Ch'town Man Is Appointed Credit Union League Director

Reginald McCarville of Charlottetown has been chosen to succeed Leo B. Doiron of this city, as managing director of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League.

Mr. Doiron has been appointed to the P.E.I. Hospital Services Commission. When the hospital insurance plan goes into effect he will be in charge of hospital claims.

Mr. Doiron, who holds a bachelor of commerce degree from St. Dunstan's University, has held the credit union post for the past year.

During the Second World War, Mr. McCarville served with the Royal Canadian Navy and on his discharge was appointed assistant treasurer of St. Dunstan's Credit Union.

Prior to the war he was one of the pioneers in the credit union movement on the Island and was treasurer of the Liguorian Credit Union in Charlottetown, the first in the province.

He was for a time employed with Associated Shippers, Inc., and later acted as government shipping agent in the Newfoundland service. In recent years he was manager of the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation.

Air Travel Time To Be Shortened

"Our proposed schedule for next year calls for a six and a half hour flight from Montreal to London as compared with approximately double that time at present," R. V. Lenihan of Trans-Canada Air Lines told Rotarians at their luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown yesterday.

Mr. Lenihan, who is Sales Representative of TCA at Moncton, spoke on "The Civic Jet age, today and tomorrow," giving a comprehensive review of the great advances made in aviation in the 50 years which have elapsed since McCurdy flew the Silver Dart above Bras D'Or Lakes. "Now a plane takes off somewhere in Canada every ten seconds," he said.

GREATTER SPEED

"Before another ten years have passed, supersonic aircraft will reduce the flying times less than half again," Mr. Lenihan continued as he described the gradual increase of average speeds and the comfort and accommodation developed in aircraft travel.

"For every action there is a reaction, equal in force and opposite in direction." This force is now called "thrust" as applied to jet engines. The air is sucked into the engine by a compressor. The air is squeezed and its pressure is raised. This high-pressure air rushes into a combustion chamber where it is mixed with a liquid fuel and ignited. Its pressure increased more. It has now no place to go but out the back door, which it does in a great hurry. The all important result—the air leaves the engine faster than it enters.

which represents 66 per cent gain in five years. TCA transferred 6000 passengers to MCA and P. E. Island last year, an average of 500 per month.

SAFETY STRESSED

"Growth has not only been on the physical side," Mr. Lenihan went on to say, "safety as well proved through the years." "To as speed and comfort have in day it is four times safer to fly than drive your car. Statistically speaking, the most dangerous part of your air trip today is the taxi ride to and from the airports."

"The Transatlantic routes are among the safest in the world, 15 times safer than driving your car, even safer than riding a bicycle or walking the streets," he said.

Council To Call For Tenders On Phase 3 Sewer Project

Charlottetown City Council last evening decided to call tenders for phase three of the new Ward Six sewer outfall, for construction of a new sea wall and for the 1959 sewage collection building program.

Resolutions to this effect were passed at an emergency meeting of the council, held in the Council Chambers.

The tenders will be called tomorrow and will be received at the office of the city clerk up until 12.00 o'clock noon on Monday May 11th.

In regard to the laying of the balance of the sewer line connecting head of Government Pond to the end of the naval abutment in the vicinity of the eastern end of Sydney Street, Engineer William Crandall stated that he couldn't recommend anything else but the sea wall, which was suggested by Councillor Baker at a previous meeting.

Canadian Mission Secretary Talks To Baptist Men's Group

Dr. H.S. Hillyer, general secretary of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board, was a guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Baptist Church Men held at the church hall last night.

Choosing as his topic "Changeless Christ in a Changing World" Dr. Hillyer drew on his rich ex-

perience in the mission field in Bolivia, India and Africa to point out that it is only through dedication and sacrifice for the cause of Christ that a man can experience the full joy of Christian life.

He cited his experience in Bolivia when the Canadian Baptist missionary Tabs and seven Bolivian converts were murdered by Nationals near Oruro.

The result of this massacre, he said, was that during the next year as many young men and women volunteered for service as had volunteered during the five preceding years.

Dr. Hillyer maintained that the Baptist Church in Canada has been making a mistake during the past 50 years by leaving most of the foreign missionary effort to the ladies alone, whereas it is definitely a privilege and responsibility of men.

Dr. J.A. Clark, a long time member of the Foreign Mission Board, introduced Dr. Hillyer and Martin Fenimore expressed the sentiment of the members for the visit and the challenging address.

Evidence Heard In County Court Possession Case

The Crown completed evidence in County Magistrate's Court yesterday in the case of a Charlottetown man charged on three counts of possession of stolen goods knowing them to be stolen.

The case was further adjourned by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, QC, until Monday, May 11th.

Two Crown witnesses, residents of East Royalty and Winslow, were heard in the final charge against the accused that of possessing 10 100-pound bags of oats, the property of a New Wiltshire man.

Sewer Story Gets National Recognition

A story of local origin has been given front cover recognition in the April issue of "Civic Administration" a Toronto publication which has a wide national circulation in municipal and construction outlets.

The story deals with the laying of Parkdale's sewerage line on the island of the Hillsboro River and was considered by the editors to be unique in civic works.

George Newmar of Parkdale was the man responsible for using this method of placing the sewerage line on the river bottom—a scheme which saved the Village of Parkdale several thousand dollars and at the same time took advantage of the federal works program under which the government pays one half the cost.

Kensington Resident Draws Seven-Day Sentence In Jail

Pleading guilty to a charge of driving while intoxicated a Kensington man was sentenced to serve seven days in Queen's County Jail when he appeared in City Court yesterday.

Two Charlottetown men facing similar charges pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of driving while impaired and each was fined \$150 and costs or 30 days.

A Charlottetown man was convicted on a charge of breaking and entry with attempt to commit a theft. He was remanded until Monday for sentencing by Magistrate K.M. Martin.

The arresting officers told the

court—they arrested the accused after they observed him coming out of a gangway on Grafton Street at 1:30 a.m. Sunday and going into the doorway of a drug store. The officers heard the sound of breaking glass and then saw the man go into a service station parking lot next to the pharmacy.

The accused told the court he had no evidence to offer in his own defence other than he was drunk at the time and had no recollection of what had happened.

A fine of \$75 and costs or 20 days was drawn by a city man appearing for the second time within a week on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while his driver's licence was cancelled.

Two city residents appeared on charges of being drunk and incapable. One drew a 20-day suspended sentence, the other a 10-day suspended term.

HEAVY DOCKET
A heavy docket of 13 cases

failed Magistrate Martin at Saturday's session.

Four city youths appeared on charges of being drunk and disorderly. One was fined \$30 and costs or 20 days and each of two others was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days. A fourth was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days.

A city resident drew a stiff fine of \$50 and costs or 20 days when evidence disclosed the accused had driven on North River Road at a speed of 45 m.p.m. at a time when students were returning to classes following a luncheon break.
