THE South Renfrew, Ontario, election will take place August 2nd. The vacancy was caused by the death of the sitting member, an opponent of the Government. MR. On Thursday, July 28, a complimentary benefit will be tendered Claire Scott, when the beautiful play of "East Lynne," an adaptation from Mrs. Henry Wood's novel of that title, will be given. It is stated that a little bill of \$24 was presented to the "Jubilee Committee" for the hire of four horses for two hours. The aforesaid bill, it is said, got the six months' hoist. Who was this loyal owner of the horses? Let him be trotted out! As showing what can be done in the garden by skill and attention, THE EXAMINER this morning presented with two strawberries, one of which measured six inches round, the other five inches. They were grown in the garden of W. E. Dawson, Esq. THE steamer Miramichi arrived yesterday afternoon from Montreal with a general cargo. A great many excursionists were on board. She left on return at midnight, with a cargo consisting of 1639 cases of lobsters, a lot of pork, wool, canned clams, and other produce. THE steam yacht Meteor, from New York, owned by Commodore Bateman, of the New York Yacht Club, arrived in the harbor at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and is now lying off Queer's Wharf. She leaves again this evening. General Sherman U. S. A., is on board. THE election in Digby, N. S., takes place to-day. The candidates are Herbert Jones, a straight Government supporter, and a Mr. Robichau, who must be called "an Independent." The efforts of the orthodox Grits to bring out the Minister of Militia of "long time ago" were una-vailing. Digby would be herring if they returned a Grit at present. REV. MR. WEBSTER, of St. George's, Toronto, and Rev. Mr. Cooper, of Trinity College School, Port Hope, arrived by the steamer Miramichi last night. Mr. Cooper goes to Georgetown to-day to assume charge of the English Church there for the summer. Mr. Webster, who will make a short stay in Charlottetown, will assist at St. Peter's Church to-morrow.

REV. MR. MEIKLE arrived last night as announced in THE EXAMINER, and held his first meeting in the hall of the Young Men's Christian Association. The hall was well filled with an enthusiastic crowd, and the way the people entered into the singing of the new hymns introduced by Mr. Meikle was soul stirring. Mr. Meikle has lost none of the vigor with which he was possessed when he was last with us. THE third and last of Miss McGarry's recitals was attended by a larger audience than appeared at either of the other two. This fact speaks volumes. Miss McGarry is, without doubt, a first-class elocutionist. Her impersonation of the "Maniac" displayed genius. In entertaining the audience of last evening she was ably assisted by Mrs. W. J. Robertson, Miss Weeks and Miss Earle, Mr. Earle and Master Earle. THIS morning we saw some potato bugs enjoying some potato plants under a glass cover in Watson's Drug Store. They eat a piece of the plant as large as their own body in a very few minutes. Delay of an hour in destroying them when they have attacked a field of potatoes, must mean a total loss of the plants. Some of these destructive insects appeared a day or two ago in the Royalty, but summary means were at once adopted to put a speedy check to their ravages.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Burglars in St. John. ST. JOHN, July 15. Burglars are getting in some fine work in various parts of the province just now. Last night the safe in Walter Flewellyn's general store at Hampton was blown open and \$150 stolen. The station house of the Northern & Western Railway at Gibson was also visited by burglars last night and the safe door blown off, after which the robbers removed the cash amounting to \$3,000. To-day was pay day on the road, hence the reason why so much money was found in the safe.

Millers in Session. TORONTO, July 15. The Ontario Oatmeal Millers Association have been in session here yesterday and to-day. It was decided to organize a gigantic Company with the ostensible capital of \$30,000, composed of all the leading millers in Canada for the purpose of controlling the trade and fixing prices. A charter has been obtained and \$15,000 stock has been already subscribed, but very little of this stock will be called. The Company is being formed more for the purpose of controlling the trade than for paying dividends.

Egyptian Convention. LONDON, July 15. In the Commons to-night, Sir James Ferguson, Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, reported that the Egyptian Convention had not been ratified by Turkey, and Sir Henry Drummond Wolfe, special envoy, having the matter in charge, would leave Constantinople to-night.

The Bulgarian Throne. VIENNA, July 15. Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg, Gotha, to-day received a deputation to officially notify him of his election to the Bulgarian throne. In reply he said: "If I should follow my heart's impulse I would hasten to Bulgaria and put myself at the head of the nation."

An Islander's Misfortune. ST. JOHN, N. B., July 15. A P. E. Islander named Lacy, who came from Boston in the steamer State of Maine, Thursday, was robbed of \$900 while asleep on board the ship. This represented the savings of three years' toil as a blacksmith.

Cricket. DUBLIN, July 15. The cricket game between the visiting Canadian team and gentlemen of Ireland, was begun yesterday and finished to-day, resulting in the defeat of the Canadians by one inning and 102 runs.

Dr. Edgell Declines. HALIFAX, July 15. Dr. Edgell has declined the nomination to the Bishopric, so the Synod will have to meet again on 10th August to elect another.

Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, July 16-10 a.m. Light to moderate winds, fine and warmer.

The following gratifying cable has been received by the Canadian Minister of Agriculture from the High Commissioner's office, London, Eng.: "The Prince of Wales accompanied by Prince Albert Victor and Prince George, visited the Canadian stand at the Royal Agricultural Show at Newcastle. They took special interest in the samples of Manitoba red life wheat and dax; also in the remarkable samples of wheat of British Columbia, the black phosphate from Ottawa, and the exhibition generally."

GEORGETOWN JUBILEE.

SUPPLEMENTARY NOTES.

Hon. D. Gordon's Address.

An esteemed correspondent sends the following report, supplementary to THE EXAMINER's report published yesterday. Of the public men present on the occasion there were besides His Honor the Lieut.-Governor, Hon. Mr. Bentley, Commissioner of Public Works, John Ball, Esq., Clerk of the Legislative Council, Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. P. P., Hon. James Clow, M. L. C., many of the leading men of King's County were also present, and when the ceremony of laying the corner stone was performed by the Hon. D. Gordon, the scene was quite an impressive one.

SUMMARY OF HON. D. GORDON'S ADDRESS. Hon. Mr. Gordon in laying the corner stone, delivered an eloquent and interesting address, showing why the ceremony of laying the chief corner stone of public buildings is necessary and beneficial. He said that in former ages many great cities had become extinct and no records had been preserved of their existence. He referred to the labors of such men as Layard, Rawlinson and Schielmann who, in endeavoring to discover the mysteries of the past, had expended great treasure and labored many long years in trying to find out the history of the cities of earlier ages. The papers, documents and coins that would be deposited in the foundations of the present building will show to future generations that the building had been erected in the present year; and the new building would be a fitting monument of the stability, justice, and advancement of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, who had been spared for over fifty years to sway the destinies of the most mighty empire the world ever saw. He hoped that the building to be erected would be one always noted for the justice of the verdicts given by those called on to administer the law; and that the progress made in the Province in general and Georgetown in particular, during the next fifty years, would be so great that future generations might be able to recount with pride the development that had taken place.

In the corner stone were deposited the Public Records for the year 1886, copies of the Island newspapers, the Halifax Morning Herald and Evening Mail, and Daily Chronicle, and the coins current in the Dominion.

Hon. Mr. Gordon having concluded his address, the large stone was slowly lowered into its place, while the children sang an appropriate ode, accompanied by music from the band and organ. Owing to the very high wind that blew, the regatta did not come off, and a good deal of disappointment was felt, although no blame was attached to the committee. At night many of the houses were illuminated, and fireworks were bursting and whizzing and fizzing on every side. One of the best parts of the day's proceedings was the very good order that was kept, and hardly a drunken man could be seen. Taking the whole affair through, it was highly creditable to the managing committee and to the people of Georgetown.

We omitted to make particular mention of the salute of 21 guns fired by the Georgetown Battery, accompanied by a feu de joie of musketry fired by the militia.

The shoddy pedlar is abroad with his little lot of cheap cloth, old-fashioned shawls, gaudy dress goods, and fancy little table cloths. As usual, he sells for thirty dollars a quantity of goods which the purchaser could obtain at the nearest village store for ten dollars, but for the fact that the average shopkeeper would not keep such goods on his shelves, knowing that if he did he could never sell them. The pedlar will be paid with a note of hand, good at the bank for cash, while the village shopkeeper will be asked to wait for his pay till the butter money comes in, or to take it in cordwood next month. The shoddy pedlar is almost invariably a liar and a rogue. The shrewd farmer might be expected to make him move on. But he won't. He will allow the stranger to cheat him out of twenty-five dollars and will then grumble over his four dollars and ninety-five cents school tax, though he has five children at school. The hardworking farmer is a good friend of THE EXAMINER and we respect him for his good sense and straightforwardness. But he has his weaknesses and shoddy peddlars know them well. Therefore, though we warn the cottager and the artisan, and remind them that all these shoddy peddlars are frauds, and though the fact is generally so well known that any words seem to be superfluous, yet it will be in vain. The customer will go up and be cheerfully cheated.
