ACCORDING to the annual harvest reports of France, collected by M. Barthelemy Estienne, of Marseilles, the grain crop of this year will be considerably below the average.

THERE has been the greatest fall of snow in England and Scotland known for many years. Business in various places has been quite suspended, travel being impossible. The Queen has taken her usual drives on sledges.

At the Caledonia Club Dinner on Monday night, at the Rev. House, Mr. A. McNeill intimated at this season nearly 1,500,000 bushels of potatoes were exported this season worth over \$500,000. This is a good exhibit for the Island and its industrious farmers.

THERE must be a very large screw loose in the machinery of our Inland Revenue Department, when men are able to sell liquor in the most public manner for weeks without a license, and to the knowledge of the officers of that Department.—*Montreal Witness*.

MESSAGE FROM THE QUEEN.—The following telegram has been received by Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, from Her Majesty the Queen, dated Windsor Castle, the 1st of December:—

"DELIGHTED AT RECEPTION. SAY SO. THE QUEEN."

THE *Northern Light* is now on the Marine Slip for repairs. The steamer *Worcester* is in port, having lost the blades of her propeller. She is discharging cargo here, and will go to Hawkesbury for repairs, on account of the Picton slip being occupied.—*Pictou Standard*.

It is reported from Ottawa that the Princess Royal will attend the new Edinburgh Episcopal Church, of which Rev. E. A. W. Hainington is Rector. A very handsome special pew for the use of Her Royal Highness is being erected in the Church by the Board of Works Department.

MR. J. S. DOIRON, who has for nearly three years been Assistant Freight Agent in the Railway Department, has resigned, and left P. E. Island for California. His reason for leaving is on account of ill-health, and he is in hopes the Western climate will improve his health. He left well recommended, and has the best wishes from all who knew him for his future prosperity.

In a few days we may expect to have the Hillsborough bridged with ice. Good landings in convenient parts of the town will then be necessary. Has not the City Surveyor authority to clean all obstruction from the city docks; and would it be too much to ask here, have the obstructions that block the most convenient landings been removed.

On Tuesday night last, the store of Mr. F. S. Hanford, on the corner of Pownal and Water Street, was burglariously entered. The thieves obtained an ingress to the store by entering Messrs. Dean Bros' cellar, and passing up through Mr. Hanford's inner hatch. They broke open every drawer and desk in the store, upset goods, and left with their plunder without being disturbed by any person. The robbery is attributed to a gang of loafers who frequent the corner on which the store is situated.

We are pleased to hear that the new wharf at Little Sands—the first we believe built on the gulf shore—is a success, and withstood all the fall gales. Several vessels have already loaded at it. Mr. Francis Panting, the contractor, deserves much praise for a work which is going to be a lasting benefit to a large section of Queen's and King's Counties. At the outer end of the wharf, at low water, the depth is six feet—at high water, twelve feet. It is ballasted from the bottom with stone.

MRS. MARY DIBBINS has charge of an idiot child which was left in the hands of the Corporation some years ago. It is growing finely, and Mrs. Dibbins, in a letter to the City Council last night, requests that the child be furnished with necessary winter clothing. She gave a full description of the child's habits in the body of the letter, and added the following postscript:—

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Sylvester McDonald appeared for assaulting Joseph Peterson (colored), on Lord's Wharf, on the 3rd inst. Joseph testified that McDonald struck him a violent blow in the eye, and stated that he saw McDonald with a brass knuckle on his hand at the time of the assault. The assault was proved, but nothing further than Peterson's statement with reference to the knuckle was obtained. The matter was adjourned until to-morrow, in order to get evidence of his carrying it. The case of John Bolger, for selling liquor without license, stands over until to-morrow. This is a second charge. Mr. Bolger denies it, but a credible witness has been subpoenaed to appear against him. Bernard McCarey, for assaulting M. P. Rochford, was fined \$10 and costs or 20 days. This case, which has been before the Court several times, was finally settled, when Theoph. Chappell swore that he saw the defendant assault the plaintiff. Michael McCarthy, for assaulting Susan Connolly, was fined \$20 and costs.

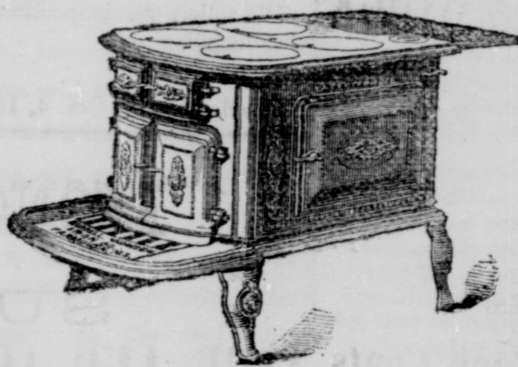
