WINNIPEG, March 17—(CP)—
Coarse grain prices on the futures market showed a firm undertone with moderate trading today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange.
Wheat trading was confined mostly to commercial interests and shippers. Prices were steady. Irregular demand was reported in barley sales compared to yesterday's aggressive buying in May and July contracts. There were fair offerings on the upturns.
Canadian wheat exports were: United Kingdom, 350,000 bushels; Republic of Ireland, 200,000 bushels; Egypt, 355,000; Columbia, 100,000 bushels. Ecuador was allocated a small parcel.

Quebec Budget Brought Down

QUEBEC, March 16—(CP)—
Provincial Treasurer Gagnon today laid before Quebec Legislature a \$200,000,000 budget for the 1950-51 financial year and called it a token of faith in the Province's economic future.
Mr. Gagnon drew attention to "certain signs of shrinkage" in Provincial revenues but he said the Government presented a budget approximately the same as the current year's.
"Economic crises are above all crises of confidence," he said, "and if we continue to look to the future with as keen anticipation as in recent years, we shall succeed in avoiding the advent of days of want."

Gubitchev To Return Home

NEW YORK, March 17—(AP)—
Convicted spy Valentin A. Gubitchev has withdrawn from further fights with American courts, and said he'll go home to Russia next Monday.
The 33-year-old Russian remained in jail. The decision not to appeal a 15-year prison sentence was announced by his lawyer, Abraham L. Pomerantz. Sentence is to be suspended on condition that Gubitchev go back to Russia "never to return."
United States Attorney Irving H. Saypol had insisted that Gubitchev waive all right of appeal from his conviction of plotting to spy for the Soviet Union with his former friend, Judith Coplon.
The dark-eyed Miss Coplon, a former government employee, was released from the Women's House of Detention late today after bond of \$40,000 was posted for her. She is appealing her conviction.
Her brother, Bertram, put up the money in cash. When reporters asked him where he got it, he replied "no comment."

Canada Moves To Ban Jap Goods

OTTAWA, March 17.—(CP)—
Canada has taken emergency action to stop cheap Japanese goods from flooding the Canadian market at "ridiculously low prices."
A government official said today the rarely-used Canadian anti-dumping laws have been applied against the flood of Japanese knit-ting gloves, men's shirts, children's dresses and cigar lighters.
Later, in the Commons, Revenue Minister McCann told G. K. Fraser (PC-Peterborough West) that additional duties have been levied against the goods while the Government inquires about their fair market value in Japan.
Once the fair market value is established, the Government will probably apply a tariff to bring the cost of the Japanese goods up to that level.
Much of the goods came to Canada through a private industry barter deal by which \$2,000,000 of Canadian wheat was exchanged for Japanese textiles. The deal was administered by a New York corporation.
Appearance of Japanese shirts in Canadian shops at between 99 cents and \$1.99 brought a host of complaints to the Government from the Canadian trade.
A U. S. Government official is understood to have told the Canadian Government that the shipment is "the last batch" of some 3,000,000 shirts made by the Japanese as a special occupation job.
About 240,000 shirts were shipped to Canada. The official assured the Government that the low price would not be matched in future shipments. The shirts were described as of a size "which might fit a Japanese but not a Canadian."

Expect Navigation To Open Later

MONTREAL, March 16—(CP)—
Shore navigation lights along the St. Lawrence River were switched on last night but shipping officials said the opening of navigation will probably be later than last year.
With the current spell of cold weather, they said the shipping season would probably not begin before April 12, five days later than last year.
