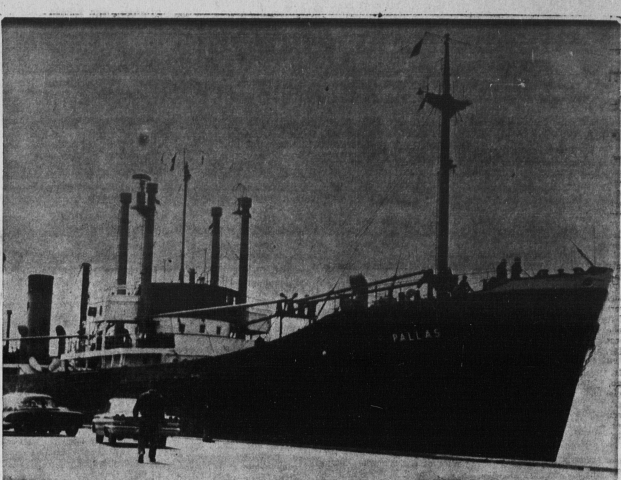


# First Lobsters Slated Today

Lobster fishermen along the southeastern shores of the province ran their lines at 11 o'clock yesterday for the season that extends from August 16 to October 10.

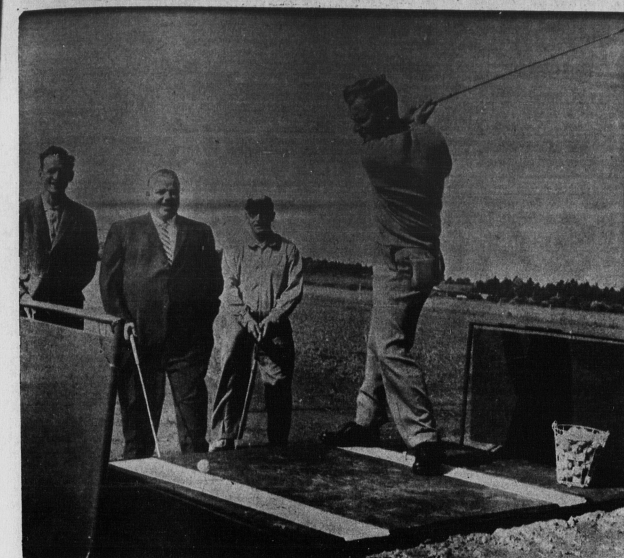
The first lobsters will be landed today. Weather permitting, and cannery operations are expected to swing into action by tomorrow.

The area covers shoreline from Victoria to North Cape. Eggerton Bay is the highest concentration in the area, and Victoria, Borden, Summerside, West Point, Campbellton and Miramichi are the other main points of operation in the fall season area.

## Flames Destroy Large Barn, Shed

SUMMERSIDE — An estimated \$10,000 damage was incurred yesterday afternoon at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Bennett Macdonald, Traveller's Rest, as wind-fanned flames demolished a large L-shaped barn and a livestock shed.

The barn was 100 feet long, 90 feet in length on its L and 32 feet wide. Also lost in the blaze, fed by a strong north easterly gale, were 3,000 bales of new hay, excavator, water pumps, milking machines and various other pieces of farm equipment as well as a tractor that was quite badly damaged. There were no animals lost.

"The ones with the highest rates and shortest times should be in the most congested areas with longer times and cheaper rates on the edges. The rates should range from five cents per half hour from five hours for a dim."

"All meters should be for use with a five or ten cent coin — there should be no pennies used whatsoever."

Terminating the earlier mentioned main business section as Area A, he defines Area B as the older business territory beyond Sydney Street, and Area C as the combined business-residential three blocks bounded by Easton, Wray, Pownall and Prince streets.

In his overall plan for traffic improvement he states: "Basically all streets in Areas A, B, and C with the exception of Queen, Great George, Grafton and Water are one way streets in or out of town."

"In Area A there is no left hand turns except on or on to one-way streets. All busy unsignalized intersections, y'd signs will be replaced with stop signs and the right of way will be given to the inbound or outbound traffic."

"At the corner of Queen and Grafton there shall be no turns at this. This is necessary due to the heavy concentration of pedestrian movement and at this corner do a business conditions, every preference should be given to the pedestrian as it is his business that the city wants and needs."

"A left hand turn will have to be made from Great George to Grafton as this is the through route of the Trans Canada Highway but as we have already experimented with this, and due to the variation of traffic at this corner, this poses no problems. At other corners most right turns pose no problems at the moment as the pedestrian movement is not too heavy. Left turns in most instances conflict both with pedestrians and other traffic and hold things up."

"Some traffic lights will have to be retained but this can be done locally and with the exception of possibly the walk and mail lights at Queen and Grafton can be done with no cost for material."
