Education Measurement Conference Begins Today

A two-day Atlantic Provinces Conference on measurement in education begins at noon today at Montgomery Hall in Charlottetown.

Sponsors of the conference are textbook publishers Harcourt, Brace and World Inc. of New York, Prince of Wales College and the provincial department of education.

The chairman of the organizing committee for the conference, Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, said yesterday about 25 Island delegates will attend, along with about 45 delegates from the other Atlantic provinces.

Mr. MacKenzie said the conference is made possible "through the generosity of Harcourt, Brace and World Inc. who will send to the conference two outstanding leaders, Dr. T. J. Fitzgibbon and Dr. William Burr."

Five topics have been scheduled for discussion during the conference. They are "spotting the deviant child, testing in the comprehensive high school, new developments in testing and evaluation, testing and the new emphasis on vocational and technical training and research in testing at the local level."

Educational experts, including college professors, from all four Atlantic provinces will take part in the discussions.

Child psychiatrist, Dr. Malcolm Beck, Charlottetown, will take part in the conference to "spotting the deviant child."

Last year's conference was held at Dalhousie University in Halifax and the 1965 conference was held at the University of New Brunswick.

Hospital To Seek \$6,000

MONTAGUE — The annual campaign for funds of the King's County Memorial Hospital will open June 15 and close July 15 and the objective will be \$6,000. This decision was reached at a recent combined meeting of the advisory committee and board of trustees of the hospital.

It was pointed out that annual campaigns for funds are necessary to enable the hospital to pay for capital costs, expenditures and the purchase of new equipment as the cost of these items is not assumed by the hospital services commission. The campaign will also assist in building up the reserve fund for new hospital construction.

Because of community effort in campaigns giving the board of trustees was able last year to provide much needed emergency and out-patient facilities in the hospital basement and to purchase equipment necessary to operate these quarters.

The board reported that the hospital had a total of 11,220 adult patient days in 1964, with a daily average of 30.6. This is an increase of 1,239 patient days over the year 1963.

Since the holding of this combined meeting, it was decided that commencing June 1 the Montague firms and business offices only will be canvassed for campaign funds. However the general campaign will start as decided on June 15.

New Member Of Cabinet Comments

Park Royal United Church Eighth Anniversary Sunday

Youth Is Fined \$200; Banned For 2 Years

SUMMERSIDE — Donald Joseph Gallant, 16, of Bloomfield Corner was fined \$200 and was prohibited from driving a motor vehicle for two years, as Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell delivered the sentence on the youth in Supreme Court here yesterday morning.

The youth was charged with having care, charge and control of a vehicle and did unlawfully fail to stop at a scene of an accident. The case, heard Friday, May 21, was adjourned until yesterday for final sentencing.

When announcing the verdict the chief justice told the youth "your counsel (G. Bruce MacDonald) has defended you well and has made a strong plea for leniency".

After reviewing the youth's past, Chief Justice Campbell

said he was impressed by Gallant's previous absence of offences.

Before the verdict was given, Mr. MacDonald called two character witnesses — Leo Gallant, the boy's father, and Rev. Joseph Clarence Petrie of Bloomfield. George R. McMahon was crown prosecutor.

The case against a Summerside man, Joseph Roger Gallant was further adjourned until June 14 at 10:30 a.m. by the chief justice. The case was set over from Thursday, May 20. Gallant is charged with break and entry with intent to commit theft. J. Melville Campbell is representing the accused.

Day Water Safety Program In Morell Area Discussed

Daniel MacDonald was appointed Red Cross water safety chairman at a meeting in Morell Regional High School Wednesday evening.

Clergymen, teachers, youth leaders and other citizens met to discuss the feasibility of a day camp for school-age children within the area serviced by school buses.

Mrs. Evelyn Cadmore, director of Red Cross water safety services, and Patsy Judson outlined the organization necessary to conduct this type of summer program.

A survey of 40 districts will be carried out today and Monday to determine the number of young people interested in enrolling in such a camp Aug. 16 to 27.

Cost would be one dollar or two dollars per family. In addition, it was hoped each district would give a cash donation towards the cost of transportation.

It was stated the department of physical education provides a grant for qualified water safety instructors. Participants are responsible for the cost of transportation.

The Red Cross trains instructors, organizes the daily program and is responsible for the overall standard and continuity of the two-week training, which features swimming, water safety, life saving, physical fitness and sports.

75-Lb. Bags Island Spuds \$5 And Up

Prince Edward Island potatoes were bringing \$5.00 to \$5.25 per 75-pound bag, wholesaler to retailer, in Ottawa this week. The listing available is for Wednesday, May 26. The same price was in vogue at Toronto and Montreal.

The price for Island 50s was \$3.40 to \$3.50 in Montreal, \$3.40 to \$3.70 in Ottawa and \$3.25 to \$3.50 in Toronto. By comparison New Brunswick spuds were \$3.15 to \$3.25 in Montreal, and \$3.25 to \$3.40 in Ottawa and Toronto which gave the Island spuds a premium as high as 25 to 30 cents per 50-pound bag.

New Brunswick potatoes are not quoted in the 75-pound bags. There were 10,845 carloads of potatoes shipped from this province this year and this compares with 10,864 carloads at the same time a year ago.
