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Island Odds And Ends

It is gratifying to know that our parking meters, besides doing the job for which they were intended, are paying their way, with something to spare. It is to be hoped that the surplus derived from the meters will be devoted to the purchase of some more traffic lights. There are corners in Charlottetown, unregulated by either traffic lights or policemen, which are dangerous and only negotiable at considerable risk. It is timely to recall that as councillor, C. C. Cox was mainly responsible both for the installation of the traffic lights and of the meters. It looks now as though he did a good stroke of business for Charlottetown.

From the records available at the National Employment Office, Charlottetown, it is known that the year 1952, now in its final quarter, has been a good year from an employment standpoint. A comparatively few people have been idle for any serious length of time, since the opening of work in the spring. At the present time, about 240 people are drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits in King's and Queen's Counties. One-third of this number are women. Since King's and Queen's Counties have a combined population of about 60,000 people, the number of claimants is quite small.

Much work is being carried out at Souris to improve shipping facilities. The railroad wharf is being greatly improved and warehouse space greatly extended. The contract also calls for extensive dredging and it is encouraging to know that the operations will carry on into next year. Like any other town, Souris appreciates having a number of its workers on a steady payroll.

The German farm laborers who came to this country last summer have made quite a reputation for themselves. Most employers report them as being willing, capable and intelligent. By comparison with other racial groups, which have arrived in the province from time to time, they do not suffer in any respect.

The French language in this Province even in the predominantly French settlement of Russico, and the countryside is and near Tignish, is becoming more Anglicized in speech, each year. Proof of this was seen yesterday when the Dominion Government steamship C. D. Howe was unable to hire a French-speaking seaman while berthed at a local wharf. The "Howe" is manned by an all-French-Canadian crew, and her Captain sought to fill a vacancy before sailing from Charlottetown. It was necessary to secure a French speaking person. Enquiries in Rustico brought the response that very few of the younger men in that district who were capable of going to sea could speak French. It was the same story in the far-western section of the province. The Captain was still looking for a French speaking islander late last night, and the "Howe" was due to sail this morning.

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
