Hearing Continued On Charge Of Manslaughter

Notice that he will move for the dismissal of the charge on grounds that the Crown has produced insufficient evidence was given yesterday in Georgetown Courthouse by Mr. H. Frank McPhee, Q. C. at the adjourned preliminary hearing in the manslaughter charge against John K. MacDonald.

The hearing was further adjourned to next Tuesday, December 2.

The charge arose from the death October 29 last of Basil Beaton who was a passenger in a car driven by the accused. First witness called yesterday before Magistrate Joseph MacDonald, who is presiding, was Douglas McGowan, automobile dealer of Montague who said he was the first on the scene after the accident. Questioned by Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q. C., appearing for the Crown, he stated he had been driving from Grandview to Herringdale that afternoon and noticed the car and a man lying by the side of the road. He recognized the injured man and with help from the other occupants of the damaged car carried him to Mr. McGowan's own car for the purpose of taking him to hospital.

However, after a further examination it was decided to return him to his original position and Mr. McGowan tried to reach a doctor by telephone. He was told the doctor was at a house in Valleyfield, so drove there. He then returned to Montague and reached Cpl. D. Davis, R. C. M. P., at his home. At first he had thought the victim was only stunned, but later could find no sign of life. On the scene at the time were Preston Beaton, Gordon MacDonald and John K. MacDonald.

The latter drove blood on his face so wetted a handkerchief and drove to get cleaned up. He had talked to all the men present and had seen nothing out of the ordinary in the accused. He saw no sign of liquor at the accident and had smelled none from the accused.

On this point a heated argument ensued between counsel but finally Mr. McGowan stated that he could not swear that there was or was not drinking. He thought Mr. MacDonald was very upset because of the deceased. He did not see the Mounties assisting the accused to their car. It was dark then.

Cross Examination

Under cross examination by Mr. McPhee, who has as his associate counsel Mr. M. MacKinnon, Q. C., the witness stated he did not thoroughly examine the car until several days later. He told of finding damage to the rear left door, the supporting post being twisted, glass broken in the window of the front door and the roof pulled down as a result of the post being damaged.

He expressed the opinion, over the objections of Mr. Hessian, that if the left rear door had not been in contact with the tree. Mr. McGowan said he had seen Mr. MacDonald walking back from Mr. MacPherson's nearby home and coming down a steep bank. He had not seen him staggering. He was in shirt sleeves and was wet and cold and witness had driven him to MacPherson's and asked that he be given cup of tea. The accused had been the one to suggest telephoning for a doctor and then for the Police. He was in the car of the witness when the Police arrived and had immediately identified himself as the driver of the car involved in the accident.

The question of whether or not he had taken the proper driving course in trying to avoid collision with the tree evoked a long argument between opposing counsel with the Magistrate also taking a part in order to get the question put in the witness in an admissible form. Mr. McGowan at one stage admitted to the Magistrate that many arguments had him confused but when the question was finally put to him he expressed the personal opinion that John K. MacDonald had taken the only course open to him in view of the skidding of the car and the imminence of a collision with the tree.

Mr. Hessian suggested that if Mr. MacDonald had stopped his car on the road there would have been no accident. The witness did not believe that it was possible to stop on the road as there was danger of the car overturning. However, Mr. Hessian said that if the car had been proceeding at 10 or 15 miles per hour it could have been stopped and asked the witness if he did not believe that having taken something to drink should not have made a driver more careful. This was agreed in by Mr. McGowan.

The fact that the accused had gone shooting on a cold and wet day in shirt sleeves was mentioned by Mr. Hessian who did "think" it was an advisable thing to do.

Constable's Testimony

Corporal D. S. (Don) Davis, R. C. M. P., in charge of the Montague Detachment, said he was called to the scene in the late afternoon of the accident. He had found the deceased and a damaged car with two or three men in the vicinity. He saw an intoxicated person in the damaged vehicle, it was not the accused. Shortly after his arrival he saw another car drive up and the accused, in answer to his question, said he was the driver of the damaged car.

New Operator Of Murray R. Theatre

Continued from page 1 of the earning power of the employee to the nation, to the company and to himself and his immediate family so that both patriotism and self-interest should exert every officer and employee to do his utmost to see that the number of accidents and personal injuries are brought to the lowest possible rate, or eliminated entirely.

Performed Autopsy

Dr. J. Harold Shaw, Provincial Pathologist, told the hearing that he had performed an autopsy on the deceased and described the injuries to the anterior areas of the body. He said there were also present brush burns or surface skin abrasions in several areas. He stated that during the examination the stomach contents, fluid blood and urine were removed for chemical examination. All of them revealed the presence of alcohol in varying amounts.

The findings in the case, the doctor stated, were compatible with death being due to the application of severe external force, anteriorly, to cause massive haemorrhage arising from ruptures of the aorta and of the liver. Dr. Shaw said there were no obvious injuries to the posterior of the body.

Corporal A. Johnson, R. C. M. P., Charlottetown Detachment, who went to the scene, had taken several pictures there and identified them for the Court. He also explained several matters pertaining to them.

Constable J. W. Giesler, R.C.M.P., Montague Detachment, testified that he had been at the scene in company with Cpl. Beatty and Cpl. Davis. He said that he had seen the accused and could smell alcohol. He was at the front of the McGowan car when Cpl. Davis had taken the arm of the accused and led him to the police car parked behind him.

Continued from page 1 say they cannot by themselves solve the fundamental problem of the lack of dollar-sterling equilibrium.

British View

While Canadians press for sterling convertibility and multilateral trade, British emphasis tends to be on other things, such as dollar investment in under-developed countries, lower American tariffs and simplified customs procedures, a possible increase in the price of gold which would enhance the use of sterling-area reserves, and complicated safeguards for convertibility.

Convertibility broadly means free exchange of dollars and pounds. Many approaches to convertibility have been canvassed in the last weeks, including Canadian American stabilization funds to shield sterling in moments of pressure or a variant such as Atlantic Payments Union in which the U. S. surplus would be held by the American central banking system as claims against the resources of debtor countries.

If the Commonwealth conference produces any such proposal it would require American approval.

On the internal side, there is some recognition here that such things as personal consumption and welfare services may perhaps be too high.

Some agreement may be expected on domestic matters. The broader question of ultimate joint action among the Commonwealth, U. S. and Europe is unpredictable. Despite this question mark, the present conference might well prove decisive in what has been called the life-and-death struggle of the pound sterling, a century ago the world's most prized currency.
