CANADIAN CONTINGENT MAY HAVE GONE FORWARD

TO GUARD METHUEN'S LINE OF COMMUNICATION

Very Little News Allowed to Come Through.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—There is a complete absence of recent news from the seat of war; and even the list of casualties suffered by the British in last Tuesday's fight at Modder River has not yet been received. This causes considerable public impatience.

It is believed that Lord Methuen has been reinforced by a half battalion of Highlanders; and the Daily News says a regiment of cavalry and a battery of artillery also.

The silence concerning his force suggests the possibility of a

in his rear.

Nothing regarding the forward movement in Natal has been received later than Nov. 28th, when, it seems, Boers held both the railway and wagon bridges at Colenso and were able to destroy them when they wished.

The British were then still at Frere.

No movement of General Gatacre's division has been reported.

BOERS BEFORE MAFEKING.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The Times correspondent at Mafeking, in a despatch dated November 20th, says: The Boers despair of intimidating Mafeking.

Reports of success in the Natal movement and on this frontier were received.

THE SIXTH DIVISION.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—General Sir Charles Mansfield Clarke will command the New Sixth Division, destined for service in South Africa.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—While the Queen has received an assurance from Lord Methuen early that the wounded were doing well the casualty list was held back, owing to defective cable facilities; hour after hour it was generally understood to be in possession of the War Office late in the evening, but it required careful checking of the names. The impression prevailed there that losses would not be so severe as had been apprehended.

It is supposed that the Natal advance has been delayed by the necessity of getting the supplies to Pietermaritzburg. But not a word emanates from any of the various commands.

CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

LONDON Dec. 2.—The absence of news regarding the contingent which was at Cape Town on Wednesday is taken to indicate that they have been ordered to the front to protect Lord Methuen's line of communication.

HOW THE KHALIFA DIED.

CAIRO, Dec. 2.—Officers from the Sudan who have arrived here say that when Gen. Wingate's force overtook the Khalifa latter tried to outflank the Anglo-Egyptians, but failed.

Seeing that his position was hopeless the Khalifa told his Emirs to stay with him and die. He then spread a sheepskin on the ground and sat down on it with his Emirs on either side.

After the engagement the Khalifa was found shot through the head, heart, arms and legs, and the Emirs were lying dead beside him.

The members of his body-guard were all dead in front of them.

Gen. Wingate's force swept over them without recognizing the Khalifa and his Emirs, but they were identified later.

SECOND EDITION

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The war office has received the following despatch from General Forestier Walker:

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 1.—General Gatacre reports no change in the situation.

General French has made reconnaissance from Naauwport to Rosemead. The troops returned today. General Methuen's flesh wound is slight. He is remaining at Modder river for a reconstruction of his Brigade. I am reinforcing him with Highlanders and a Cavalry Corps, Horse Artillery and the Canadian Regiment and Australian Contingent and three battalions of infantry moved up to DeAar and the Belmont line.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 2.—Methuen's victories have made great impression on the colonial Boers. There is no fear now that any more Cape Dutch will join the Boers.

The report that General Joubert has been killed is revived. It is said that he was hit on the head by a shell.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—List of British killed and wounded at the Battle of Modder river numbers 438, of whom 73 were killed LONDON, Dec. 2.—From Forestier Walker's despatch it is proved that all the reports of Methuen's advance after battle of Modder river were premature—though with the railroad working he should not be long in constructing a temporary bridge.

Forestier Walker's announcement that the Canadian marksmen and other reinforcements have been pushed forward to the neighborhood of the Orange River, to protect Methuen's line of communications, has relieved much anxiety here, where it was fully expected that the Boers would attempt to attack the vulnerable points of the line of communication.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—The following cable has been received by Governor General Minto, from Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of British South Africa:

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 2.—Just said goodbye to Canadian contingent. All well and delighted to be going to the front. People here showed in an unmistakable manner their appreciation of sympathy and help of Canada in their hour of trial.
