A SPECIAL thanksgiving service was held in St. Peter's Church last evening.
REV. G. W. HODGSON returned home last night. He is enjoying good health.
REV. THOMAS GALES, secretary of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, is dead.
A RECEPTION was given to Mathew Arnold at the Hotel Windsor, New York, immediately upon his arrival in that city.
THE Lotus Club, of New York, gave a dinner on Saturday night last in honor of Irving, the great English Tragedian, who is at present visiting America.
DISTRICT ATTORNEY CORKILL estimates that soldiers and relatives have been defrauded of over one million dollars by illegal practices of pension agents. Legal proceedings will soon be taken.
In the Supreme Court at Pictou, George Hapburn pleaded guilty to the charge of forgery in five different cases, and was sentenced to four months in the county jail with hard labor for each.
ONE of the first official acts of the new Governor-General will be to consider a petition asking for the commutation of the sentence of death, passed upon the girl Maria McCabe, of Hamilton, for murdering her infant.
LORD COLERIDGE sailed from New York for England, on Saturday, in the White Star steamer "Britannic." His son, the Hon. Gilbert Coleridge, will remain several months travelling through the Western States.
THE Rev. John Langtry, a prominent Church of England clergyman of Toronto, has written an open letter to the Rev. Dr. Rice, superintendent of the United Methodist Church, congratulating him upon his election to that position and also strongly advocating an inter-ecumenical congress in Canada.
MR. DOMVILLE, ex-M. P., and other interested parties, have petitioned the Dominion Government to disallow the Act passed at the last session of the Nova Scotia Legislature respecting the Cumberland Coal and Railway Company, on the ground that the Act deprives them of certain rights and property affected by it.
TWELVE HUNDRED people were in attendance at the Casino, Laconia, N. H., to witness the ten-mile roller-skating match for the long-distance championship of New England, for a purse of \$50 and one-third of the gate receipts. The race was won by Charles H. Ladd, of Haverhill, Mass., in 59 minutes and 50 seconds.
THE New Glasgow Plaindealer, speaking of the steel works at that place, says: The furnaces of this establishment are blown out for a week or two, while the directorate obtains information as to the class of steel which will be required to suit the Canadian trade. As a large quantity of steel was imported in anticipation of the duty, the fall trade in this article has been largely supplied and the directors are with commendable prudence anxious to avoid the accumulation of a large stock of manufactured steel, part of which might be unsuited to the trade. More than half the usual number of men are still employed in the works and new machinery is expected at an early day.
THE races at the Moncton Driving Park, on Saturday, passed off successfully. In the handicapped trot the horses were all local scrubs. First money was taken by Wallace's Toby, Hodge's Jim coming second. The running race, half-mile heats, best three in five, was well contested, Hogan's Cyclone winning in three straight heats, Maid of Honor, and American mare, taking second position, and Wilbur's Arthur Palmer third. The one hundred yard foot race was captured by McDonald, of Truro, defeating Scott, of St. John. The half-mile foot race was declared off. The darkness coming on, the last heat in the running race was run in the darkness after sunset.
A DRUGGIST'S FATAL MISTAKE.—The Frederick Capital of the 27th is authority for the following: The death of Edgar McCloskey, only son of Mr. Michael McCloskey, in the employ of John McDonald, was a sad affair. The little fellow had been ill and Dr. Coulthard was called in to see him. After examining the boy, the doctor left a prescription which ordered four repository pills, morphia, of one quarter grain, with instructions how they should be taken. This prescription was taken to Messrs. Davis, Staples & Co., and put up by one of the clerks. Yesterday afternoon, about one o'clock, one of the pills was given the boy who soon after went into a sort of stupor. Between four and five o'clock his mother became alarmed at his condition and sent again for the doctor, who, on looking at the patient, at once divined the cause and set about the usual remedies for relief. Despite the combined efforts of Drs. Coulthard and Coburn the little fellow died at half past seven last evening. The mistake was made by the druggist giving a half grain pill, allowed for adults, instead of the quarter grain ordered by the prescription.
FANCHON THE CRICKET.—The Boston Comedy Co., under the management of Mr. H. Price Webber, were last evening at Market Hall greeted with a bumper house. The beautiful drama, Fanchon the Cricket, which has been rendered famous by the celebrated actress, Maggie Mitchell, was produced. It was well "put on," notwithstanding the difficulties which dramatic companies have to contend with in Charlottetown. The stage fixings were neat, and the scenery, though small, was beautiful. The cast of characters was very good indeed, and the different parts well maintained. Miss Edwina Grey, in the role of Fanchon, proved herself to be a charming little actress. Her part throughout was well sustained, and she was at times loudly applauded. Mr. Percy W. Massey, as Father Barbaud, acquitted himself admirably, while Messrs. H. P. Webber, and H. W. Farrish, as the twin brothers, took their respective parts well. Mrs. M. C. Hellman, in the character of Old Fadet the Witoh, and Annie L. Patt, as Madeira Caillard, were quite successful. The other characters in support were well presented and altogether the effect was pleasing. To-night the company appear in the intensely emotional drama, "Not Guilty." We bespeak for them a good house.

Railway Accident.
OTTAWA, Oct. 30.
A serious accident occurred on the Grand Junction Railway about 8 o'clock Sunday morning. The Madoc passenger train ran into a gravel train near Foxboro, about seven miles from Belleville. Mrs. Wright of Madoc is reported to be dying from her injuries. Another passenger is reported as being dangerously injured. Several others more or less injured.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.

A Dynamite Explosion.
PITTSBURG, Oct. 30.

Foreign News Notes.
A Berlin despatch states it is reported that the German exports to the United States are rapidly decreasing in number and value.
Owing to the virulence of smallpox in Seiskow, a suburb of Prague city, a double cordon of sentries has been placed around it.
A Hong Kong despatch says it is difficult to estimate the exact military position in Tonquin. The French will probably soon drive the Chinese from Tonquin, but the real conflict will only commence when the frontier is reached.
A Vienna despatch says the Emperor, in addressing the members of the Austrian and Hungarian delegations declared that the relations between Austria and foreign nations were entirely satisfactory. The people of all countries felt strongly the need of peace.
A despatch from Liegenetz, Silesia, says that Herr Richter, Secessionist Deputy in the Reichstag for Muhraflitz, has been sentenced to six months in prison and deprivation of his rights as Deputy for insulting the Imperial family four years ago. The action was brought by a local clergyman to prevent Richter taking his seat in the Reichstag.
The latest Nihilist proclamation, being extensively circulated, demands that the Czar shall summon the representatives of the Russian people, and asks for a full amnesty, freedom of the press, freedom of speech, and the right to hold public meetings as the only means of preventing a revolution. Pitiless vengeance is threatened if the demands are disregarded.
A Paris despatch says it is reported that a definite agreement exists between the Ministry and the Duc D'Anmale, as representative of the Orleansists, contemplating the establishment of the Orleans dynasty in France. Henri Rochefort's Intransigent declares its belief in the existence of such an agreement, and says Premier Ferry would rather remain in office and lend his assistance to the restoration of the Monarchy than resign in order that the Republic might live. Republican journals, however, assert that while an understanding between the Ministry and the Orleansists may exist it extends no further than a Parliamentary alliance, whereby the Ministerial party in the Chambers shall receive the support of members of the Right in matters pertaining to the Budget and certain other measures.
