



Escapees Recaptured After 6 Hours

GEORGETOWN — Two prisoners who escaped Thursday from the Kings County Jail here were recaptured after about six hours of freedom.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police picked up Clifford Wilfred Larkin and David Smith on the North Cardigan Road, in the vicinity of Montague railway junction. The arrest was made about 4:30 p.m.

Some 10 to 12 cars with men from Montague, Charlottetown and Souris detachments were taking part in the hunt.

Larkin was serving a four-month term here for a series of break-ins, entries and thefts and Smith was serving a two-month term in Queens County Jail.

Smith was serving six months here, also for break-ins and thefts.

The pair made their escape through coal chutes leading from the basement under the court house building, on the edge of the town and kept in woods while following the railway line.

SOURIS — A coroner's jury here last night exonerated the driver, Tom Blaine, in the death of Rollin Arthur Jenkins here May 15.

The boy was killed by a station wagon driven by Melvin Blaisdell at the corner of Main and Harbor streets.

The child, who was three and a half years old, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Jenkins of Souris.

Coroner was Dr. G.S.A. Iman. The trial was represented by Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

Five witnesses were heard. They were Dr. Edward Blaisdell, the driver; John MacDonald, Souris; Melvin Blaisdell, Red House, Mr. Carrie Wilson, Dingwall Mills; and Constable James A. Cox of the RCMP.
