### Dief's Friday Caucus Call Seen Hitting Back Move

OTTAWA (CP) — Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, facing the second test in little more than a year of his leadership of the Progressive Conservative party, hit back Wednesday at cliques and Liberals trying to oust him. The 68-year-old warrior said his fellow Canadians will retaliate by letter and telegram his course over the next few days, "regardless of personal attacks by cliques or clique or the wish of the leaders of liberalism for my removal."

Several Quebec members said the caucus of MPs should not meet until the executive has decided on its course. Their action was the culmination of a growing split, aggravated by the bitter flag debate in Parliament last summer and differences between Mr. Diefenbaker and Mr. Balcer over a constitution-amending formula proposed by the minority Liberal government.

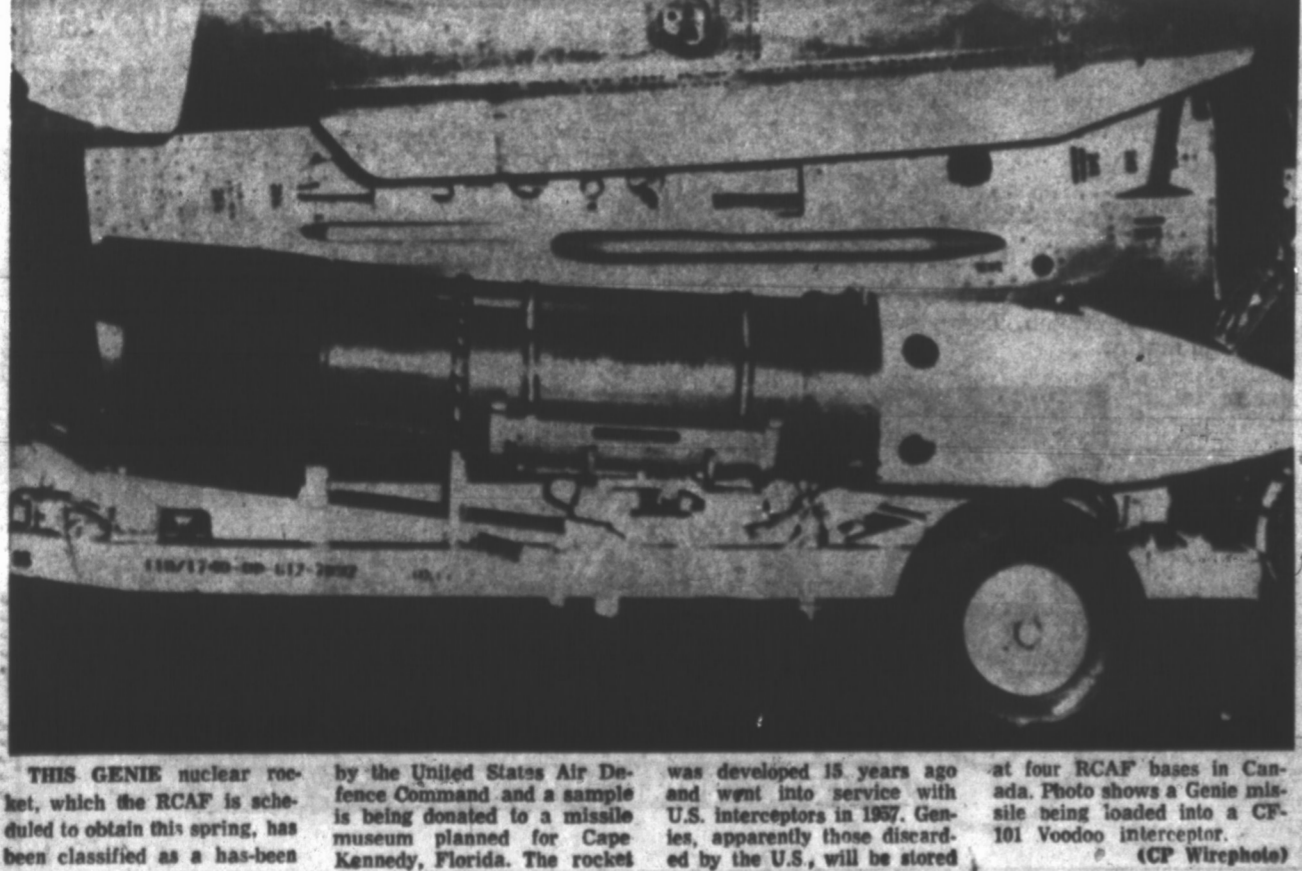

### Record Continued Of No Opposition

A precedent was set by Mayor-elect Walter J. Cox when he was declared elected by acclamation at nomination day proceedings in City Hall yesterday. It meant he had gone from junior councillor to the office of chief magistrate of the city without ever running an election.

Approximately 4,500 city residents are eligible to vote and of these more than half, about 2,500 are in Ward 5 alone. Other wards with the approximate number of voters are 1st, 256; 2nd, 276; 3rd, 298; 4th, 606; 6th, 532.

### Publisher Faces Charge Over Social Security

MONTREAL (CP) — Daniel Woodward, publisher of Canada Month magazine, said Wednesday he has been served with a summons on a charge of failing to require his employees to apply for federal social security numbers.
