**A BRAVE MAN DROWNED.**

Last evening, at Haulbowline, Henry C. Jenkins, district paymaster of coastguards at Queenstown, lost his life by drowning while endeavoring to save the life of a Miss Martin, of Middleton Park, Queenstown, who accidentally fell into the sea from the ceiling wharf at Haulbowline. Mr. Jenkins, Miss Martin and several other persons were waiting for the government steam ferry when, owing to short-sightedness, Miss Martin stepped into the water. Jenkins at once plunged after her, but disappeared almost immediately. Miss Martin was rescued by the ferryman. The body of Jenkins, who leaves a young widow and a child, was recovered half an hour later.—London Mail, Jan. 12.

V. grade tinplates, as they will for those in best quality; so many of contents of former become unmerchantable, because of rust, and lobsters turning black, and unfit for food.

By using best quality plate, Packers will avoid rust, lobsters turning black, souring, leaks, and loss in manufacturing, thus where common tin-plate is used.
