JUDY GARLAND, GENE KELLY IN M-G-M'S JUBILANT "SUMMER STOCK" IN TECHNICOLOR

It's happy news for film fans this week, for Judy Garland and Gene Kelly are singing and dancing together again in M-G-M's joyous new Technicolor musical, "Summer Stock," headline attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre Thursday.

The lulling story of "Summer Stock" takes place on a Connecticut farm, and it's as fresh and exhilarating as a new-laid egg. ATTENTION POTATO GROWERS! STARCH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Effective today Starch Factories at Hunter River and Baltic are open to receive potatoes. Grade—No. 1 grade but up to 25% small may be included.

Both starch manufacturers are acting as agents of the Board and farmers should contact their nearest plant for bookings.

Both plants ready to accept potatoes immediately. Payment—22c per bushel will be paid by the starch manufacturer on delivery—A further payment of up to 22c per bushel will be paid by the Board on starch factory receipts. (Further details available at plant or this office).

Growers with any quantity to move, especially carlots, are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to move them to the factory now before the full flow by truck begins.
