlottetown, with 1-1-3. We have watched Dave handling Jackie for the past two years and his many friends will be glad to see him in the winner's circle. It was also another win for the get of Pagliacci 2:02 1/2, Ericco the Great, owned by Reg Somier of Summerside and driven by Don McNeill, won the third heat in 2:25 3/5, which exactly equalled the time performance of Jackie's Pride. Remarks were made on the good form exhibited by several of the other three-year-olds and predictions made that they will eventually turn out to be good aged trotters.

In the Four Year Old Pace everyone conceded a win to Abner the Great 2:12, owned by James Heffel of Summerside, and driven by George Sobey. He made it three straight. Since early in the summer Abner the Great has been showing his heels to some of the best pacers around the Maritime circuits. Sired by Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2, his dam is that wonderful racing mare Josie the Great 2:06 1/2, whose exploits we have so often chronicled in this column. She was for years the fastest Maritime bred pacer; Josie took her record at Woodstock, N. B. in a hand for fast race. The next best summary was that of Lindy H. (C. O'Brien) with 3-2-5, Billy Budlong (MacDonald) 5-4-2 and Freddy Scott (R. O'Brien) 2-6-4, best time 2:13.

Carloadings

OTTAWA, Sept. 14—(CP)—Carloadings on Canada railways decreased during the week ended Sept. 8 to 73,021 cars compared with 82,528 cars in the previous week. For the corresponding week last year the figure was 78,030. The Bureau of Statistics reported today that increases over last year were shown in loadings of grain, ore, pulpwood and woodpulp and paper. Main recessions were registered in livestock, coal, coke, lumber and gasoline.

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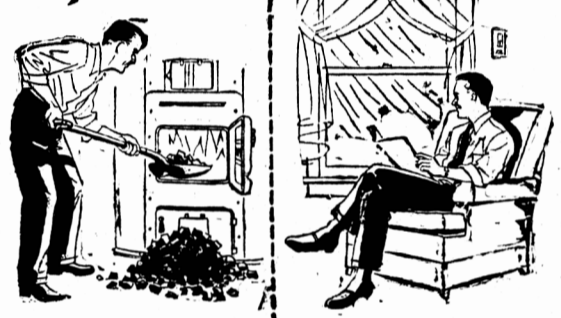
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
