

Bishop Wins Court Case

OTTAWA (CP) — A Roman Catholic bishop has been successful in the Supreme Court of Canada in collecting a \$50,000 estate left by a priest to aid the cause of French-Canadians in the diocese of Prince Albert, Sask.

The case dates back to April 14, 1950 when the Saskatchewan Supreme Court ruled that the estate of Father Georges Emile Touchet, former parish priest at Duck Lake, Sask., should go to Bishop Leo Blais, bishop of Prince Albert until April, 1959. Father Touchet's will bequeathed the \$50,000 to Bishop Blais for a charity which will aid the cause of the French-Canadians in his diocese.

The Saskatchewan Supreme Court held that the will created a charitable trust controlled by the bishop to use the money to aid the cause of French-Canadians.

However, the Saskatchewan Appeal Court reversed this judgment and awarded the money to Honore Touchet, father of the priest, and Lucien Touchet, a brother. It ruled that the will created no valid trust in favor of Bishop Blais, charitable or otherwise, and that the estate belonged to the father and son under an earlier will.

The Supreme Court here reversed the appeal court decision and restored the judgment of the Saskatchewan Supreme Court.
