## Walker To Defend

THE PRINCE Edward Island Open golf championship opens at the Belvedere Golf and Winter Club this morning with Jimmy Walker, Montreal, defending the title he won a year ago and recaptured more than 200 top notch golfers.

The first round of the 16th annual championship gets underway at the Charlottetown course on Saturday, with the concluding round of the 36 hole tournament being played Sunday, 7 a.m.

Prize money goes—1st - \$300; 2nd - \$150; 3rd - \$100; 4th - \$75; 5th - \$50; and 6th - \$25. The amateurs will battle for a list of prizes as well.

The two pros figured to give Walker the toughest time for the weekend are Ron LeClair, Waterville, Maine, and Jack Beaton, Brookfield, Conn.

LeClair won the Maritime Open at the Belvedere course in a walk last month with a 44-hole total of 216. Second to LeClair was Don Dion, Maine, who had 253. LeClair is a big boy who can drive the long ones; and the last time he was here he didn't seem to be scared of the narrow Belvedere greens.

Beaton, who came north with LeClair for the Island Open, set a course record of 63 at Brookfield last week. He is entered as an amateur.

A long list of amateurs including 'Jock' Munroe, Amherst; Terrell Nicholson, Green Gables, P.E.I.; Jackie Brandt, Belvedere; and Floyd Kedge, Halifax, will attempt to keep the favoured Americans out of the top positions.

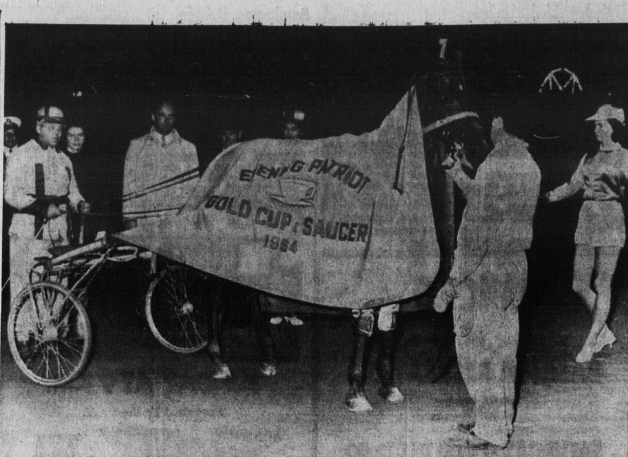

# Tiger-Cats Win First of Season

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats won their first game of the 1964 season, edging Winnipeg Blue Bombers 29-20 in an interlocking Canadian Football League game here Friday night.

A crowd estimated at 19,500 weathered the rain and a stiff northwesterly breeze to see the Tiger-Cats move into a 1-0 lead over the Bombers with Toronto Argonauts for third place in the CFL's Eastern Conference standings with two points each.

The loss was Bombers' third in five games. The team has a record of 1-2-1 and are in fourth place in the five-team Western Conference.

Don Sutherland sparked the Ticats, booting four field goals to tie the Eastern Conference record and connecting on two of three convert attempts for a total of 14 points.
