Few beaches anywhere are able to provide the fun and the relaxation to be found in the Stanhope, Brackley and Dalvey areas on the North Shore of Prince Edward Island.

The fine sandy beaches, the sound of the surf, the cool breezes and the cry of the sea birds add up to pleasure for the entire family while the freshwater angler will find happiness in the numerous bays and rivers.

A summer vacation spent along these beaches will be one to be long remembered by every family.

LONG HISTORY

The area also has an intriguing history dating back to 1770 when the first settlers landed. Dalvey by the Sea, originally known as Dalvey House, was built in 1885 as a summer residence by the late Alexander MacDonald, vice-president of the Standard Oil Company. After Mr. MacDonald's death it was occupied by his granddaughters, Helene and Laura Stallo, who married the late Prince Rossignol of Italy, was the last of the MacDonald family to stay at Dalvey House.

For the person who enjoys nothing more than absorbing the beauty of nature the park is a haven. Nature trails have been marked through the woods and made excellent paths for hiking. Most notable of these is Bubbling Springs trail. All along its length, almost two miles, the hiker wanders through a forest of dozens of types of trees, beautiful shrubbery and wildflowers by glacial Long Pond and the famous Bubbling Spring.

CREATURES ABOUND

Small woodland creatures abound in the area. Otters are red foxes, chipmunks, mink, racoons and rabbits are only a few of the many species of small animals that inhabit the forests. Dozens of types of birds may be seen also.

Fishing of course is a must. Rollings Pond has been dredged to improve the area where sea trout are frequently caught. Just outside the park but in easy reach of the park visitor are a number of charter boats for deep sea fishing or just plain ocean cruising. The boats are all government inspected and approved with certified skippers in command.

The park is carefully supervised by park attendants and park wardens, all under the command of park superintendent Kipping. Courtesy and helpfulness are the bywords of the park staff and visitors will be given all the information at the park office that they require to make their stay as relaxing and enjoyable as possible.

this was in 1915 when the Prince was recalled to Italy because of the war.

After several changes in ownership it was bought in 1931 by Hon. George DeLoos, the Lieutenant-Governor of the province, who in 1938 sold the estate to the federal government. It was to become one of the chief attractions of the National Park in which it is located. It is now operated by Raoul Raymond.

A number of pieces of the original furniture and a "rally-boat" once drawn by four horses and used by the MacDonald family, may still be seen in the estate.

STANHOPE SETTLED

Stanhope was first settled in 1770. The third ship to come to P.E.I. with immigrants from Scotland was the *Falmouth*. The ship's passengers all settled at the head of Stanhope Bay.

The first survey and map made by Captain Holland in 1774 shows where each family settled. Some of the early families who went ashore in 1770 were the Browns, Higgins, Leitch, Millers, Shaws, etc.

The Stanhope Road was the first carriage road on Prince Edward Island. Built in 1786 it wended out from Charlottetown and divided in the district.

the western road going to Prince Town (Summerside), the eastern going to St. Peters.

At this time two French families lived at Long Pond, then known as Boat Harbor. The road turned toward the shore at the Old Shaw cemetery and followed the shore east to Long Pond, going South through the now Day Carr farm.

QUICK RENTS

South of the Shaw cemetery at the new Calder place was the grant selected by David Lawson in June 1781. He was agent for a Mr. Montgomery, owner of the grant, and brought Scottish settlers to the district and collected the quick rents from them.

Among the settlers were weaver, and a blacksmith and several other artisans who made the settlements self sufficient. Farming and fishing were the main occupations of the settlers. By the militia law of 1786, all

males between 16 and 80 were compelled to have military training. The armory and rifle range were located at the now Wendall Keefer farm. From the fishing industry there developed several lobster factories.

EARLY VACATIONERS

Even in those early days the beaches drew vacationers and families from Charlottetown were constant visitors to the area for swimming and fun in the sun. They stayed at the old Davis Hotel and the many farm homes in the area.

Sportmen, too, found there way here for fishing and wild fowl and a minister, Rev. M.

Dea Brimsy, made his home here for another reason — he found Charlottetown "too wicked." The creek near where he lived is still called Parson's Creek.

BRACKLEY HISTORY

Brackley Beach was settled in 1793, by the direct forebears of the present owners of Shaw's Brackley Beach Lodge and The Pines. Brackley Beach is in the center of the P.E.I. National Park, directly north of Charlottetown on Route 15. It is the shortest route from Charlottetown and the airport to the National Park.

Brackley, the pioneer tourist area of the Island, was opened

by the Shaw family in 1860, and then, Gregors opened in 1905, Lodge in 1915 and The Pines still operates on the same location, followed by Brackley Beach are still operating.
