

# Survey P. E. I. Business Outlook For Immigrants

Keeping their eyes open for all opportunities that avail themselves in the nature of small business enterprises, L. M. Hunter, director of the Settlement Division, Immigration Branch, Department of Citizenship and Immigration, has just returned from an initial visit to Prince Edward Island yesterday.

The purpose of the Canadian program is to work out with the provinces to assist in the gathering of information concerning opportunities or enterprises for various types of enterprises throughout the country.

The inquiries being made in the Settlement Division through Ottawa come under three classifications: (1) United States citizens wishing to move north of the border, (2) new Canadian citizens who had their own businesses back in their homeland and would like to continue in that type of work here and (3) prospective settlers from the United Kingdom and other European centers who have made inquiries into the situation in Canada.

The enterprises in question will probably range in the vicinity of between \$5,000 and \$50,000 and will center along all types of work including retail stores to service industries and printers to shoemakers.

Accompanying Mr. Hunter on his Charlottetown visit were M. Evanachke, Regional Settlement Supervisor, from Halifax, and his assistant, A. W. MacKenzie, former Agricultural Minister for Nova Scotia.

While in the city they visited Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Industry and National Resources, W. E. Agnew, Director of Trade, Graham Rogers, Director of Transport, Claude Smith, Director of Town Planning, Stewart Wright, deputy-minister of Agriculture and Lincoln Dewar, Secretary of the Federation of Agriculture.

Mr. Hunter is making a visit of all Maritime provinces and is starting his cross-Canada survey program that will take him right to the west coast.

## Kennecott Copper Cuts Production

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP) Kennecott Copper Corp., largest copper producer in the United States, Monday ordered a cutback in the work week at four western mining divisions. The work week will be five days instead of six.

The reduction, scheduled to go into effect during the next two to three weeks, will reduce production by 12 1/2 per cent. Counting previous cutbacks, the total curtailment will be 20 1/2 per cent.

## Ships Offered To West Indies

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada has offered to give the West Indies federation a ship to carry passengers and cargo between the various islands of the new Commonwealth member in the Caribbean.

Text of a message containing the offer was released Monday night by the office of Prime Minister Diefenbaker. The offer was made to Lord Hailes, governor-general of the federation at Port of Spain, Trinidad.

Design of the vessel would be worked out over the next few months and further discussions as to capital and technical aid Canada might be able to provide the West Indies would be held at the Commonwealth trade and economic conference in Montreal in September.

There was no mention of possible cost of the ship.

## Estimates Of '58 Revenue Tabled By Two Railroads

MONTREAL (CP)—Estimates of 1958 revenue for Canada's two major railways were tabled Monday as a three-man board of conciliation continued its public hearing of the multi-million-dollar contract dispute between the railways and 15 unions representing 130,000 workers.

The forecasts were contained in two traffic memoranda submitted by the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways as the opening salvo in their case before the board.

The memoranda supports the railway contentions that growing competition and lower revenue make their financial plight serious.

The CNR estimated 1958 freight traffic revenue at about \$475,000,000—a \$40,000,000 drop from 1957 figure.

The CPR estimated 1958 gross revenue from all rail sources at about \$480,000,000—roughly the same as for 1957.

TO EXPLAIN REJECTION  
A dozen witnesses are to explain to the board the reasons why the railways rejected a series of union demands which the companies said would cost \$128,000,000 annually if granted.

Originally the unions sought an hourly wage increase of 35 cents, plus fringe benefits, but in outlining the employees' case last week, union spokesmen indicated a willingness to make a number of concessions—including a drop in their wage demands. The union estimate of cost after the concessions is \$96,000,000 a year for a two-year contract.

The railways are expected to base their argument against the demands on two principal contentions:

## 2 Top Canadian Comedians Get One-Year Contract In U.S.

TORONTO (CP)—Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster, Canada's top comedians, announced Monday they have vaulted into United States television with a unique one-year contract to appear on Ed Sullivan's CBS network show.

Wayne, at 36 a year younger than Shuster, said Sullivan has left it up to them how often they'll appear on the weekly Sunday night show.

Four appearances are definite for the team, regular performers on the CBS for years. They will be on Sullivan's variety show May 4 and 11. Then, after doing the last show under their present CBC contract May 22, they will return to New York for performances June 1 and June 8.

After that, Sullivan hopes to have them cut capers on alternate Sundays. But it's up to the comedians themselves. "We don't want to overexpose ourselves," says Wayne, who teamed up first with Shuster to write a play for their Toronto boy scout troupe. BREAKS PRECEDENT

The contract, which Sullivan says breaks a "whole series of precedents," was signed during the weekend.

Wayne said: "We hope to introduce a lot of Canadians to American audiences."

Will they be back at their old CBC stamping grounds next season?

"That depends on the CBC. We'd like to be back, but we haven't been approached by the CBC yet."

"It's fabulous, says Wayne of the new linkup with the Sullivan show. "I'm still dizzy."

Says Sullivan: "This is the first time I've ever been so sold on the potentials of an act that I've contracted for a year."

"To my way of thinking, Wayne and Shuster will become just as much of a sensation in our country as they are in Canada."

## B-A Oil Buys Site In N.S.

TORONTO (CP)—British American Oil Company Ltd. Monday announced purchase of a 30-acre site at Burnside on the north shore of Bedford Basin, near Halifax, for construction of the company's first finished-products marine terminal in Nova Scotia.

The terminal—which will be the company's largest distribution centre in the Atlantic provinces—will have an initial storage capacity of 9,000,000 gallons.

The terminal will employ about 40 people at the outset.

Contract for initial clearing and grading of the site has been awarded to R. S. Allen Ltd., Halifax.

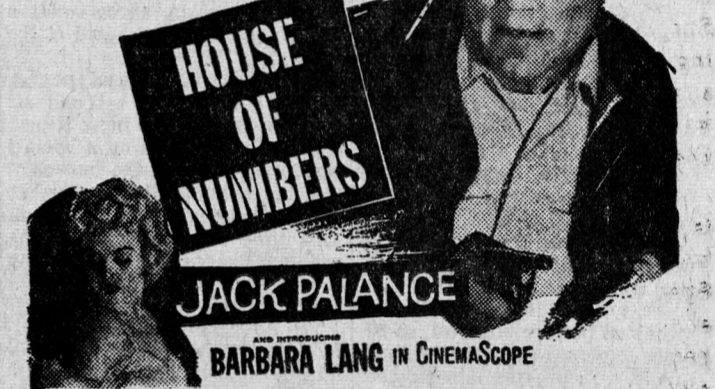

# Talks Begin In London On The Future Of Malta

LONDON (Reuters)—Maltese Prime Minister Dom Mintoff met here Monday with Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd to begin talks on the economic and constitutional future of Malta, Britain's island Crown colony in the Mediterranean.

The talks were convened against a strained background following Britain's decision to curtail employment eventually in Malta's naval base and installations—the island's main source of employment.

An estimated 12,000 Maltese men work at the base and installations.

The issue became so critical that last December Mintoff resigned the premiership. He withdrew the resignation three days later.

SOUGHT SEVERANCE  
In the same month, the Maltese parliament unanimously passed a Mintoff motion calling for a severance of ties with Britain unless she would agree to provide alternative employment for discharged Maltese workers.

Lennox-Boyd expressed "incredulity" over the threat to cut ties.

As they met in the first of several sessions, Mintoff and Lennox-Boyd discussed Britain's contribution to the 1958-59 Malta budget.

Last year, Britain allocated £6,077,000 but in a sharply worded note, Lennox-Boyd had indicated that less money would be available for the budget this year.

Some reports have suggested the cut may amount to £1,000,000 but there is no official confirmation.
